BRYANT AWARDED
PFC Odell Bryant, route 3, Klamath Falls, has been awarded the Combat Infantryman badge for conspicuous achievements against the enemy in Germany. He is in the 38th Infantry Regiment, 2nd division.

MOULTON GETS STAR
M/Sgt. Leo R. Moulton, 96th Infantry division, has received the Bronze Star for meritorious achievement in connection with operations against the enemy on Leyte and Okinawa, from February 1 to May 25, 1945. He has been in the service four years. He is a brother of Mrs. Edward Scoggins, 3203 Boardman avenue, Klamath Falls.

BROTHERS SERVE
Two brothers from Klamath Falls are serving in two different theaters of war. They are PFC Louis K. Porter, United States Marine Corps, and Cpl. Warren H. Porter, who is with the 89th Infantry service division of the U. S. Army under General Patton in Germany. Both graduated from Klamath Union high school, these boys are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Louis K. Porter Sr., former residents of Klamath Falls, now of Portland.
After 13 major battles in the South Pacific, PFC Louis Porter has reported to Camp Shoemaker in Oakland, California. Warren has a wife and young son residing in Salem.

TWO MEDALS
Two combat decorations for valor in action on Saipan—the Silver Star and Bronze Star—have been presented Marine Platoon Sergeant George C. Davies of Riverside, the Marine Corps announced today. Davies, an artilleryman, earned his Bronze Star on the night of June 20-21, 1944, when he single-handedly tried to salvage precious ammunition from a burning dump. It was near the end of the campaign, on July 7, that the 29-year-old leatherneck earned his Silver Star. When a group of Marines were isolated and facing annihilation during a Jap attack, Davies carried machine guns and ammunition to them, directed their fire against the oncoming Japs and finally beat off the attack. Presentation of the awards was made by Col. George Van Orden, commanding officer of the Marine Barracks where Davies now is stationed.

HOSFORD DISCHARGED
On June 10, Cpl. Don E. Hosford was discharged from the United States Army under the new point release system. He is a former resident of Klamath Falls, and attended Klamath Union high school. He enlisted in September 10, 1940, and served for 32 months in Alaska, returning to this country in January of 1944. He was stationed at Camp Gruber in Alabama, and transferred to Fort Lewis, Wash., for discharge.
At the time of his enlistment, he resided with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Epoch of 3520 Anderson avenue.

ABOARD CRUISER
Gene Mitchell EM 3/c, somewhere in the Western Pacific, is among the crew who is fighting Japs and buying war bonds with its navy pay. Gene is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Waldrip, Tulelake, Calif.

RICHARDS ASSIGNED
ASHEVILLE, N. C.—Lt. Ralph W. Richards has been assigned to headquarters of the AAF weather wing to pilot personnel of the wing on official missions throughout the United States, wing headquarters announced today.
Lt. Richards, whose wife, Doris Hamilton Richards, lives in Klamath Falls, spent 15 months as a pilot in the Aleutian Islands before returning to the States to be an instructor. He came to Asheville from Turner field, Albany, Ga.
Prior to entering the service, Lt. Richards was a pre-medical student at Pasadena, Calif. junior college.

ULRICH IN BATTLE
Lt. (jg) Rowland L. Ulrich, 33, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. George C. Ulrich of 628 Conger avenue in Klamath Falls, helped to take a destroyer into the battle of Okinawa. From March 12 to April 27, the destroyer helped to blast the Japs at Okinawa, and also participated in the bombardment of Minami Daito on April 21.
Crew members aboard the destroyer wear the American and Asiatic-Pacific theater ribbons and the Philippine Liberation ribbon with the Bronze Star. During battle, Ulrich serves in the main radio room.

VAN METER ON OKINAWA
MALIN—Cpl. Ray Van Meter, formerly of Malin, serving with the 6th Marine Division, is now on Okinawa, according to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Van Meter, Malin. He served at Sitka for 19 months, and has been in the service since early in the

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war. His wife and 3-month-old son, Jimmie, whom he has never seen, also reside here.
His brother, Cpl. John Van Meter, is serving with the 1st armored division in Germany and writes that he hopes to remain in the service with the army of occupation.

ECLES PROMOTED
Sgt. Ivan E. Eccles of the 45th tank battalion in the European theater of operations has received a promotion to the rank of staff sergeant, according to word received here by his wife, Shirley J. Eccles of 2135 Holabird street.
He has participated in campaigns in the elimination of the Ruhr pocket and the Danube river push, and is attached to the 13th armored division as a mortar platoon sergeant.

RHOADS ENDS TRAINING
Doran Curtis Rhoads, S 1/c, United States Navy, has completed training at the school for aviation machinists mates at the naval air technical training center at Norman, Okla. He will now be transferred to a naval unit afloat or to another shore station for further instruction and work. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Rhoads of 524 Grant street, and the husband of Katherine H. Rhoads of Norman, Okla.
Rhoads enlisted in September, 1944, entering the NATTC in January of this year and graduating on June 16. Prior to entering the service he was employed as an aircraft mechanic.

KLAMATH MEN PARADE
Four Klamath Falls men helped their battalion celebrate its third birthday by participating in a parade in Halle, Germany, June 1. They are PFC John M. Fay of S. 6th; PFC Albert E. Glynn of 915 Addison; Sgt. Maxwell S. Hargrove of 1932 Summers lane, and James W. Overturf, also of this city.
The 817th tank destroyer battalion, of which they are members, has served in France, Belgium and Germany since August 22. It took part in the Hurtgen forest fighting, and in the campaigns that carried the Americans across Germany and to a junction with the Russians.

LINZI RETURNS
Cpl. A. L. (Pat) Linzi has returned to this country after almost 2 1/2 years in the Pacific theater of war. He was wounded on Iwo Jima in March of this year, and was awarded the Purple Heart. The son of Ione Linzi of 4230 Austin, Linzi is in a naval hospital in Oakland, Calif.

PROMOTED IN FIELD
Word has been received by Charles E. Shotts of Gilchrist, that his son, Charles F. Shotts, has received a battlefield promotion from T/Sgt. to 2nd Lt. He is the platoon leader of the 416th Infantry in the European theater of operations, and has participated in campaigns in northern France and Germany. He is the holder of the Silver Star, the Certificate of Merit and the Combat Infantryman's badge.

PETTY IN BATTLE
Cpl. Evan R. Petty of 1346 Lakeview street was with the 127th field artillery battalion in Germany when its artillery assault which preceded the 9th army's mass drive across the Rhine river, helped soften up enemy defenses all along the east bank of the Rhine. Men of B battery, firing one round per minute for one period of 60 consecutive minutes, worked their howitzers until the barrels became so hot that it was necessary to pour cold water on them after each round.

UERLINGS IN TEXAS
Capt. George R. Uerlings, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Uerlings of 517 1/2 N. 4th, is now serving with the AAF training command at Sheppard field, Tex.
Uerlings entered the service in December, 1941, and received his commission in March, 1943. He served for 17 months in the China-Burma-India theater as a member of the 71st squadron,

1st liaison group in the 10th air force. He holds the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf cluster.
Prior to his assignment to Sheppard field, he was stationed at headquarters AAF WFTC at Santa Ana, Calif.

"After a year in various islands of the South Pacific," Gene says, "we finally met and are stationed together. Although both of us are in the anti-aircraft we are in different outfits. We were both on New Caledonia and Guadalcanal at different times, then Gordon went to Sterling island in the Treasury group before coming to New Guinea."
PFC Gordon McKay is a gunner on a 40 MM gun crew and Gene is a radio operator.
Gene's twin brother, Dean, is with the military police stationed at Camp White.

BARKER REPORTS
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BORTIS HOME
S/Sgt. Rodney D. Bortis, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Bortis, 640 Roseway drive, is home on a 60-day furlough. Sgt. Bortis spent six months in a German

prison camp. He jumped from a crippled B-24 and landed in the Ruhr valley. His chute caught in a tree where he hung for an hour and a half.
"An elderly German climbed up and handed me a knife," said Bortis. "I cut my harness and came down a little tree. I was immediately picked up by the military and hustled off to jail. They later took me to Frankfurt and then to a prison camp, later moving me to another camp. I was liberated by the 7th army."
Sgt. Bortis paid tribute to the Red Cross for getting parcels into the men in the prison camp.

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CARSTENSEN GRADUATED
