George told a reporter any condition written into the ratification resolution could only be regarded by other nations as an indirect amendment of the charter. He expressed fear that such a move would spawn similar proposals by many of the signatory powers.

ment officials told them unless the stoppage was ended the inevitable results will be to condemn countless American soldiers, sailors and flyers to death.
In an appeal to the rubber strikers, Acting Secretary of War Patterson and Assistant Secretary of the Navy H. Struve Hensel said unless they resumed production, "we shall have to reduce the force of our aerial offensive against the Japanese home islands and postpone military operations essential to the defeat of Japan."

AMENDMENT of the charter. That, he adds, might easily start a landslide of similar amendments.
Under a landslide of that sort, hope of the beginning of international co-operative action to be or at least limit war MIGHT BE BURIED.

AFTER all, our delegate on the security council can always STOP EVERYTHING by laying back his ears and refusing to go along. That is the idea of ONE-POWER veto.
Before the security council of the "league" or whatever it is to be called can act, either by peaceful means or by actual use of force, to halt an aggressor, the United States, Britain, Russia, China and France, plus two other members of the 11-nation security council, must vote affirmatively. A negative vote by any one of the Big Five will stop all action.
That seems protection enough of our sovereignty.

IF we are going to try to make this thing work, we must go in to it sincerely and wholeheartedly. Hanging back and tacking riders and limiting amendments to the charter will only destroy confidence and start ruckuses.
Ratification should be fully debated in congress. That is OUR way. Rushing the charter through the senate under a gag of debate would be the worst thing that could happen.
But if we've already crossed the bridge, if we're ready to give international co-operation an honest trial, it will help if U. S. ratification can be accomplished without too much delay.

Klamath Indian reservation will be open to travel without permit, but forested areas and side roads are closed to unrestricted travel. Persons having timber or grazing contracts or other bona fide business on the reservation may obtain permit to enter particular units. No permits will be granted for recreation purposes, according to B. G. Courtwright, reservation superintendent. Permits can be obtained from Willis Pankey, Beatty; R. C. Moore, Sprague River, and the Klamath Agency. Campers were reminded they must get permits to build campfires on national forest lands except in designated forest camps.

BONANZA YOUTHS CONFESS THEFTS

Two Bonanza boys, one 15 and the other 16, who were arrested by city police on June 28 transporting stolen articles from Kerns Implement company to their automobile, confessed yesterday to juvenile authorities to having broken into the Ashley Chevrolet company several nights prior to their arrest.

Efforts will be made to recover the cash box, which was valued at \$50, juvenile authorities said this morning.

HIGH SCHOOL BUYS \$40,000 IN BONDS

With money which had accumulated in the reserve building fund, the Klamath Union high school district invested \$40,000 in a 2 1/2 per cent U. S. treasury bond after authority to invest had been granted at a meeting Monday evening.
The reserve building fund was started last year to provide a fund for the postwar period. The plan called for a tax levy on real property extending over five years. The \$40,000 is the accumulation for the first year and by being placed in a 2 1/2 per cent bond will be available whenever the building program is started.

ONE-WAY TRAFFIC SET FOR HOLIDAY

City and state police today requested motorists to observe one-way traffic on S. 6th on July 1-2-3-4. This rule will be in effect from the time the rodeo ends each day until traffic is cleared, Acting Police Chief Orville Hamilton explained.
All incoming traffic will be routed north of S. 6th, he said, and traffic going south will be routed around S. Main and out through Shasta way.
Hamilton also warned equestrians not to ride their horses over private lawns. This is an offense that is punishable by arrest and fine, he stated. He said that some cases of damage to lawns have been reported to the city police department and that arrests for this offense will be made.

MARINE INJURED IN AUTO CRASH

PFC Jesse Hankins, USMC, residing at the White Pines apartments, suffered a cut face and numerous scratches yesterday afternoon when he was involved in an automobile accident on E. Main. Hankins was taken to the Klamath Medical clinic where his injuries were treated.
He was arrested for reckless driving and pleaded guilty to the charge in police court this morning. Police Judge Harold Franey set Monday at 4 p. m. as time for passing sentence.
According to the police report on the case, Arlin Tackett, Mars hotel, was driving a truck south on E. Main and attempted to make a left turn at Oak and E. Main when the car driven by Hankins struck the front of the truck while traveling at a high rate of speed.
Hankins' car skidded down the street sideways, struck a light pole, and bounced 14 feet back into the street. The car was said to be a total loss.
Hankins is in Klamath Falls on furlough, police said.

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County Authorizes \$50,000 War Bond
