

# RODEO PLANS SHAPING UP FOR HOLIDAY

Rodeo plans are rapidly progressing for the grand four-day west celebration which will get off to the official start with a dance at the Klamath armory, Saturday night, June 30.

Events at the fairgrounds will commence Sunday, July 1, with the grand entry ride of the queen and her royal court, starting at 1:30 p. m.

Chaperone Mrs. Audrey Smith and Maxine Cameron will ride with Queen Blanche Schonchin and her five princesses, Beverly Wampler, Lora Cross, Gloria Jean Saunders, Ginger A. Thomas and Jean Protsman.

The marine corps mounted fire patrol will ride Sunday afternoon also with Sheriff's Poses and Medford Saddle club ladies. The program will last approximately until 5 p. m. each day.

Monday the regular rodeo events will follow the grand entry ride and drill teams. Tuesday the same program will be followed with a rodeo dance in the evening at the Klamath armory.

Wednesday, the Fourth of July, will bring events to a grand climax, commencing with a parade which will start at 10 a. m. at the beginning of Main street and traverse the length of the street to break up under the underpass. The parade, in charge of Marshall Cornett, will feature the marine corps marching in force, Klamath Sheriff's Posse, and posse clubs from outlying districts, Saddle clubs and all civic organizations. The navy air base and Camp Tulelake have also been invited to participate.

The Fourth will wind up the finals of the meet, and decisions on the events will be announced.

Each day of the celebration, Brahma bull riding will be featured, steer team roping, calf roping and all the other wild west events scheduled for the 1945 program.

There will be a final dance held at the armory the night of July 4th, terminating the Klamath Buckaroo Days show for the tenth consecutive year of its performance.

# Ninth Air Force To Be Broken Up

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, June 25 (AP)—The U. S. ninth air force, largest tactical air force in the world, is being broken up and some of its units will be sent to the Pacific to fight Japan.

Other parts of the ninth will remain in Europe as the nucleus of an occupational air force which will be maintained as long as U. S. ground forces remain in Germany.

# MODERN SUBMARINE DEVELOPER DIES

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., June 25 (AP)—Simon Lake, the man who developed the modern submarine and was pained to see it become a weapon of war and destruction, is dead.

The 79-year-old inventor, who kept working in his little laboratory at Milford although long in failing health, entered a hospital here a week ago because of a heart condition and died Saturday night.

Lake, who dreamed of submarines as a boy of 10 and launched his first undersea craft, a crude affair, when he was 28, and worked of late years designing big, cargo-carrying subs and intermittently adding chapters to a book he said would show that "the submarine is good for something else besides destroying property and lives."
