

E BOND QUOTA \$1 BILLION SHORT OF GOAL

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The \$4,000,000,000 series E bond quota still was more than \$1,000,000,000 short of attainment today.

The drive ends Saturday with the accounting period running another week through July 7. It opened May 14.

Here is the sales situation: E bonds, \$2,971,000,000, expected to pass \$3,000,000,000 today. \$3,000,000,000 was the E bond quota in the 6th War Loan last winter.

Total sales, \$20,791,000,000, getting closer to the record of \$21,621,000,000 in the 6th drive. Individual sales including E bonds, \$6,070,000,000, considered more than likely to reach the \$7,000,000,000 individual quota.

Corporation sales, \$14,121,000,000, more than double the \$7,000,000,000 corporate quota. Corporation sales alone have passed the quota set for the entire drive, \$14,000,000,000.

Salem Man Accused Of False Statements

PORTLAND, June 27 (AP)—Mike Steinbock, Salem, accused of making false statements to build a night club in the state capital, will appear in federal district court here on a charge of violating the WPB conservation order.

A secret federal grand jury indictment declared that Steinbock applied to the WPB to construct an establishment for feeding war workers, but actually built a night club whose opening was attended by state legislators last January.

The indictment accused Steinbock of using better lumber than the common grade specified in his application, and spending almost three times as much as the \$5000 estimated cost.

He posted \$1000 bail Monday.

County Ward Leaves \$5000 Estate In Bank

PORTLAND, June 27 (AP)—Discovery of a \$5052 cash estate left by a 95-year-old man who had been a county ward for more than two years is revealed by County Auditor George Baldwin.

Baldwin said Samuel J. Aikin, who died last September, left a bank deposit book from the Portland Trust and Savings bank among his personal belongings. He said the county will claim about \$2000 for board and the balance will be given relatives, if they are located.

Three Years Before Tires Available To All, Prediction

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Defense Transportation Director J. Monroe Johnson predicted today it will be at least three years before all the people who want cars can get them.

Johnson said only the "most essential" drivers, such as doctors, police taxi drivers and war workers, will be able to purchase new automobiles for a long time to come.

He made the assertion in a statement appealing to car owners to conserve their vehicles.

ROSSON NAMED VET ADVISORY DIRECTOR

PORTLAND, June 27 (AP)—The Oregon advisory committee for administration of veterans' affairs meets today to confirm appointment of Hugh E. Rosson, Portland, as director of the new state department.

Rosson, named yesterday by Governor Earl Snell from candidates recommended by the advisory committee, is a Portland attorney, an American Legionnaire and former graduate manager of the University of Oregon.

A native of Iowa, the 53-year-old veteran of World War I taught law at the University of Oregon from 1924 until 1930 when he became university graduate manager. Later he served as state director of traffic safety during Snell's term as secretary of state.

More recently he has been a member of the investment department of the Equitable Savings and Loan association, Portland, which he resigns to accept the \$5000 state position. He managed the Dewey-Bricker campaign in Oregon in the last presidential campaign.

He lived in Eugene until 1936, and moved to Salem in 1937 where he resided until moving to Portland in 1940.

OCLA Funds to Save Jackson Taxpayers

MEDFORD, June 27 (AP)—Funds received from Oregon-California land administration grants will save Jackson county taxpayers a \$38,000 special tax levy voted last year for county hospital improvements.

County Treasurer Ralph E. Sweeney said an OCLA grant of \$163,000 was greater than expected and the tax levy will be unnecessary.

Sweeney reported other financial funds in excellent condition. He said the road sinking fund had increased from \$60,000 in 1943 to \$457,000 and \$100,000 will be added this year. Nearly 90 per cent of the current \$1,323,351 tax levy has been paid.

CONSTRUCTION OF EDUCATION BUILDINGS SET

PORTLAND, June 27 (AP)—Construction of voter-approved buildings for the Oregon state system of higher education will begin as soon as material and labor are available, Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter said here.

He predicted postwar enrollment of 20,000 students, including 12,000 war veterans.

One of the first buildings will be the \$100,000 wood products research laboratory at Oregon State college. Others on blueprint are an engineering wing, dairy products and agriculture building at Corvallis costing \$870,000 and a \$600,000 classroom and library structure at the University of Oregon. The University medical school at Portland will get a hospital wing and heating plant costing \$800,000.

He listed a dormitory at Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, \$125,000; classrooms and library building at Eastern Oregon College of Education, La Grande, \$125,000, and another \$150,000 building for the same purpose at Monmouth.

Detectives Ordered To Shoot To Kill In Breaking Crime Wave

PORTLAND, June 27 (AP)—A squad of detectives hand-picked for their marksmanship has been ordered to "shoot to kill" in a city police department move to break up a wave of safe cracking.

Detective Chief J. J. Keegan told the seven-man squad more than 1000 men in the Portland area are known to have police and prison records involving safe robberies, some of them "desperate and experienced criminals."

He reported thugs have looted business strong-boxes of \$75,000 to \$100,000 in recent weeks.
