

CANUCKS RIOT AFTER DELAY IN SHIPPING

ALDERSHOT, England, July 4 (AP)—High army officials said today that upwards of 40 men were involved in a smashing of store windows and other property destruction in a two and one-half hour demonstration last night by hundreds of Canadian servicemen awaiting transportation home.

Damage to the shopping district, which was littered with broken glass and debris, was estimated at several thousand pounds.

Maj. Gen. Dan Spry reprimanded the soldiers this morning for the "schoolboy action" of "20 or 30" of their number. He said it was the sort of thing to "undermine the good reputation Canadians built up on the battlefield."

Spry told the men he understood they had three main complaints—lack of shipping which was delaying repatriation of troops, inadequate food and a delay in pay.

He acknowledged that they had no money left when they found their sailings delayed and promised they would be able to draw more money later today. He explained reasons for the lack of shipping, and said they were receiving far more food than British civilians.

Apparently no one was injured in the outbreak. There was no drunkenness. More than 200 British and Canadian provost reinforcements were rushed to the business district, but were not used.

CLIFF PHILLIPS RATES DISCHARGE

After 32 months overseas as Sgt. Cliff Phillips finds it hard to believe that he is actually home. Phillips, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Phillips of 1943 Gary, has been discharged with a total of 127 points after taking part in the African invasion, the Sicilian campaign, and the fighting on Anzio beach in Italy. With his division he traveled the "road to Rome," went through the invasion of Southern France, fought his way through Germany to Austria where V-E day found him.

In the way of decorations, Cliff has five overseas service stripes, the Croix de Guerre, a Unit Citation, Bronze Star, pre-Pearl Harbor ribbon, Good Conduct ribbon, the Purple Heart, ETO ribbon, and eight battle stars.

While overseas he was wounded twice although the second time he was not hospitalized. It took him 2 1/2 months in the hospital to get over a leg wound.

Between battles Cliff paused long enough to pick up a few souvenirs. He has two German pistols, a German sword, swastikas, inflation money, a Hitler Youth knife, and a complete SS trooper's uniform.

Before going into the army in 1941 Cliff attended KUHS, later working at Kesterson's mill. Although his immediate plans include mostly fishing, he hopes to take advantage of a trade school under the GI bill of rights.

Applications To Increase Slaughter Quotas Reported

PORTLAND, July 5 (AP)—Applications to increase lamb slaughter quotas are piling into OPA headquarters here and meat rationing agent John D. Ferris reported about 20 requests already approved.

Others will be approved as rapidly as possible to assist Oregon slaughterers to begin moving lamb to market, he said.

He said applications now processed are for plants in Portland, Albany, Salem, Lebanon, Coquille, Coos Bay, McMinnville and Hubbard.

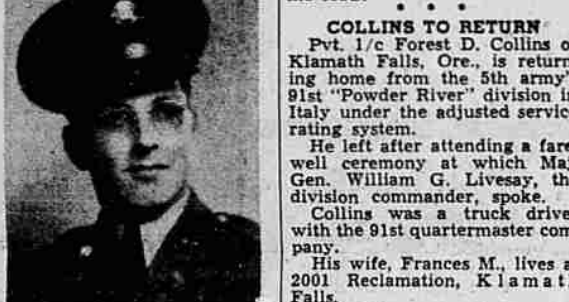


On June 23, the presentation of the Air Medal was made to Lt. (jg) Earl Lee Archer (right), 23, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Archer Sr., of Hope, Ark. At present, he is serving in a bombing fighter squadron of the Pacific fleet, now temporarily shore based for training at the Klamath naval air station. He has seen service in the campaigns for the Marshall islands, the Marianas, Palau and the second battle for the Philippines. The award was made to Lt. Archer for distinguishing himself by meritorious action while participating in aerial flights against major Japanese fleet units. The text of the citation reads: "... While serving aboard an escort carrier, he made an attack on an enemy warship, scoring ... hits. Realizing the desperate need to prevent these ships from closing and destroying our own unprotected vessels, Lt. (jg) Archer continued his attack, in the face of devastating anti-aircraft fire, scoring ... hits on another vessel. By this action, he inflicted damage on the enemy, and at the same time, diverted anti-aircraft fire from other attacking planes ... thus materially assisting in saving our own forces from destruction."

VETS' STORY DENIED BY PATTERSON

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—Under Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson said today the story that German prisoners of war rode Pullmans while returned American veterans were jammed into day coaches is only half true.

Patterson confirmed that 500 veterans had poor accommodations for a trip from Boston to San Francisco, but their complaint that they saw German prisoners in Pullman coaches "is not true," Patterson told a news conference.

The American veterans arrived at Camp Beale, near Marysville, Calif., Tuesday in eight counter-type day coaches. One of the cars had this sign in chalk on its side:

"We get back from England and we have to ride all the way to California in a chair car while the German P. W.'s ride in Pullmans. Now is that fair? We ask you."

Patterson said that the inconveniences for the soldiers "were true and regrettable and this is not the only case that's happened."

He emphasized that no German prisoners travel in Pullmans except in unusual cases where medical authorities recommend it.

"Although some bogus gasoline stamps have been turned in the past year," G. M. Hafenbrack, district OPA banking official, said, "these are the first meat stamp counterfeits to appear in the district."

Cecelia P. Gallagher, OPA food attorney, said several suspected coupons found in Vancouver, Wash., have been forwarded to San Francisco for checking.

TRUMAN SIGNS BILL FOR INTERIOR FUNDS

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—The White House disclosed yesterday President Truman had signed the interior department's annual appropriation bill, which calls for \$27,056,500 for construction of reclamation projects in the west.

Biggest allotment was \$6,000,000 for the Columbia basin project. The Yakima, Wash., project got \$325,000; Deschutes, Ore., \$450,000. In addition,

these sums were made available for maintenance and operation of existing projects: Owyhee Ore., \$200,000; Klamath, Ore., Calif., \$121,000; Yakima, Wash., \$268,500.
