

Seals Eye PCL Flag; Bevos Cop

Beavers Down Sacramento Nine, 3-1; Rainiers Split Twin Bill With San Diego

Pacific Coast league pennant fever gripped the San Francisco Seals today after their third straight victory over the Los Angeles Angels—due primarily to the efforts of their sensational pinch-hitter, Battle Malone (Bones) Sanders.

For the third consecutive night Sanders, relief first baseman secured this year from the New York Giants by way of Jersey City, either sparked a Seal rally in the closing frames or punched over the winning run himself.

Seals Creep Up
San Francisco's 2-1 win put the O'Doulmen within three games of the second-place Seattle Rainiers, who split a twin bill with the San Diego Padres 1-2 and 5-0.

Portland's league-leading Beavers trounced the Sacramento Solons 3-1 for the second time in a row to increase their margin over Seattle to 4½ games and remain 7½ ahead of the Seals.

Portland's top pitcher, Don Pulford, racked up his 13th triumph of the year in beating Sacramento on a three-hitter. The Solons' tesser, Jim McCarthy, put his club ahead briefly with a third-inning homer, but was driven to the showers in the fifth when Portland scored all its runs on a walk and three singles. The Beavers led in the series, 2-1.

Eaves Wins No. 15

San Diego's 14-inning, 2-1 decision over the Rainiers in the curtain raiser was win No. 15 for Vallie Eaves, the league's top moundman and strikeout king, who whiffed seven men to bring his season's total to 117. Both clubs scored one run apiece in the sixth frame and then continued deadlocked until young Alex Palica, Seattle hurler, was touched for singles by Dick Gyselman and Jack Harshman in the last of the 14th to end the game. The nightcap was called at the end of the sixth because of the loop's curfew, with Seattle's Chet Johnson receiving credit for the abbreviated victory. The split gave the Rainiers a 2½ edge in the series.

Oaks Hammer Stars
Oakland's fourth-place Acorns, striving to overhaul their transbay neighbors, stayed only one tilt behind San Francisco by hammering the Hollywood Stars for the third night in succession 3-2.

The Seals pulled their game out of the fire in the last of the ninth after being held scoreless by the Angels' George Comellas. Sanders, batting for Roy Nicely, touched off the rally with a double and scored the tying run when Comellas last control and walked three men. Emil Malino, the circuit's leading hitter, brought in the winning tally with an infield single.

Wednesday night Sanders spaced an eighth-inning two-run assault that gave the Seals a 3-2 victory, and Tuesday night drove in the counter that broke a 4-4 ninth frame tie.

The Stars, playing bush league ball, committed six errors, responsible for eight unearned runs and saw four of their hurlers nicked for 16 hits as the Acorns won 13-2. Floyd Stromme held the tail-enders to seven bingles in coping his eighth game of the season.

Tigers Top Solons, 5-2; Yanks Lose

Detroit Regains Undisputed Possession Of First Place; Yanks Trail By One Game

Frank Hayes will set a new major league endurance record for catchers today when he dons the mask and mitt for the Cleveland Indians against his former mates, the Philadelphia Athletics.

The 29-year-old iron man caught his 217th consecutive big league game yesterday to tie the mark set by Ray Mueller of Cincinnati last year.

Traded to the Indians three weeks ago for Receiver Buddy Rosar, Hayes has been a potent factor in the Tribe's recent spurt which saw them win four of their last six games to move within a half game of the sixth-place St. Louis Browns. Although batting under the .250 mark, he has driven in 23 runs and walloped seven homers, third high in the league.

Baggy Blanks A's
Jim Bagby of the Indians hung up an 11-0 whitewash yesterday, spacing six Philadelphia hits for his second triumph of the campaign against eight losses. It was the Athletics' ninth straight defeat.

Detroit regained undisputed possession of the American league lead by defeating Washington 5-2 while the Browns were humbling the New York Yankees 9-4 in their third straight night contest.

Lefty Hal Newhouser, last year's top winner in the majors, appeared on his way to repeat by registering his 12th victory, tops this season, and his seventh in a row. Trailing 2-1, the Tigers pounced on the Senators' Roger Wolff for a pair of markers in the fifth frame and added two more later. Detroit now holds a one-game lead over the Yankees.

Sig Jakucki handcuffed the New Yorkers for five frames and then coasted to an easy win as his mates pounded Starter Joe Page and Steve Roser for six hits in the fifth. Vernon Stephens helped with his 13th round tripper.

The World Champion St.

Louis Cardinals narrowed the breach between themselves and the league leading Brooklyn Dodgers by defeating the Philadelphia Phillies 6-1 as the Dodgers were losing to Chicago's Cubs 11-9. Ken Burkhardt registered his eighth triumph in limiting the Phils to six hits while the Cards hammered Bill Lee for five runs in one big inning.

Pitcher Nick Strincevich and Outfielder Al Giolfriddo combined to defeat the Giants for Pittsburgh, 3-1. Strincevich allowed only seven hits and was prevented from hurling a shut-out by Nap Reyes fourth homer. Giolfriddo had a perfect four for four, driving in a run and scoring another.

Chuck Workman's homer with one on and two out in the ninth enabled the Boston Braves to defeat the Cincinnati Reds 7-6. Jim Tobin helped his own cause with a two-run homer, his third, in the fourth inning. Tommy Holmes of the Braves hit safely in his 24th consecutive game.

Grudge Tiff Set On Mat Card Tonight

A fight to the death will take place tonight at the Klamath Falls arena when George Wagner takes on Antone Leone in a grudge tiff. This will be the main event and the rivalry grew out of an incident which occurred last week when Leone framed Wagner over the head with a ring stool.

McSpaden, who sank a 40-foot putt on the last hole to tie Lt. Ben Hogan and then beat out the air forces officer in a playoff last year, had a much more formidable field to compete against this year in the 72-hole tournament.

Nelson Top Threat
There was Byron Nelson of Toledo, O., leading money winner among the pros last winter; Abe Espinosa of Decatur, Ill.; Billy Burke of Chagrin Falls, O.; Johnny Bulla of Atlanta, Ga.; Joe Kirkwood, the trick shot artist from Abington, Pa.; Craig Wood of Mamaronock, N. Y.; Jimmy Hines of Chicago; Sammy Byrd, the former major league baseball player from Detroit; Tony Penna of Dayton, O.; Jimmy Thomson of New York; Ralph Guldahl of Chicago; Johnny Revolta of Evanston, Ill.; and Ky Laffoon of Chicago.

Poor Fishing Outlook Seen Over Weekend

PORTLAND, June 29 (AP)—The state game commission recommended a few scattered spots for fishermen this weekend, but the angling outlook in general was dismal.

Reports from most streams came in stamped "fair to poor." Mountain lakes in Wallowa county, where angling conditions improved, are still inaccessible because of snow.

Recommended fishing sites: Coos county—Ten mile lakes for trolling; Coos bay for striped bass and trolling; Jackson county — Fish lake and Hyatt lake.

Klamath county — Upper Klamath lake for trolling; Klamath river with flies and plugs; Little Deschutes river for bait fishing with worms and fly fishing in evening hours.

Morrow, Wheeler and Gilliam counties—Generally good angling conditions. Lake county—Warner valley district.

Deschutes county—East lake; Wickiup; Upper Deschutes; Elk lake; South lake.

Crook county—Ochoco, Marks and Mill creeks.

Jefferson county — Crooked river, Lower Deschutes river. The Rogue river was reported very poor for salmon fishing.
