### RECORD BLOW AGAINST JAPS MADE FROM AIR

Destruction, Fire Rained On Nip Cities

By LEONARD MILLIMAN Associated Press War Editor Record waves of close to 2000 American planes swept Japan with destruction and fire today in the Pacific war's heaviest blow today in a daring and destructive battle challenge.

most unopposed attack from carrier planes, Superforts and land-based fighters and bombers.

Tokyo Blasted More than 1000 aircraft from a powerful third fleet task force lying southeast of the capital bombed and strafed nearly 88 airbases around Tokyo in a day-long attack—probably just the beginning of a two or three day assault.

Approximately 500 Superforts dumped 3500 tons of fire bombs and high explosives on at least five industrial cities. Tokyo said they hit seven while 17 other B-29s mined coastal waters.

Osaka Raided Japanese broadcast reported 100 Mustang fighters from two Jims raided Osaka and Kobe while 50 bombers and fighters from Okinawa raided Kyushu.

Near Jap Shore Vice Adm. John S. McCain's fast carrier task force moved in so close to the Japanese shore that its 1000 odd planes could well have flown close to 2000 sorties during the day.

Reports for the first half day of the attack, which opened at dawn, carried no word of interception or enemy counterattacks on the fleet. For the first time, Adm. Chester W. Nimitz named some 26 of the ships and admirals participating. It was the first carrier raid on Tokyo in five months.

### Franco-Churchill Meeting Rumored

ST. JEAN DE LUZ, France, July 10 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill's vacation at nearby Hendaye took on a possible diplomatic significance today as reports circulated here that General Franco had crossed the frontier from Spain and conferred with British officials at Boardberry chateau.

(In London a No. 10 Downing street spokesman said "there is no truth whatsoever" to reports that Prime Minister Churchill had held a conference or was planning a conference with Franco.)

### Klamath Bonds Now \$1,571,523

State bond headquarters informed The Herald on News today that Klamath's E bond sales had reached \$1,571,523, and that final returns are not yet in.
