

AGENT REPORTS GRAIN MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

Grain has made remarkable progress during the warm weather and is heading out now, C. A. Henderson, county agent, stated after a survey of the area. Growth on all crops has been outstanding the past 10 days, with potatoes up generally throughout the Klamath basin. Expected stands of potatoes are not so good with more than the usual missing hills, due to earlier cold and rain. At the present time an ordinary crop is predicted, but the next month may change the picture entirely, one way or another, farmers agree.

Some haying is underway now, and quite an amount of dry land rye is being cut for hay. Some alfalfa, and alfalfa and grass mix is being put up. Preparations are being made now for irrigating potato fields. Very little has been necessary for grain crops this year, but general irrigation will be started soon if there is no rainfall, Henderson predicted. Some has been started in the south end of the district recently.

Numerous aphids are showing up on peas now, and the two species of insect which feed primarily on aphids, ladybugs and syrphid flies, are increasing accordingly, growers believe. A good heavy rain, or extremely hot weather would kill the aphids which thrive in mild conditions and damage the peas. Spraying and dusting can be used to control the destructive insects but also damages those who feed on them. The predators, entomologists state,

Oregon Threatened With Food Lacks On 3 Fronts

Another drop in the food supply threatened Oregon today on three fronts—bakeries, butcher shops and restaurants.

With numerous Portland cafes already closed for fortnight vacations, restaurateurs at The Dalles announced that every eating place in that town would shut its doors next Monday.

A spokesman for The Dalles restaurants said the ration point shortage, accentuated by the arrival of between two and three thousand hungry cherry pickers, forced the closure. He said cafes would not reopen until more ration points, denied by the OPA, are granted.

Meanwhile the state agricultural director, told that 90 per cent of Oregon's custom and independent slaughterers would close under a new OPA custom slaughtering regulation, termed the regulation "the most ridiculous order that I have ever read."

"There is not a custom slaughtering plant in Oregon that can operate under this order," E. L. Peterson told a meeting of meat dealers at Salem. Dealers declared that Salem butcher shops would be out of meat within a short time, and that meat markets in other Oregon towns would follow suit.

In Portland, a survey showed 23 bakeries already closed, and 35 others threatening to halt operations unless they receive more sugar by July 15.

Hanson D. Meinke, attorney for the Master Bakers association, said low sugar and shortening supplies, coupled with a tremendous increase in business caused by little home baking, were responsible.

Meinke said a 10 per cent

sugar allotment cut is due July 1, giving Portland bakeries half the sugar they used in 1941, plus an extra 30 per cent granted because of increased population.

Radar Expert Speaks At Kiwanis Meeting

Cmdr. Herbert Scott, an expert on radar, spoke at the weekly luncheon of the Kiwanis club which was held at the Willard hotel, Thursday.

Although the commander could tell only what has already appeared in print, he quoted the range of the radar as of 1941 which was 150 miles. He told how the term "radar" originated, explaining that it stood for radio detection and recognition.

Cmdr. Scott, a graduate of the University of Washington, was the first man to actually install wireless phones in sea-going ships. He did this while employed at the Bell laboratories in 1929. Later he became professor of communications at University of California.

Commander and Mrs. Scott are spending several weeks in Klamath Falls while he is on leave. The commander has been in Washington, D. C., since 1942, and has recently been transferred to the west coast.

The ballot box will be opened at the ball, an auditor will count the ballots, add up the scores, and the queen will be announced, the committee stated.

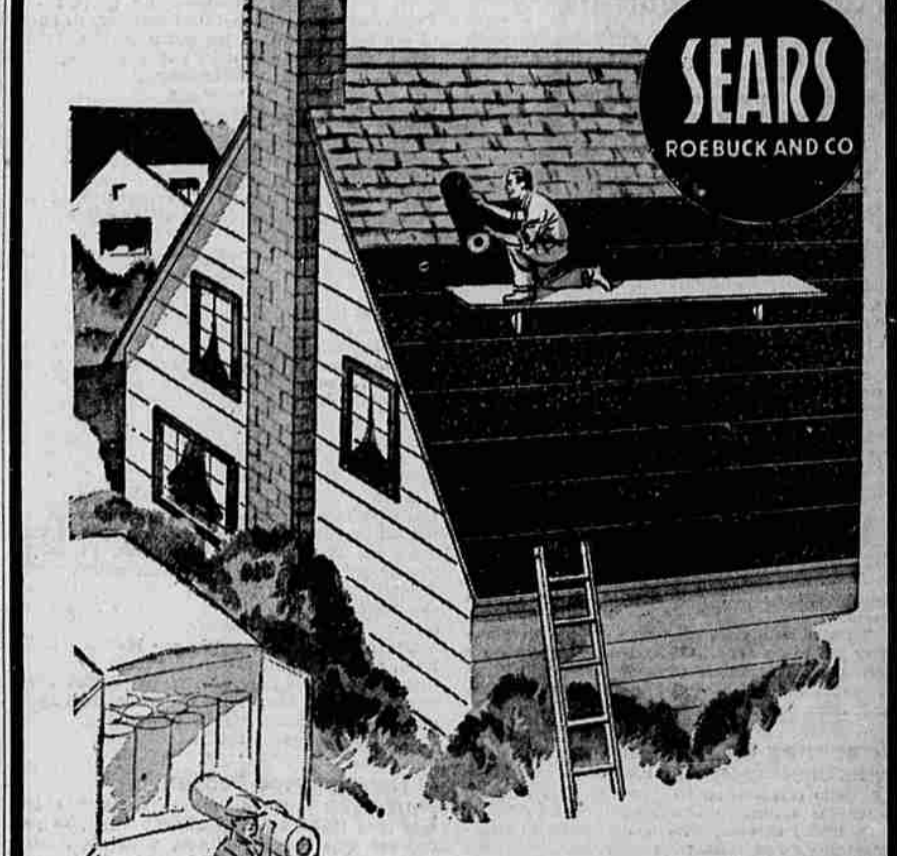
Recruiting Officer Stops In Klamath
