

Loren Main After State Net Honors

PORTLAND, Ore., July 7 (AP)—Loren Main, 14-year-old two-handed swatter from Vancouver, B. C., who kept net fans agog yesterday by winning four matches, was to vie for the boys' singles and junior men's titles today in the Oregon tennis championships.

Tom MacDonald is his opponent in the boys' division and Bill Drummond in junior men's. The little Canadian played 106 games yesterday, stacking up this list of victims: Frank Watt, 6-1, 6-0; Bill Sparling, 6-3, 7-9, 6-4; John Du Priest, 6-3, 8-4, and in doubles teamed with Mel Hynes, against Tom MacDonald and John Hubbard, 8-10, 6-3, 7-5.

Drummond teamed with Dave McLaughlin to defeat the fourth seeded men's duo, Henry Neer, Spokane, and Joy Williams, 6-1, 8-6.

Gladys Ross, Seattle, and Arvilla McGuire, Berkeley, were to play in junior women's finals today. Miss Ross whitewashed Dolores Abeta, 6-0, 6-0 while Miss McGuire topped Marilyn Janek, 6-1, 6-1.

Semi-finals in the men's singles today will see Clint Knox clash with Mel Dranga, Seattle, and Bill Davis against Neer.

Holmes Hits Safely in 34th Straight Game; Sets New Record; Nats Sweep 2

By JACK HAND (Associated Press Sports Writer) It's a fine how-do-you-do in Flatbush with the Dodgers losing 15-3 and a Brooklyn-born laddie setting new records in Boston.

Tommy Holmes was brought up in the shadow of Ebbets field but he has done his ball playing for the Yankee farm system and the Boston Braves where he hit safely in his 33rd and 34th successive games yesterday to smash Roger Hornsby's old standard, set in 1922.

Holmes, a likable Irishman with a driving will to win, came up in the New York chain in the pre-war days of plenty at the Yankee stadium and was sold by the Newark farm to Boston. There he blossomed out as an established big leaguer and now has come into his own as a hitting sensation.

Holmes Outstanding

Although Holmes still is 22 short of Joe DiMaggio's mark of 56 set in 1941, his feat of hitting safely in 34 successive contests, at a 438 pace, lifting his season mark to 407 and leading four individual departments and tied for a fifth is by far the standout individual job of the campaign.

It must have been the Holmes inspiration that pulled the Braves out of a losing slump that began with a 2-2 pasting by Chicago, for Boston twice whipped Pittsburgh, 13-5 and 14-8, as the left-handed hitting outfielder topped Hornsby's mark.

Chicago and St. Louis continued to make the big noise in the National, the Cubs rambling over the Phillies twice 11-3 and 5-1 and the Cards thumping the Brooks, 15-3. The composite result finds the Dodgers' lead sliced to a single game over the Bruins with the Red Birds only one and a half off the pace.

Cubs Extend Win Streak

The Cubs ran their win streak to seven and made it 10 of 13 since leaving Wrigley field to tour the east as Paul Derringer and Relieff Ray Prim got the credit.

Blix Donnelly handcuffed the Brooks without too much trouble to the dismay of 30,254. The Red Birds lashed Vic Lombardi and three successors for 19 hits.

Cincinnati eased out the New York Giants, 3-2, behind Howard Fox to hand Van Mungo his fourth loss.

New York took a fall out of the first-place Detroit Tigers, 5-4, with Oscar Grimes doing most of the hitting and Floyd Bevens doing all of the pitching for his eighth success.

Nats Sweep Doubleheader

Washington opened up on St. Louis to sweep a doubleheader, 6-3 and 5-2, holding second place and moving to within three games of the Tigers. Rick Ferrell established a new American league record by catching his 1722nd game in the opener won by Johnny Niggeling. It was the 16th triumph in the last 20 starts for Ossie Bluege's flaming Nats.

Jim Bagby and Mel Harder buried Cleveland to a double victory over Boston, 3-2 and 4-2 with Allie Reynolds coming in in the ninth of each game to save the bacon.

Jesse Flores edged Thornton Lee, 1-0, in a neat pitching battle for the A's second decision in their last 18 and the White Sox' sixth successive drubbing.

Sacramento also took its fourth decision in five starts from the Seals 7-2 to creep within a game of the O'Doulmen. San Diego's Padres nosed out the Hollywood Stars 5-4 in the loop's other contest.

Beavers Helpless

Portland, which has dropped three of its five clashes with the Oaks, was able to score only one unearned run off the slants of Mitch Chetkovich.
