

PARK BECOMES POPULAR SPOT DURING HEAT

With the temperature hitting over 90 degrees and people getting as far from town as gasoline will permit, the city park is becoming a popular meeting place, according to B. F. Stott, park master, who reported that approximately 1500 people visited the park over the weekend.

Capacity crowds have necessitated the installation of a new water line. City water will be a new feature at the park as previously water had come from the park pumping system. Both systems will be used for the water supply.

Heavy use of both the tennis courts and picnic grounds are reported. Plans for increasing the tennis court are underway but they cannot be carried out until material is obtained, then two new courts will be added.

The ball park is also on the list for future improvements as are the cinder walks, which will be covered with blacktop as soon as it is available. The sprinkler system will be enlarged after the war to comply with the increase in lawns.

At present, small animals such as badgers, coons and coyotes may be seen along with a number of ducks, geese and other birds. There are 18 deer at the park now.

Park hours are from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m.

LIQUOR HEADS TO TESTIFY TO COMMITTEE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26 (AP)—Members of the Oregon state liquor control commission and Administrator Ray Conway were to appear today before the state legislative committee investigating the Oregon-Washington \$7,300,000 liquor distillery purchase.

State Senator Paul Patterson, Hillsboro, committee chairman, reported after yesterday's hearings that auditors found no evidence of fraud in the deal. The auditors said liquor stocks checked accurately with purchase receipts.

Patterson said the committee plans to ask about a 'gentleman's agreement' involving 10,000 bottles of whiskey which he says Washington owes Oregon.

He said the division of liquor warehouse receipts left Oregon short .6 of 1 per cent of her share, and that Washington was to adjust the matter later.

Other questions include what is to be done with empty barrels. They are worth about \$85,000, he said.

The auditors said that on part of the stocks, most of the older whiskey went to Washington, which might boost Washington's profit margin.

Tacoma Dealers Threaten Meat Strike

TACOMA, June 26 (AP)—Though Tacoma retail meat dealers pledged to forego all black market dealings—even if they have to close their shops, they agreed yesterday to postpone until July action on such closing to give newly appointed Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson a chance to relieve the shortage situation.

The announcement from Carl Malstrom, secretary of the Pierce county retail meat dealers, said July 19 had been set tentatively as the date for closing in case drastic meat shortages were not relieved.

The local group was told by I. W. Ringer, secretary of the Washington State Retail Grocers and Meat Dealers Association, that recent meetings had been held in the northwest with Anderson and plans had been made to defeat the meat black market.

Shipments To Russia To Continue Heavy

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26 (AP)—Shipments to Russia from Columbia river ports will continue the rest of the year as heavy as in past months, a war shipping administration official said here.

George Powell reported 80 per cent of the Russian-bound cargo from the Pacific coast after June 30 will be shipped from Columbia river ports.

He said Russian ships now in the harbor have stepped up loading schedules to meet a July 1 deadline for certain cargo.

A department of commerce survey reports 1944 shipment of non-military goods from the Oregon customs district (all Columbia river ports) totaled 1,348,000 tons valued at \$761,000,000, most of it Russian lend-lease goods.
