Two Clubs Now Deadlocked In First Place; Leonard Hurls 4-Hitter To Win, 9-1

Detroit has dropped out of complete dominance of the American league and is tied today with New York's Yankees for first place, all because they met up once again with Washington's Dutch Leonard, the hurler who cost them the pennant last year.

Facing the Tigers for the first time since he outpitched Dizzy Trout on the final day of the 1944 pennant race to cause Detroit to finish one game behind the pennant winning St. Louis Browns, Leonard maintained his pitching wizardry over the Bengals in a twilight game yesterday, by spinning a neat four-hitter to triumph 9-1.

The Tigers' downfall, plus the Yankees' 7-2 victory over the Browns, brought the league leadership into a

# KSA Talks Doe Kill; Bonds Sold

Fish Planting in Klamath Area Discussed At Meet; Sportsmen Blast Doe Kill

The Klamath Sportsmen's association met last night at the Willard hotel for the purpose of staging a bond rally to raise a quota of \$2500 in war bonds and to discuss pertinent fish and game measures.

Fish planting in this area was discussed by W. J. Kessler, president of the association, who said that the game commission had reported unfavorably upon the matter. A letter from the game commission was read which stated that the commission did its own liberating and when the time came to stock this area the association would be notified.

The commission has said that the reason it is not stocking the streams is because of the manpower shortage and after that problem was overcome, something would be done.

At least two sportsmen's organizations here have expressed themselves as being willing to carry on the work, but the commission is still apparently unwilling to cooperate, according to discussion that took place last night at the meeting.

Kessler was nominated to attend a meeting of the game commission next month to represent the KSA.

Dr. George I. Wright said that Diamond lake is run solely for the benefit of Diamond lodge, which closes the season there when it wants and opens it when it desires. He said that he had never seen such a lack of fish in Diamond lake as there is this year.

The doe kill of a few years ago was then discussed and it was the decision of the KSA to keep the doe kill as low as possible if it is decided to have another kill at the meeting next month. Members of the association felt that another kill of 6000 does could ill be afforded.

The idea of taking legislative action to get the game laws back in the hands of the state legislature instead of the game commission was also discussed.

Kenneth McLeod reported that a meeting of various sportsmen organizations and both the California and the Oregon fish and game commissions was held recently in Alturas for the purpose of making a study of the inter-state deer herd.

The study was a failure, McLeod said, because it did not take in the general, over-all picture and saw only effects and not causes.

Kessler then adjourned the business meeting in order to hold the bond rally in which numerous prizes were offered. Approximately 100 sportsmen attended the session.

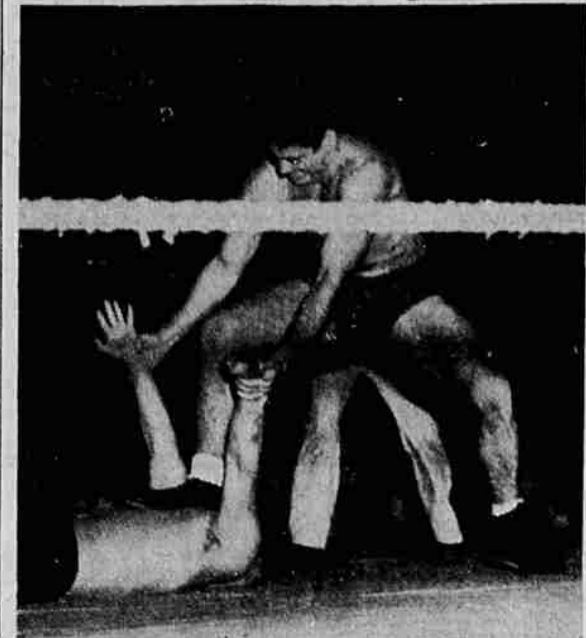

# Jug Mcspaden Fires 67 In Golf Carnival

CHICAGO, June 28 (AP)—The fancy fireworks that introduce the Chicago Victory National Open golf tournament today left a fuse sputtering merrily on Harold (Jug) McSpaden's pending title defense in the \$12,300 feature at the Calumet Country club.

McSpaden yesterday blasted a five-under-par 67 to boost two of his three partners into the halfway lead of a 36-hole carnival to determine national professional, pro-woman and pro-senior champions preliminary to the 72-hole Open which starts Friday.

Shares Lead

As the three-ply competition entered its final 18 holes, McSpaden shared the pro-amateur lead with Sgt. Walter Burkemo of Evanston, Ill., an army veteran who wears a steel brace around his waist to protect a wounded back, and with Arnold Minkley, a Chicago oldster, led the pro-senior parade.

The defending Open champion, Burkemo, who carded 35-39-74, had a 141 aggregate, one stroke better than the duo of Sam Byrd, Detroit, winner of the 1943 Open inaugural, and Bob Cochran of St. Louis. The latter topped the amateurs and his own pro partner with a 34-36-70. Byrd assembled 37 and 35 for an even par 72.

Minkley contributed 41-41-82 to McSpaden's 67 for 149, a stroke ahead of George Schneider of Colorado Springs, Colo., (74), and C. J. Farley of Grand Rapids, Mich., Michigan state senior champ, who slammed a remarkable 76.

Ann Casey Paces Women

The pro-lady pace-setters in the field of 32 foursomes were Byrd and Ann Casey, accurate-shooting Mason City, Ia., miss, who had 150. Miss Casey turned in the best feminine effort, 39-39-78. Three strokes behind with 153's were Claude Harmon, Detroit pro, (73) and Polly Riley, Fort Worth, Tex., (80), and McSpaden (67) and Dorothy German, Philadelphia, runner-up in the recent Women's Western Open, (86).

The Open field definitely will start without Slammin' Sam Snead, Lt. Ben Hogan of the army air force, 1944 runner-up, and Gene Sarazen. Snead has been advised by his doctor that his fractured arm may take a month to mend. Lt. Hogan could not arrange a leave, while Sarazen was unable to make travel reservations.

# Sacramento Trips Bevo Nine, 6-1

Seattle Gains Full Game On Leading Portland Club By Defeating Padres, 4-1

San Francisco's Seals and Oakland's Acorns, battling to break the northwest's top-spot monopoly in the Pacific Coast league, were a notch closer today to the loop-leading Portland Beavers, whose 6-1 loss to the Sacramento Solons last night reduced their margin over the Seattle Rainiers to four games.

The third place Seals moved within 7 1/2 games of the Beavers as they nosed out the Los Angeles Angels 3-2 for the second night in a row. Oakland also made it two straight in defeating Hollywood's Stars 5-2 to remain in fourth place one tilt behind San Francisco.

Seattle Gains

Seattle gained a full game on the pacemakers by beating San Diego's Padres, 4-1.

Seattle's Carl Fischer hung up his 10th win of the year in downing San Diego 4-1, as the two teams opened their series in the California city. A doubleheader is scheduled for tonight to make up the game lost Tuesday while the clubs were traveling.

Guy Fletcher, Sacramento's ace chucker, registered his 13th victory of the season in letting Portland and down with four hits and a lone rally, and aided his own cause by batting in three of his club's six runs. The Solons, held to six base outs, took advantage of Roy Helser's wildness to shove over five counters in the second frame. The clubs now stand one-all in their series.

Seals Edge Angels

The Seals, limited to one run and three hits in the first seven innings, got to the Angels' Don Osborn for two more tallies in the eighth on a combination of three singles and a walk, salvaging the game for their hard-luck hurler, Bob Barthelson. Up to that time Los Angeles had been leading, 2-1, after scoring both runs off Barthelson in the opening canto.

Oakland's 5-2 decision over Hollywood came through heavy stickwork by the Acorns, five of their hits going for extra bases. The winners counted one each in the first and second innings, and then added two more in the third on Jake Caulfield's homer with none aboard and Les Scarsella's triple. Both Len Gilmore, who got credit for the win, and Newt Kimball, losing pitcher, went the distance.

Oakland's owners are reported to have denied the circuit's latest rumor—that they contemplated signing Tony Lazzari, Willy Kamm or Rogers Hornsby as new manager of the club. Catcher Billy Raimondi has been at the helm since Dolph Camilli left that post earlier in the month.

SPOKANE, June 28 (AP)—Ferris field baseball park and adjacent city owned property has been purchased for \$50,000 by William P. Ulrich, owner of the Spokane franchise in the now inactive Western International league. Mayor Otto Dirkes said yesterday.

The sale calls for a \$500 down payment with the remainder to be paid within 20 years.
