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were hammering Japan and sinking seven small vessels around the island. Australian troops completed the conquest of Balikpapan, Borneo's leading refinery city, captured the Mangar bomber field, and drove over mined and booby-trapped coastal highways toward the rich Samarinda oil field. Retreating Japanese were following the same scorched earth policy as the Dutch when they yielded Borneo's oil resources.

The shift of the fifth air force from the Philippines to the attack on Japan was announced today (Manila time) by Gen. Douglas MacArthur and his air chief, Gen. George C. Kenney. It was the first step of MacArthur's forces northward from the Philippines toward Japan.

Thirty-six hours after they arrived at Okinawa, the 35th fighter group of the fifth air force hit six cities on western Kyushu island of southern Japan. "This is just the start," Kenney said.

The fifth air force joined the 20th (Superfortress) air force, the seventh air force, two fleet air wings and the second marine aircraft wing in hitting the enemy homeland. Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle's eighth air force will soon augment these.

U. S. May Keep Bases In Europe

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—A senate committee held out the possibility today of this country maintaining permanent military bases on the European continent.

A report of the senate's war investigating committee said today proper utilization of 370 United States air bases together with other war installations in Europe may hold the answer to "our future security and the prosperity of our international commerce."

"It was also testified by these (seventh army) officers that on some occasions decisions to refrain from attacking were predicated on an insufficiency of artillery ammunition to sustain the particular attacks," the committee stated.

Misconception It said there had been "a general misconception" at home that the fault was due to a failure on the part of the plants producing the ammunition. Saying this was entirely untrue, the committee laid the whole blame to a "failure to plan procurement for sufficient quantities of the desired types of ammunition in time to obtain them."

While reporting that "as a whole, the colossal task of supplying our victorious troops was a tremendous success," the committee called for an overhaul of the procurement system to reflect more rapidly changes in requirements.

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given them under lend-lease to later in fighting among themselves.

"So far as the committee was able to find out," it said, "no one has even given any thought to the exploitation of this source for filling the requirements of the Pacific war."

No Agreements "So far as the committee was able to learn there is no agreement as between the allied armies for pooling captured equipment and using it in the Pacific theater. Each of the allies seems to be operating on the theory that it is the sole owner of the supplies it has captured."

The committee sharply criticized "a tendency of many to treat lend-lease accounting as a matter of little consequence on the theory that lend-lease accounts would never be settled."

It said the state department had "anything but a championing of United States interests" in mind in instructing Great Britain "not to give itemized invoices" of reverse lend-lease charges.

PORTLAND, July 6 (AP)—Despite an increase in Oregon's E bonds sales, efforts will still have to be intensified to sell the \$5,500,000 missing toward quota before Monday's deadline, State Chairman E. C. Sammons said today.

Yesterday's E sales of \$1,772,288 brought the cumulative total to \$49,355,735. All-series sales were \$21,551,516, bringing the total to \$192,971,163.

Bond sales must be processed through the Portland federal reserve bank by 3 p. m. Monday to count in the drive.

Interstate Shipping Of Lamb Requested

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6 (AP)—A request to allow movement of lamb killed by Oregon class 2 slaughterers through interstate commerce has been sent to the new secretary of agriculture.

In another effort to facilitate disposal of 150,000 soft lambs scheduled for market soon, Edwin L. Peterson, director of the Oregon department of agriculture, telegraphed the appeal.

The district OPA already has announced class 2 houses can boost their quotas.

Funeral Services Set For Mrs. Maplesden

Funeral services for Mrs. L. D. Maplesden of Talent, who died of injuries received in a fall from a horse, will be held in Ashland Saturday at 2 p. m., followed by graveside services in Hornbrook.

Mrs. Maplesden was the former Patty Franklin of Klamath Falls. She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. P. Franklin, two sisters and one brother, all of Talent, and her husband, who has been serving in the armed forces in Germany and is on his way home from overseas.

Families May Join Troops

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—Civilian dependents of overseas servicemen could join them in any part of the world except in cases incompatible with military requirements under a bill introduced today by Rep. Fulton (R-Pa.).

Fulton proposed surveys be made of transportation facilities, living accommodations, food supplies and other facilities for the civilians in the "various theaters, bases or commands outside of the continental United States" as the first step in putting the program into operation.

Basement Fire in Hospital Reported

FUEBLO, Colo., July 6 (AP)—Approximately 60 patients, including crippled children, were removed from an old section of St. Mary's hospital today after a basement fire sent choking smoke through the four-story brick structure.

Many women patients became hysterical and two elderly men fainted as firemen and police, hampered by the dense smoke, carried them outside. No one was reported seriously injured and all the patients later were returned to their rooms.

Fire Chief J. J. Fitzpatrick said the fire started from spontaneous combustion among empty egg crates in the basement. No damage estimate was made.

ANOPHELES MOSQUITO SURVEY SCHEDULED VANCOUVER, Wash., July 6 (AP)—A survey to determine whether the Anopheles mosquito may now be carrying malaria in this area will be made here by a U. S. entomologist at city-county request.

A 1943 inspection indicated no danger of malaria here.

EXACT ACCOUNTING OF FUNDS ORDERED

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—President Truman ordered all government officials today to make a "most exacting review" of spending in their departments.

He demanded prompt investigation of "every instance where there is the slightest ground to suspect either misuse or careless handling of government funds."

At the same time he noted that there has been practically no evidence of financial abuse and urged that "this good record shall be preserved."

But he told his administration heads they must use "vigorous disciplinary action" in any instances of mishandling of government funds.

The White House gave no intimation of what prompted the memorandum which was distributed to the heads of all departments and agencies.

Fake Discharges Sold In Plot

HEMPSTEAD, N. Y., July 6 (AP)—Existence of a "complex, organized racket" whereby soldiers obtained "fraudulent medical discharges" and transfers from "hot outfits" due for combat duty was announced today by the first air force.

Fee for discharges was "several thousand dollars" and somewhat less for transfer to safe, secure branches of the army, the air force public relations office said in announcing results of an investigation begun last April into "irregularities" at Mitchell field here.

The air force said the recent court martial of Maj. Walter V. Radovich charged with accepting bribes to keep two enlisted men in safe jobs "is not in any way connected with the present investigation."

BARRACKS BABY

TAMPA, Fla., July 6 (AP)—A new negro recruit brought his 2-year-old child along to Drew field—and kept it in his barracks for five days.

His buddies took turns caring for the child, but when the anti-nursing squad was called out together the youngster set up such a howl an officer investigated.

Allies Agree On Collective Trial

LONDON, July 6 (AP)—Justice Robert H. Jackson said today that the four major allied powers had agreed in principle on the American plan for the collective trial of major war criminals before an international military tribunal.

As chief prosecutor for the United States, Jackson told the Association of American Correspondents in London that there remained a number of questions of procedure to be worked out among the United States, Britain, France and Russia, including that of reconciling the trial methods of the various countries. He reiterated his hope that the trial itself could get underway by late summer.

Claims Victory The Conservative Daily Express said "most cautious" estimates gave a majority of 80 to 90 seats "for the government."

At the time of dissolution the conservative party had 358 of the 615 seats in commons but with allied parties it had a working majority of nearly 200 seats. With 840 seats in the new commons it will take 321 for a party or bloc to have a majority.
