

7TH WAR LOAN TOPS RECORDS OF BOND SALES

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The "Smash-Japan" 7th War Loan is the biggest of them all. Bond sales have reached \$21,639,000,000, breaking the previous record of \$21,621,000,000 made in the 6th War Loan last winter.

The drive ends tomorrow. It began seven weeks ago, May 14, a few days after the defeat of Germany.

Although the 14-billion-dollar overall quota has been answered under, not all quotas have been reached. Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau said in a statement "We still need every dollar that can be subscribed by individuals for E bonds."

E bond sales are \$3,071,000,000, or 76.7 per cent of the 4-billion-dollar quota. Individual sales, which include E bonds, are \$6,010,000,000 or 98.7 per cent of the 7-billion individual quota.

Corporation sales are \$14,729,000,000, more than twice the 7-billion corporate quota.

The treasury always has aimed at financing the war as largely as possible out of individuals' pocketbooks in order to hold down the amount of idle cash during a time of merchandise shortages. The more cash there is, say the economists, the greater the danger of rising prices and inflation.

PERKINS WELCOMES LABOR SUCCESSOR

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—Frances Perkins went to Union station today to extend a personal welcome to her successor as secretary of labor, Judge Lewis B. Schwellenbach.

President Truman's new cabinet appointee, who arrived on an early train with his wife, seemed pleasantly surprised to find Miss Perkins waiting for him at the station. The retiring secretary drove the Schwellenbachs to their hotel apartment in her long black limousine.

Schwellenbach said he would take the oath of office from Federal Judge Sherman Minton, former Indiana senator, at noon tomorrow. The ceremony is expected to take place in the office of Senate Secretary Leslie Bliffle.

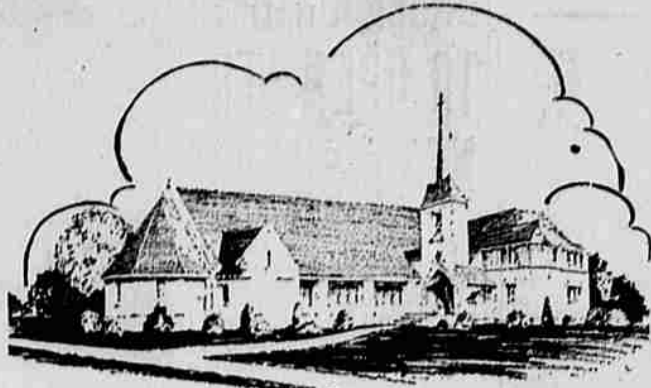
The new secretary said he preferred not to discuss his plans for administering the labor department until after he had taken the oath and conferred with the bureau heads.

Youth Organizations Plan Opening Of Summer Camps

With summer well on its way, plans are being rushed to completion in preparation for the opening of summer camps for the local troops of Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Camp Fire girls.

Special fishing trips to other lakes and streams are just one feature of the Boy Scout summer camp to be held at Camp Makula on Casset lake from July 15-19.

This camp will be under the direction of Robert H. Lamott, scout executive in Klamath Falls and Harold Talley, the newly-appointed assistant scout executive. There will also be an expert swimming and life saving instructor, a camp craft expert, and several specialists in such activities as archery, boating, and canoeing. Cooking will be handled by Mrs. Lamott who will be assisted by Mrs. Talley.

Dock Planned
Eleven life rafts just received from the maritime commission will be used to construct a swimming and boating dock which will be ready for the camp opening.

The U. S. forestry service has recently given the council permission to enlarge the camp area for present and postwar development. The new area will contain approximately three times the land now occupied by the present site.

The camp will handle around 100 boys a week and is open to all registered scouts.

Girls' Camp
Camp Esther Applegate located on the southwest end of Lake o' the Woods offers to Girl Scouts between the ages of 10 and 17 three weeks of diversified activities beginning July 18.

Swimming, riding, handicraft, first aid instructions, dramatics, archery, singing, and folk dancing are some of the activities participated in by the girls. Hikes through the woods are opportunities for nature study, outdoor cooking, and exploring while unit or general campfires are almost nightly events.

This year for the first time will assist counselors in all phases of the program! The five girls, who are expert Girl Scout campers, are Joyce Sample, Margaret Flock, Britta Lion, Marilyn Case and Jean O'Neill. The waterfront lifeguard and the handyman will be two marines who have recently taken Boy Scout training in Spokane.

The living quarters are divided into three main units for three different age levels. The camp will accommodate 55 girls.

The director this year will be Mrs. A. L. Brandt. Louise Mitchell will act as assistant. Fees for Klamath county girls

are \$10 a week while charges for non-county girls are \$12.

Camp Fire Girls
Also located on the shore of Lake o' the Woods is the summer camp for Camp Fire girls. Two weekly sessions are scheduled for this year beginning July 29 and closing August 12.

Camp Fire girls may attend both sessions but Blue Birds will be registered for the second week only.

Some of the activities besides regular camp duties are swimming, horseback riding, hiking, nature study, outdoor cooking, handicraft, music and dramatics.

New Zealand Ready To Fight For World Charter, Report

PORTLAND, June 29 (AP)—Should circumstances "unhappily require it," New Zealand would fight to protect the United Nations charter, Carl August Berendsen, New Zealand minister to the United States, declared last night.

He predicted the charter would work "if the great nations of the world determine to make it work."

"Although we didn't get exactly what New Zealand wanted," Berendsen said, "such giving and taking is after all the very essence of democracy." He termed wartime marriages between New Zealand girls and American servicemen "one of the few nice things to come out of this war."
