

# Yanks Club Sox, 14-4; Tigers Cop

Dave Ferriss Belted From Mound For First Time In Career; Cubs Go Into 2nd

It may be premature to hail Boston's Dave (Boo) Ferriss as another Bob Feller, but the two have at least one thing in common—both have found it difficult to beat the New York Yankees.

Feller, the Van Meter (a.) meteor, won 106 games for a .685 percentage in six seasons, holding the edge over every other club in the league by wide margins, but he could do no better than an even 14-14 won and lost record against the Yankees.

Ferriss Knocked Out In batting Ferriss from the mound for the first time in his major league career yesterday, the Yankees defeated the sensational Red Sox rookie for the second straight time, the only losses charged against him this year. Winner of nine games, at least one from every club, Ferriss had copped his first eight before being stopped by the Bronxites two weeks ago.

A crowd of 15,110 saw the Yankees clout Ferriss for five hits and nine runs before he was removed in the fifth. The Yanks went on to score 13 runs in that frame, just one short of their own record for tallies in an inning, and eventually club the Sox 14-4 behind Walt Dubiel.

Bengals Nip Indians Frank (Stubby) Overmire pitched and batted the first place Detroit Tigers to a 5-1 victory over Cleveland. He spaced seven hits for his fifth triumph and batted in two runs to defeat Jim Bagby.

Brooklyn's Dodgers won their 12th game from the Philadelphia Phillies 9-2. Held to two runs in seven innings by Lindero Leon, making his first start for the Phillies, the Dodgers teed off on Reliever Anton Karl for five in the eighth and continued on Oscar Judd for two more in the ninth. The victory, the first for Cy Buker making his major league debut, increased the Brook's first place lead to three and one-half games.

Chicago's Cubs moved into second place by downing Pittsburgh 5-4 for their fifth straight victory. The St. Louis Cardinals remained four percentage points behind the Cubs, a half game ahead of the fourth place Pirates with a 4-0 shutout over Cincinnati. Blix Donnelly scattered five Redjex hits.

Washington and the Athletics were scoreless when rain ended the contest in the last half of the fourth inning. The Braves and Giants in the National League and the White Sox in the American were not scheduled.

Bob Joyce Wins 15th Game As Seals Blank Hollywood; Rainiers Whip Padres, 7-2

Portland's Beavers, doing an Alphonse-Gaston act with the Seattle Rainiers in alternately winning and losing, are back down to a three and a half game Pacific Coast league lead after a 3-0 loss to Sacramento last night, their second in three tilts.

Seattle made it two out of three over San Diego's Padres with a 7-2 victory. The California clubs trade locations in the northwest for the remaining four games of the split week.

San Francisco's Bob Joyce, leading pitcher of the circuit, notched his 15th win of the season as the Seals took their third straight from the Hollywood Stars 6-0 and moved into third place. Oakland's Acorns slid to fourth half a game behind the O'Douls in losing to Los Angeles 10-2.

Minor shifts in standings in the last three days saw the Acorns drop half a peg from a third-spot tie and Sacramento replace the Padres in fifth.

Beasley Blanks Beavers Portland's shutout came at the hands of Southpaw Bud Beasley, who has won two in a row since joining the Solons this month on conclusion of his teaching chores at Reno. The Beavers were able to scratch out only four singles while Sacramento was touching Roy Helsler, star of the Portland pitching staff, for 11.

The Rainiers' Carl Fischer tossed six-hit ball in registering his 7-2 victory over the Padres. Second-baseman Bob Gorbould of Seattle stole the show in driving in four runs on his two hits of the evening, one of them a triple. To top off his performance, Gorbould stole home with the last tally of a four-run assault in the second inning.

In blanking Hollywood 6-0, Joyce held the Stars to three singles and a double retiring 20 men between the third and ninth innings without a hit. He did not issue a base on balls and never allowed more than one hit in any frame.

The Angels' Charley Cuellar turned in the fourth well-tossed contest in setting down the Acorns 10-2 with seven hits. Norm Dewese, Oakland center-fielder, stretched his consecutive hitting streak to 16 games, but his teammate, Jake Cauffman broke his string at 11 when he failed to get a back-kick in four trips to the plate.

Los Angeles will move to Oakland and San Francisco will go to Hollywood tonight to continue play against the same opponents.

# OSC Eleven Will Play Leathernecks

CORVALLIS, June 22 (AP)—An opening contest against the Klamath Falls marines will mark Oregon State college's return to the gridiron this fall.

The game, booked for Bell field here September 29, will give the Beavers a nine-game schedule, eight of them Pacific coast conference battles.

Athletic Director Percy P. Lacey also announced the signing of Quentin Greenough, who played on the Beavers 1941 Rose Bowl team, as line coach. Greenough, recently granted an honorable discharge from the coast guard, was line coach for the Alameda coast guard grid team last fall.

Oregon State and other northern division squads will open practice September 10, Lacey said.

# Hoop Jr. Not To Run In Belmont

NEW YORK, June 22 (AP)—For the first time since 1938 the American turf's triple crown will be split three ways tomorrow when a half-dozen 3-year-olds meet in the \$50,000 added Belmont stakes at Belmont park.

Neither Hoop Jr., winner of the Kentucky derby, or Polynesian, victor in last Saturday's Preakness, will be in the mile and one-half test. Hoop Jr. bowed a tendon in the Preakness and is through racing for the season while Polynesian is not eligible.

The last time the crown was divided among three horses, Lawrin accounted for the derby, Dauber took the Preakness and Pasteurized came through in the Belmont.

Col. C. V. Whitney's Jeep, fifth in the derby, is the favorite to take the third of the rich 3-year-olds stakes which will have a gross value of close to \$73,000.

# Freese Tourney Dark Horse

Portland Girl Meets Dot Germain In Semi-Finals Of Women's Golf Tourney

By JIM MITCHELL INDIANAPOLIS, June 22 (AP) It was up to a 19-year-old westerner playing her first tournament east of the Rockies and a veteran easterner making her fourth bid for the Women's Western Open Golf championship to prevent the final round of the 16th annual event from duplicating the 1944 windup.

The two young ladies on the spot in today's semi-final matches were Carol (Babe) Freese of Portland, Ore., and Mrs. Albert Becker of Englewood, N. J., and the task confronting them was about as formidable as any a women's golf match can afford.

Becker Meets Champ To the deliberate Mrs. Becker fell the dubious privilege of matching strokes with defending Champion Mrs. Mildred (Babe) Didrikson Zaharias of Los Angeles in the upper bracket. Miss Freese was paired with precise Dorothy Germain of Philadelphia, and there was no choice as to which had the roughest path to the finals.

Mrs. Zaharias, who whipped Miss Germain, 7 and 6, for the 1944 title at Park Ridge, Ill., signaled her readiness for the toughest of competition the last two rounds of the tournament might have to offer by routing the veteran Dorothy Kirby of Atlanta, 4 and 3, in her quarter-final match yesterday. Miss Germain, probably the hottest golfer in the meet at present, kayoed Betty Hicks of Chicago in equally convincing manner, 5 and 3.

Portland Girl Favorite Miss Freese won 3 and 2 and continued to claim the dual role of "people's choice" and dark horse as she fired a one-over-par 38, at Phyllis Otto of Atlanta, in the outgoing nine for a three-up lead. Miss Otto, the 1942 runnerup, rallied briefly at the 11th and 12th after losing the 10th but she was unable to derail the 112-pound westerner and lost the 15th.

# Tommervik Will Coach Alma Mater

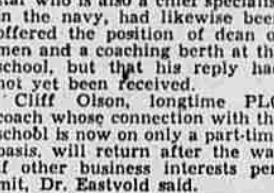
