MARINE HURT IN FIGHT ON MAG'S MERITS

Cpl. Stanley G. Leary, marine stationed at the Marine Barracks here, sustained a severely lacerated right arm at about 1:10 a. m. Wednesday night in fight of Max's Coffee shop on Main.

Stories of witnesses concerning the case are varied, but as near as can be ascertained by the provost marshal's office, Leary was slashed across the arm with a sharp instrument.

According to the report, Leary and a navy chief were sitting at the counter in Max's, E. P. Kelly and his wife of Los Angeles, Calif., were also at the counter with a man named Erickson residing at the Riverside Auto camp.

A discussion arose between the chief and Leary over the merits of Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur. Kelly entered in the conversation unasked and then walked out to his car at the curb. Leary followed out the door after him and Kelly struck him with his fist. Kelly then walked to the curb and turned and threatened to shoot Leary.

The marine walked toward Kelly who jumped into his car and began to roll up the window. Leary first tried to reach in and then drew back and smashed the window with his fist.

At this time his arm was severely cut and the nature of the wound was not the type of cut that would come from broken glass, according to the provost marshal's questioning of witnesses and expert medical examination of the slash.

Military and city police were called to the scene and Leary was immediately taken to the Barracks for medical treatment. Kelly was taken to the police station and questioned by city police but was later released.

No knife was found on Kelly, although conflicting reports point to the fact that he was in close conversation with Erickson before police arrived and it is known that Erickson immediately left the scene upon arrival of police officers. Erickson could not be found by the provost marshal's office for questioning and Kelly has left town.

Leary's condition is said to be improved but the provost marshal will further investigate the case.
