

FEEDERS HERE ELIGIBLE FOR BEEF SUBSIDY

Cattle feeders in Klamath county can now apply to the county AAA office for beef cattle production payments under the government's new program to increase the production of meat.

Feeders are encouraged to feed more cattle, to good and choice grades under the new program. The method of payment is similar to the dairy payment program also handled through the county AAA office, according to County AAA Chairman B. W. Short.

The beef cattle production payment amounts to 50 cents per hundredweight on good or choice cattle weighing 800 pounds or more and selling for at least the minimum stabilization price, which for sales in this county is \$14.95.

The beef cattle production payment is available to all feeders, including slaughterers who also are feeders, provided their cattle meet the program requirements.

To be eligible, a feeder must certify on his application (1) that he owned the cattle at least 30 days before their sale, (2) that the cattle weighed at least 800 pounds when sold, (3) that the cattle brought not less than

Weekly Market Trend

(Editor's Note: The following market information is supplied from material obtained over the government leased wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon State college. The material, in the form of a weekly summary of trends in the livestock market, is not intended to replace day by day market reports.)

LIVESTOCK MARKETS
There was a substantial increase in salable receipts of cattle, sheep and lambs at North Portland, Monday, but offerings of hogs again totaled only 200 head. There were 2100 head of cattle and 2500 head of sheep and lambs. Trading in the cattle division was slow with prices 25 to 50 cents lower. Good fed steers were \$16.75 to \$17. Top lambs were in good demand at \$13.50 to \$14, but lower grades and ewes were 25 to 50 cents under the previous week's close.

LIVESTOCK SLAUGHTER FIGURES
United States slaughter of cattle and sheep under federal inspection during May this year reached an all-time record for that month. Slaughter of these the first five months of this year was also above the corresponding period last year and above average. Cattle slaughter, on the other hand, fell a little below May of last year and below average. Hog slaughter dropped to the lowest for the month since 1933. U. S. slaughter of hogs in May showed a small seasonal increase from the previous month, but was 40 per cent under the May average, and 30 per cent under the five-year average. Total hog slaughter from January through May was down 48 per cent from the corresponding period last year and 28 per cent under average.

U. S. production of pork, exclusive of lard, reached 10,732,000,000 pounds in 1944, an increase of 25 per cent over the 1935-39 average. Beef and veal production reached 12,803,000,000 pounds in 1944, an increase of 75 per cent above the average from 1935 to 1939. These compare with total agricultural production 23 per cent above average and all food for sale and home use 30 per cent above 1935-39.

The total slaughter of cattle in May 1944, according to the authorized slaughterer, was \$14.95, and (4) that the cattle were sold for slaughter to an authorized slaughterer.

CANNING SCHOOL SET FOR JULY HERE

The home canning school, sponsored each year by the Klamath county nutrition council, will be held this year in the Pelican theatre, July 24, 25, 26 and 27.

ods throughout Washington and Oregon, will instruct canning classes the first three days of the school.

Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstrations agent for Klamath county extension service, will demonstrate home freezing methods the last day of the canning school.

Sugar conservation in canning will be emphasized in the classes, it was announced.

Home canning equipment, including the new electric pressure cooker, will be on exhibit in the lobby of the theatre, together with complete bulletins on the subject.

Labor Offices Place Many Farm Workers

CORVALLIS, June 28 (AP)—County farm labor offices in Oregon placed nearly twice as many farm workers during the first five months of this year as in the same period of 1944.

The state farm labor office reported today that 15,518 placements were made through June 1, compared to 8665 last year. Malheur county received the most workers, and Marion county ranked next.

PORTLAND, June 28 (AP)—The July ceiling price on intermediate and late crop white potatoes grown this year will be the same as July 15-31, 1944, in the Portland OPA district, the OPA said today.

Crook and Deschutes were listed as exceptions, with a price of \$2.50 per 100 pounds.

Officials said the ceiling, F.O.B. country shipping point, will be formally set by July 1

on an annual instead of a crop year basis.
