ed Japanese garrison at Amoy, the Chinese said. **Japs Driven Out** The Chinese said that in the advance toward Yunshiao the Japanese entered Chengkwang township but were driven out in a battle that lasted two hours. The next day the enemy force bypassed Chengkwang and headed for Yunshiao where it was attacked.

Meanwhile, Japanese troops, in an advance of 50 miles from Inpak along the coastal highway in Kwangtung province, have captured Yeungkong, 145 miles southwest of Canton, the high command said.

Final E-Bond Standings Listed

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP)—The treasury today gave the final standings of the states in percentage of E-bond sales as compared with quotas in the 7th War Loan.

Eighteen states failed to reach their quotas, but the nation as a whole made 99.4 per cent of its \$4,000,000,000 goal.

Hawaii sold a larger percentage than any state, with 130.6 per cent of its \$23,500,000 quota. The canal zone, with a smaller quota of \$2,000,000, was even higher—160.7 per cent.

As already announced by Secretary Morgenthau, Montana led all states with 119.9 per cent of its \$16,000,000 quota, and Iowa's 119 per cent was second, Alabama's 118.89 third, and Wyoming's 118.85 fourth.

169,500 Lbs. Wool Appraised Here

Government wool appraisers in Klamath Falls Friday appraised 169,500 pounds of wool at the Jack O'Connor warehouse. Prices determined will range from 42.92 to 30.98 cents per pound f.o.b. Boston, or \$5.40 per 100 pounds to ship to Boston.

All large lots were taken in regional bags except one clip of 32,000 pounds which has to be graded in Boston.

Five small clips graded here will average growers 40 cents per pound.

DOVER, England, July 14 (AP)—Hundreds of holiday-makers lined the high chalk cliffs of Dover to watch President Truman's convoy pass through the English channel late this afternoon.

With a British light cruiser leading the way and flanked on both sides by destroyers, the president's freshly-painted cruiser Augusta made a beautiful picture as she sailed through the straits at good speed. The president is due to land at Antwerp tomorrow.

KLAMATH INDIANS FREED BY COURT

PORTLAND, July 14 (AP)—Two Klamath Indians were free today after being acquitted in federal court on a charge of stealing wine and beer from a store at Chiloquin.

Bill Langley, attorney for Percie Ball and Alfred Butler, argued that the case was not one of federal jurisdiction, since the pilfering charged was not from a federal store, although within the boundaries of the Klamath reservation.

The question of whether or not the liquor was stolen was consequently not decided.

Clarence A. Humble, district attorney here, said this morning that his office was notified of the theft, but that upon investigation he was informed that the case would be turned over to the federal authorities for action.

Six Drags Search Lake For Body

Another drag was taken to the Lake of the Woods this morning to assist in the search for Robert Barney Hollingsworth, 25, who apparently drowned there Tuesday night.

There are now six drags operating at the scene of the accident. Members of the sheriff's office here and volunteer workers have been dragging the lake since Wednesday morning in a vain effort to recover the body.

Hollingsworth was presumed drowned Tuesday night when the boat in which he was riding with four companions capsized during a storm. The others were rescued.

Allied Forces May Fraternize

LONDON, July 14 (AP)—American and British forces occupying Germany and Austria today relaxed the non-fraternization policy to permit troops to talk with adult Germans on the streets and in public places.

Gen. Eisenhower and Field Marshal Montgomery announced the action. Up to now, soldiers "fraternizing" with the Germans have been subject to \$85 fines. The rule against even talking with the Germans was put into effect when the western allies entered Germany. The Russians took no similar action. American troops in Berlin, where Russian rules control, were holding frauleins' hands in cafes even before today's action by Eisenhower.

Until today's official relaxation, troops of the western allies had been restricted to a friendly attitude toward "little children."

Montgomery broadcast to the Germans that "great progress" had been made in carrying out the allied policies of denazification and in removing prominent nazis from all responsibility in German life. Consequently, relaxation of the non-frat policy was "now deemed desirable and timely."
