NUCHOLLS HONORED
ABOARD A LIGHT CRUISER
 IN THE PACIFIC—Sgt. Walter Eugene Nucholls, 1st USNI, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Nucholls, 2434 Orchard, Klamath Falls, having crossed the equator aboard this ship and undergone the customary initiation, may now wear the title of "Full-fledged Shellback."
 Initiation ceremonies for the Ancient Order of Shellbacks were staged by "old salts" of the crew. The colorful celebration was held on the weather deck as this hard-hitting cruiser steamed across the equator.

DODSON PROMOTED
 Last month Sgt. Howard Dodson, who is with Gen. MacArthur's famed "Bushmasters" 138th Infantry in the Philippines, was given the rating of sergeant, and was also awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in a landing operation somewhere in the Philippines.
 Sgt. Dodson has been overseas since December of 1943, and writes:

"I am in a rest camp now and starting on a training schedule. I have a class to teach. We are in the start of the rainy season now, that is one reason we're in camp. It isn't bad at all. We have tents and the camp is fixed up nice."
 "Some of the boys are leaving and some have already left on the new point system. I am glad for them and they are a happy bunch. After 41 months over here, they deserve to be happy."

Dodson is the son of Mrs. Mary Dodson of 8 Main street, this city. His little five-year-old daughter, Ardeh, also resides here. He was formerly employed here by the Kalpine Plywood plant.

WITH THE 24TH INFANTRY (VICTORY) DIVISION ON MINDANAO—The first day of battle for PC James F. Hall of Bly was a pretty busy one. As a patrol of the 21st Infantry regiment, which he had just joined, drove through embattled Mintal near Davao, sudden heavy sniper fire caused Hall to plunge into an abandoned Jap foxhole.
 Soon the firing quieted down and Hall cautiously raised his head above the rim of the foxhole to look for his patrol when a Jap sniper spotted him and his bullet missed Hall by inches.

He heard his squad leader call for him and again he peeped out of his foxhole only to have another bullet hit the spot of the first. Before the sniper could push his bolt home for another shot, Hall sprinted for cover. A few moments later, the officer commanding the patrol pushed through the underbrush and stepped squarely on the legs of the Jap marksman. The officer killed the sniper who had already killed or wounded eight of Hall's buddies.
 Hall, whose wife, Lucille J. Hall, resides at Bly, has killed three Japs.

SMITH HOME
 S/Sgt. Donald (Pat) Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Smith, 331 Jefferson, has arrived home from the South Pacific for a 30-day furlough.
 Pat was ball-gunner on a B-24 named "My Devotion," with the 7th Air Force. He was stationed in the Hawaiian Islands, and completed his mission from the Marianas, participating in the bombing of Iwo Jima.
 He has been awarded the Good Conduct Medal, Air Medal and four Oak Leaf clusters, besides three campaign stars for the Asiatic-

BLEHA RECEIVES CITATION
 M. T/Sgt. Dale J. Bleha, USMCR, has been awarded a citation and air medal for service in the marine air corps in the South Pacific. The action for which he won the citation took place between October 14, 1943 and March 19, 1944 in the Solomons the Bismark archipelago, and New Britain.
 He is now stationed at Atlantic field, Beaufort, N. C. Before entering the service he owned and operated the Pine Street service station. He is the nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bellin of 1342 Sergeant.

MIAMI, Fla.—Flown from overseas in ATC planes, Oregon fighting men are still pouring into air transport command's Miami air field, from which they go to reception centers near their homes for furloughs or discharges.

Latest Oregon air returnees include T/5 Clyde I. Basham, 27, 1034 Main. He has been with an anti aircraft unit with 11 months overseas service terminating in Germany.

AMONG FIRST TO RETURN
MIAMI, Fla.—T/5 Clyde I. Basham of 1034 Main street has returned from 11 months of service overseas. Flown from Germany in an air transport command plane, he is among the first 50,000 men to be returned to the states by plane each month.
 From the Miami army air field, he, along with other Oregon veterans, moves by rail to Camp Blanding, Fla. From there he will go to the reception center nearest Klamath Falls for re-assignment. Basham has been serving in anti-aircraft.

KIMPTON RETURNS
 After being wounded six times in his legs, Pvt. Ford Kimpton has returned to his home at 1904 Orchard for a 30-day furlough. Kimpton, who is in the infantry, was on Okinawa only 13 days before he was hurt. He was taken to the Hawaiian Islands for hospital treatment, and later was moved to McCaw General hospital in Walla Walla.
 Kimpton is the holder of the Purple Heart, the overseas infantry badge, the Good Conduct medal and the Bronze Star.
 Prior to entering the army a year ago, Kimpton worked at Sears and Roebuck for five years. He took his basic training at Camp Roberts, Calif.

BEGINS TRAINING
CAMP WALTERS—Pvt. Warren Alden Ware of Rt. 3, Box 228, Klamath Falls, has arrived at this infantry replacement training center to begin his basic training as an infantryman. He has been assigned to a battalion stressing specialist training.

How to make a meal with tasty sandwiches

By using a filling of meat and/or vegetables between slices of bread a sandwich becomes a well-balanced plate that will satisfy the sharpest appetite. May we suggest by way of a delicious, out-of-the-ordinary dish . . .

BAKED LUNCHEON SANDWICH

8 slices bread 2 tbsps. shortening
 1/2 lb. sliced American 2 tbsps. all-purpose flour
 cheese 1 cup milk
 1 tsp. prepared mustard 1/4 tsp. salt
 3 tbsps. chili sauce

Toast bread. Place cheese slices on four slices of the toast and spread with mustard. Top with remaining toast and cut in halves lengthwise. Place in well-greased square baking pan (8x8x2). Make white sauce: Melt shortening, blend in flour. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Cook until thickened, about 5 minutes. Add salt and chili sauce. Pour over cheese sandwiches. Bake in moderate oven (350° F) 15 minutes. Serve hot.

SAUTED SUPPER SANDWICH

Serve with green salad

1 cup ground bologna 1/4 cup finely chopped celery
 or luncheon 1/4 cup mayonnaise
 1 1/2 tbsps. finely chopped onion or salad dressing
 1 1/2 tbsps. prepared mustard 12 slices bread
 2 eggs 2 tbsps. milk
 1 1/2 tbsps. lemon juice 1/4 tsp. salt
 1 hard cooked egg

Mix bologna or luncheon, onion, mustard, lemon juice, chopped egg, celery and mayonnaise or salad dressing together. Spread generously between slices of bread; cut in half diagonally. Dip sandwiches in beaten egg mixed with milk and salt; saute in hot melted shortening or drippings. Serves 6.
