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EX-HUNGARIAN LAND CEDED TO RUSSIANS

MOSCOW, June 30 (AP)—Maps published today in connection with the cession of the Carpatho-Ukraine to the soviet union showed the territory being transferred includes the old Hungarian city of Csep and other land formerly considered part of Hungary.

Through the new Russian-Czechoslovak treaty, expected to be ratified quickly, the soviet Ukraine acquires a common frontier with Hungary. The Carpatho-Ukraine, about four times the size of Rhode Island, was once part of the Austria-Hungary empire and went to Czechoslovakia after the last war. Csep is south of the Carpatho-Ukraine and is an important Carpathian mountain communication center, with four railways and one highway.

Maps showed the new soviet boundary would swing south-eastward from Csep, passing four miles south of the city of Beregovo to a point six miles north of the Hungarian city of Satu-Mare, then northeastward to a point five miles south of Huszt, then along the outskirts of the town of Tachevo. The agreement was signed last night at the Kremlin by Soviet Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav M. Molotov and Czech Prime Minister Zdenek Fierlinger.

Under the agreement a repatriation plan will be set up between Slovakia and the soviet union on one hand and the Carpatho-Ukraine and the soviet union on the other.

Persons of Ukrainian or Russian blood now living in Slovakia may apply before January 1, 1946, for soviet citizenship and persons of Slovak or Czech blood living in the Carpatho-Ukraine may apply for Czechoslovakian citizenship. A soviet encyclopedia estimated that in 1936, persons of Ukrainian blood comprised 65 per cent of the population of the Carpatho-Ukraine. Ukrainian is the principal language. Another 15 per cent of the population is Hungarian.

Obtaining DDT Sought In Portland

PORTLAND, June 30 (AP)—Possibility of obtaining the miracle insecticide DDT to fight swarms of mosquitoes here was announced today by Commissioner Dorothy McCollough Lee. She said only the federal health bureau can release enough DDT to squelch the pest because of danger if inexperienced persons use the spray. H. J. Dodge, federal public health service field representative, will visit Portland Monday, then make a recommendation to San Francisco regional headquarters.
