## Wichita Eagle Editor Dies At Age Of 74

WICHITA, Kas., July 9 (AP)—Victor Murdock, editor-in-chief of the Wichita Eagle, who as a member of congress in the early 1900s helped to restrict the speaker's rule of the house of representatives, died here yesterday at the age of 74.

He served 12 years in congress, from 1903. Murdock was appointed to the federal trade commission by President Woodrow Wilson in 1917 and served with that agency seven years, resigning to return as editor of the Eagle.

He is survived by his brother, Marcellus M. Murdock, publisher of the Eagle, and two daughters, Mrs. Howard Fleeson, Wichita, and Mrs. Harvey Delano, San Francisco.

## GIRL BREAKS PELVIS IN HOLIDAY OUTING

Jackie May Murphy, 8-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Murphy of 722 Doty, was seriously injured when she fell under the wheels of a car at Crescent City where she was spending the Fourth of July with her parents. At the time of the accident the car was being driven along the beach by Murphy with Jackie perched on the fender. As the car hit a depression in the beach, Jackie was thrown under the wheels.

Reports received this morning indicate that she is suffering from a broken pelvis bone. She has not yet been placed in a cast because infection has set in. She is being treated at the Knapp hospital in Crescent City.

## NEW LOOKOUT SET UP ON MOUNTAIN

High atop 6700 foot Brown mountain, a new fire finding lookout station is being set up by the U. S. forest service in the Rogue river national forest district.

Accessible only by a three-mile trail up the rocky face of the mountain, fire finding equipment and supplies, including water for the temporary camp, must be dropped by parachute from a plane. Sole communication with the camp will be by radio.

Eugene Pyeat of Klamath Falls, chosen to man the lonely lookout post, will hike in from Lake o' the Woods. He will live in a tent the next few months while fire hazard is at its greatest, and will be on duty continuously.

Supplies and equipment are being dropped today and tomorrow, and the camp will be set up and ready for operation Tuesday night.

This is the first time a lookout has been posted on the crest of Brown mountain, due to the difficulty of getting equipment up its steep sides. The peak, looming up west of Lake o' the Woods, commands a wide view of the surrounding territory.
