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NEW WILDLIFE AGENT NAMED FOR TULELAKE

Howard Sergeant, recently of Idaho, will come here soon to take over duties as fish and wild life agent with headquarters on the west side road on Tule lake.

Sergeant, a graduate of the University of Idaho, succeeds Archie Hull, who has gone to Ogden, Utah. Hull is considering going into the pheasant-raising business, it is understood. He was in charge at Tulelake for the last two years.

Bonneville Shows Tools At C. Of C.

The Bonneville power administration is displaying materials, equipment, and miscellaneous items used in the construction of transmission lines and substations facilities that could be manufactured by small industrial operators with a minimum of re-tooling. These items will be on display at the Klamath county chamber of commerce, July 16 and 17.

Studies conducted during the last few months indicate that a total of more than \$7,700,000 worth of line hardware equipment will be needed in the Pacific northwest in the first three postwar years. The displays are accompanied by catalogues containing information as to quantities presently required and estimated needs for the future, methods of manufacture, descriptive material and specifications.

State Legislators Fishery Consultants
WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—A group of state representatives to act as consultants in fisheries matters in the Columbia river basin has been approved by the interior department, Senator Mitchell (D-Wash.) has been advised.

The men, representing commercial and sports fishing and state regulatory bodies, were nominated by the governors of Washington, Oregon and Idaho. They will receive no pay but their expenses will be refunded.

WHEAT
CHICAGO, July 13 (AP)—Belief of traders that the government soon would inaugurate a wheat support program for the current crop led to considerable buying today and wheat futures closed as much as 1/4 cent a bushel before profit-taking cut into the advances.

Other grains moved upward with wheat, but selling then changed the advances to slight losses in some cases. Soy was up as much as 1/4 cent at one time. Practically no corn was coming into the market, and not much oats. Traders said there thus was a greater feeder demand for wheat.

Wheat closed 1/4 cent higher than the previous finish, July \$1.87 1/2. Corn was unchanged at \$1.18 1/2. Oats were up 1/4 cent, July 68 1/4. Rye was 1/4 cent lower to 36c higher, July \$1.18.
