### Sacramento Whips Seattle Twice; Portland Holds 4 1/2 Game Lead; Seals Threaten

Seattle's Rainiers are right back where they were a week ago—four and a half games behind the Portland Beavers, Pacific Coast league pacesetters.

Just when the Weasacers start shaking their heads over a Portland slump and predicting a crack-up by manager Mary Owen's injury-riddled club, the Beavers bounce back with a performance like their three straight weekend victories over the San Diego Padres. Seattle kept pace Saturday night against the Sacramento Solons, but dropped both ends of Sunday's twin bill.

## Seals Threaten Leaders

Both Portland and Seattle though, may well cast a weather eye on the direction of J. Francis O'Doul's up and coming San Francisco Seals, now in third place only four games back of the Rainiers. Off to a slow start early in the season, the Seals continued their rise last week, manhandling the Hollywood Stars for a 5-3 series edge.

Oakland slipped to a fourth spot in the league Saturday through its 3-3 split for the week with the Los Angeles Angels. After nosing out the Padres 4-3 Saturday, the Beavers took Sunday's pair 4-2 and 5-1 on steady pitching performances by Don Puliford and Syd Cohen. San Diego's Carl Dumlum, mound sensation of the league in the early part of the season, was credited with the loss in yesterday's opener as Puliford tossed five-hit ball. Cohen set the Padres down with six hits in the nightcap. The doubleheader was the third the Beavers have copped in a row, and gave the loop-leaders the abbreviated series 3-1.

**Sacs Lick Seattle**  
Sacramento won 10 innings to win its opener against Seattle 5-4, and coasted to a 2-0 victory in the seven-inning finale. Joe Woods Jr., bested Hal Turpin in the first game pitching dupe, helping win his own game by driving in three runs, one of which tied the score in the ninth. Ted Norbert accounted for three of the Rainiers' four runs in the seventh with a homer over the left field wall. Gene Babbitt blanked the Skiffmen with three hits in the nightcap as his mates converted five blows off Chet Johnson into two tallies. Seattle took Saturday night's encounter 2-1, with the clubs winding up in a 2-2 series tie.

San Francisco breezed to a 7-0 win against Hollywood in the first game yesterday behind the five-hit hurling of Frank Seward. The defeat was Joe Mishasek's second for the week at the hands of the Seals after he had burned up the circuit with six straight victories. Credit for San Francisco's 4-3 loss in the second game went to Bob Joyce, the league's top pitcher, who was hustled into the fray in the sixth frame to replace Tony Buzolich. The Seals racked up a 4-1 decision in Saturday's tilt. Los Angeles scored two 1-0 wins over Oakland over the weekend, winning by that figure Saturday and again in Sunday's nightcap. The Acorns grabbed yesterday's opener 11-3. Lou Novikoff's 350-foot homer Saturday gave Don Osborn the edge over Floyd Strome, both of whom went the distance on the mound. # Tigers Cop Pair From Brownies

### Newhouse Gains Eleventh Triumph Of Season; Yanks Sweep Double Bill From A's

Southpaw Hal Newhouse of the Detroit Tigers has a chance to become the major league's first 30-game winner in 11 years.

Not since Dizzy Dean won 30 for the 1934 St. Louis Cardinals has a big league hurler reached that figure. Bob Grove, while with the Philadelphia Athletics, was the last American leaguer to reach the 30 victory mark, rolling up 31 in 1931.

Only last year, Hurricane Hal came closest to joining Grove as the majors only 30-game winning lefthander, missing the elusive figure by one.

Newhouse Beats Browns  
Newhouse gained his 11th triumph of the season yesterday as the Bengals retained their game and a half first place lead over the New York Yankees by taking both ends of a doubleheader from the St. Louis Browns, 5-1 and 4-3.

A home run by Mark Christman in the ninth spoiled the Tiger left's shutout who until then had pitched 23 scoreless innings. Dizzy Trout, who teamed up with Newhouse to set a new modern major league record for two pitchers on one club by winning 56 games, received credit for the nightcap victory. He relieved Walter Wilson in the seventh and hurled three scoreless rounds to register his seventh triumph.

Nelson Potter, who went the route for the Browns, lost his sixth straight when Eddie Mayo and Roy Cullenbine singled in the ninth, Mayo scoring on Rudy York's fly.

Yanks Sweep Twin Bill  
The Yankees remained on the heels of the Tigers by sweeping a doubleheader from Philadelphia 13-5 and 6-3 before 35,272 fans, extending the Athletics losing streak to seven straight. Hank Borowy, aided by a pair of homers by Bud Metheny, opened his ninth decision in the opener, while Teammate Ernie Bonham won his first game of the campaign in the nightcap, after five reverses. Bobo Newson dropped the first contest for the A's, his 10th of the year and his ninth in succession.

Brooklyn's Dodgers ran up an eight game winning streak before they were finally stopped by the Boston Braves in the second game of a doubleheader. The Dodgers won the opener 8-6 and bowed in the nightcap 3-1, to retain their three-and-a-half game lead over the second place St. Louis Cardinals who split with the Chicago Cubs, winning the opener 8-2 and dropping the nightcap 6-3.

Walker Leads Attack

Bymeabond's time for the mile and an eighth was 1:50, 2/5 of a second under Stagehand's old derby record set in 1938. The winner's share of \$37,245 brought his total earnings to \$49,497. It was Bymeabond's first start since running sixth in the Kentucky derby.

Bymeabond, fourth choice in the betting, paid \$17.00, \$4.40 and \$2.90.

First Loss for Busher  
For Busher, whose winnings total over \$100,000, it was the first defeat in four starts this season. The Louis B. Mayer filly, given a good ride by Johnny Longden, had no excuses. After taking the lead on the last turn, she was simply out-run in the last dozen strides.

First, that she is a lady of iron-will and courage on and off the fairways.

And secondly, that she can put aside her long-driving game which would shame the average masculine golfer and rake in the chips by pitching and putting.

Third Championship  
Babe scored her second straight Western Open triumph over Dorothy Germain of Philadelphia, 4 and 2 at Indianapolis' Highland Golf and Country club Saturday to take her third championship of the 167-year-old meet. She won her first from Mrs. Lucille Robinson Mann in 1940.

In becoming the event's first three-time champion, Mrs. Zaharias had to overcome grief occasioned by her mother's death at Los Angeles a day before the tourney finale.
