The hall was opened to the families of the men as a special Fourth of July holiday treat.

Just to show how well the visitors were treated, here is the menu of the excellent chow provided Wednesday:

Turkey consommé with crackers, three kinds of olives, mixed sweet pickles, cranberry sauce, roast tom turkey with sage dressing, snow-flaked potatoes, giblet gravy, buttered spaghetti, buttered corn, lettuce hearts with Russian dressing, stuffed celery, hot rolls, butter, iced lemonade, ice cream, pumpkin pie, fresh apples and oranges, mixed nuts and mixed candies. As an added treat there was a bottle of beer and a pack of cigarettes at each place.

The meal was prepared by marine cooks under the direction of Post Mess Officer E. Andreas, Post Mess Sergeant M. R. Strickland, and Mess Sergeants R. E. Drennen and L. D. Bearden.

## VOTERS REMOVED FROM COUNTY LIST

According to a report from the county clerk's office, 4857 registered electors have been cancelled due to failure to vote in either the May or November, 1944 elections.

Notices were mailed by the county clerk's office to the address given on the registration card and 4857 were returned unclaimed by various post offices.

A total of 260 were listed as deceased and were automatically cancelled.

According to the May list of registered voters, there were 20,837 in Klamath county and the cancellations leave 15,720 registered voters in this county.

## HEAVY TRAVEL TO PARK REPORTED

Motor travel to Crater Lake national park was heavier on the Fourth of July than it has been at any other time during the war, according to E. P. Leavitt, park superintendent.

A total of 375 cars and 1787 passengers viewed the lake, most of the visitors being from out of the state.

The road around the rim and out the north entrance is not yet cleared of snow, which still lies in 30-foot drifts in some places. However, this road will probably be opened within the next week.

Prospective visitors are reminded that there are no lodging, meals, or gasoline service available in the park.

## LOGGER HELD ON SODOMY CHARGE

Jessie Ellis, 61, a logger residing at the Klamath annex, 223 S. 6th, is being held in the county jail charged with sodomy.

Ellis was arrested by city police Monday morning at 410 Oak where he was allegedly attacking a four-year-old boy, whose mother rushed to the boy's assistance and held the man until police arrived.

Ellis was arrested and charged with drunkenness, later a charge of sodomy was brought against him by the district attorney's office and he has been transferred to the county jail.

Ellis waived preliminary hearing in justice court Tuesday and was committed to the county jail in lieu of \$5000 bail.
