LOOK for a report on the hotly-discussed Klamath river water diversion proposal in hot August.

It's due in that month, and we anticipate that the report will be pleasing to those of us who vigorously opposed this scheme to divert Klamath water to the Central Valleys area of California.

There's been no official indication of what the army engineers are going to say, but reports trickling from their direction indicate that they will NOT recommend the diversion scheme, but instead will recommend the full development of water resources of the Klamath within the Klamath basin.

The virtually unanimous showing of public opposition to diversion must surely affect the recommendations of the engineers, along with the strong presentation of factual data such as came from the Klamath county chamber of commerce and cooperating organizations, and from other parts of the Klamath drainage basin.

We are not sure the engineers' report will be announced to the public in August, as it may be necessary to send it to army engineer headquarters for release from that point.

But we anticipate the recommendations will be completed in August and that they will be favorable to our viewpoint.

The peak was June 30, when it hit 7,833,000 gallons, but that was an unusual day because the Marine Barracks swimming tank was being filled then and water was also being pumped into the new Melrose reservoir, which has just been completed. But the total has been running around 7,500,000 gallons without these exceptional circumstances. Several years ago, a prominent hydraulic engineer made a study of the Klamath water system and forecast its potentialities. He said that by 1955, it might be necessary to pump 7,500,000 gallons on some days. It's being done in 1945.

Completion of the Melrose reservoir and installation of booster pumps has helped solve pressure problems in some areas of the city. The Shasta way district, in particular, had water pressure trouble for several days in June, but that condition has now been cleared by boosters. A similar method will be used to build up pressure for the Lower Altamont district, which must share its water supply with the Klamath naval air station.

Agencies Change Working Hours

In accordance with the recent federal employ pay act of 1945, a number of federal agencies are changing their working hours to comply with the regulations calling for a 44-hour working week instead of the 48-hour week which has been in effect.

The offices which will close on Saturdays at 12 noon are the farm security administration, the forest service, the employment service, the federal public housing authority, the reclamation service, the selective service board, the soil conservation service. Weekly hours of these agencies will remain the same.
