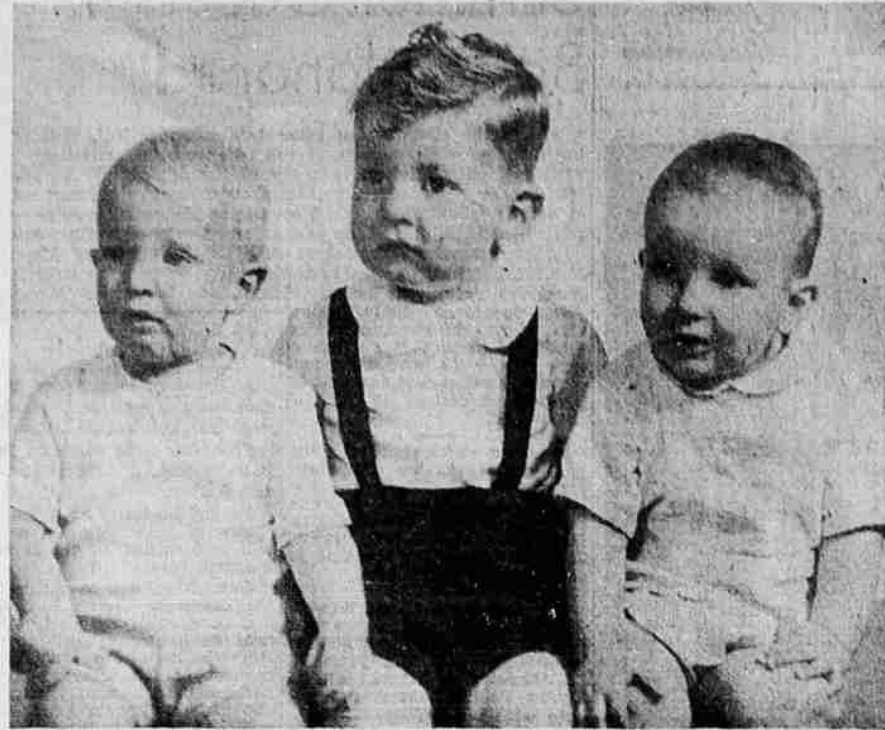
Layette Shower
