

# CAL-ORE PACK BUILDING BIG TILE ADDITION

TULELAKE — The Cal-Ore Packing company has under construction this week a large hollow tile addition to the warehouse and cold storage plant built at Tulelake two years ago. The addition with a floor space of 80 by 120 feet will be used as a sorting room for potatoes and onions and will be completed in time for use this fall.

The one-story structure is being built on the south end of the building. It will be frost-proof and can be converted into a refrigerator room with minor adjustments.

A. D. Cummins, Klamath Falls contractor, is in charge of the work. The plans call also for installation of electrically operated system in the original building that will speed up handling of products. The main building accommodates 300 carloads of sacked onions or potatoes. The company is bringing in a new type sorter this fall which will be used in connection with a washer which is necessary when potatoes are grown in black loam.

Twenty-five or thirty people will be employed to operate this equipment.

Louie Lyons, member of the firm, announced also the opening of two branch offices of Cal-Ore, one at Bakersfield, where the harvest has been completed, and one in Arizona near Tucson. Paul Dalton, Klamath Falls member of the firm, has just returned from Bakersfield and Dale West of Arizona. Clayton Reber, Malin, is in charge of the Arizona office.

## OWAC Handles Emergency Ambulance Calls In Area

Since the tenth of June until July when the Klamath merchants patrol purchased an ambulance, the Oregon Women's ambulance corps has taken care of all emergency ambulance calls in the territory.

In June, 42 calls were answered by these energetic volunteer workers, who handle welfare cases in the county, service men's dependents and accidents.

The OWAC, organized under the civilian defense council, has held the top record in the state since its inception, for activity, cooperation and passing inspections. State inspections are made every six months by officials from Portland headquarters, when a myrtlewood plaque is presented the platoon with the

top record. The Klamath corps has held the plaque two periods in succession. If their record for the past six months rates the plaque when inspections are completed throughout the state and results are released, they will be allowed to keep it permanently.

All members of the OWAC

are employed in regular business, and many of them are homemakers besides. Their work with the corps is voluntary and unsalaried. They answer calls at all hours. All members have first aid training and work in full cooperation with the doctors.

The OWAC was on duty the full four days of the rodeo with six members present each day. They carry stretchers, administer treatment under doctors' orders and drive the ambulance.
