

COUNCIL HEARS PETITION FOR BUS SERVICE

A petition for bus service to Moore park during the summer months, signed by several hundred citizens of Klamath Falls, was read before the council meeting last night and referred to the mayor and public utilities committee for study and discussion with the Klamath Bus company.

A bid submitted for asphalt for proposed improvement of city streets, amounting to \$24,130, by J. R. Winger, president of Warren Northwest Inc., was turned over to the street committee and city engineer to check amounts needed and report to the council next Monday.

Lorenz company requested permission to lower the sidewalk bordering company property on Broad street, 18 inches, for a distance of 40 feet. Permission was withheld until the city engineer, mayor and city attorney could check on the advisability of such a move.

Permission to erect a tent on the corner of 12th and Klamath was requested for meetings of the First Covenant church, and referred to the fire chief and police chief for approval.

Building Inspector A. W. Downs recommended Klamath Heating company escaping steam be carried to roof-tops by metal pipes. This was laid over until next week for study.

A petition was presented to the council to construct standard width streets on Martin and put in sidewalks on each side for six blocks, from Main to Home avenue. It was signed by 48 Martin street property owners, and referred by the council to the street committee, city engineer and mayor for checking and approval.

Property owners have purchased the triangle bordered by Esplanade, Pacific Terrace and Earle street and presented the deed to the city for park service. The deed has been accepted by the park board to improve as it is able, and the abstract is being studied by the city attorney.

Winnie Hosk's restaurant, serving meals for prisoners in city jail for the past two years, submitted a bid to raise the price from 37c to 40c per meal. The 3c increase in price was approved by the council last night.

Eight building permits were granted and two new offers to purchase city property were accepted.

Two restaurant permits were approved by the council, one at 1320 Oregon, and the other at 119 S. 4th.

Permits to move a house from Portland to Eldorado, and a house from Dolores to Eldorado were granted R. B. Hadley.

2,500,000 Tires To Be Rationed Soon

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP) Another 2,500,000 tires will be available for rationing in July.

The July allotment, the same as this month's will go to "B" and "C" ration holders. "A" card holders, as usual, must depend on their present tires.

The 2,500,000 tires allotted to OPA for rationing should meet the immediate requirement of the most essential drivers. Max McCullough, deputy OPA administrator for rationing, said in a statement.

Pedestrian Injured Slightly In Crash

The two youths waived preliminary hearing and were committed to the county jail in lieu of \$1000 bail each. They were found over to the Klamath county grand jury.
