MILITARY IMPACT FORECAST ON COAST

GIRL WOUNDED IN SILVERTON SHOOTING CASE

SILVERTON, July 2 (AP)—Investigation of the shooting of a 7-year-old Silvertown girl, arm injuries sustained by a brother and questioning of another brother and sister is underway with the arrival of Marion County District Attorney Miller B. Hayden and Sheriff Denver Young.

Marlene Thomas, the 7-year-old, is in a hospital and in serious condition from a bullet wound in the abdomen. She was shot with a .22 calibre rifle. Her brother, David, 12, has a severely gashed arm with broken glass, he having attempted to jump from a window.

The shooting occurred late Sunday while the parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Thomas, were at work in a Portland shipyard.

Two older children, Harold, 15, and Rosemary, 13, were in the room at the time of the shooting, but neither would talk.

Neighbors found the four children in the house with three guns on the table. The neighbors ran to the house when they heard the broken glass fall from the window.

The only officer available was Jess Barker, city policeman. State police had not been notified until 10:30 a. m. today when a newspaper told them about it. The sheriff was advised at the same time.
