## ROGERS ARRAIGNED ON LARCENY COUNT

Clarence W. Rogers, 18, was arraigned in justice court Friday charged with grand larceny. He waived preliminary hearing and grand jury indictment and bail was set at \$1000 cash. He was committed to the county jail in lieu of bail.

Rogers allegedly stole an outboard motor valued at \$400 from Ed Isensee at Lake o' the Woods July 8.

Rogers pleaded guilty to a charge of petty larceny and was given five days in the county jail with three days suspended by Justice J. A. Mahoney. The two days he has already been incarcerated in jail will be credited to his sentence. He admitted stealing an automobile spotlight in connection with numerous thefts from cars here.

He will now appear before Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg to enter a plea on the grand larceny charge.

## WRA TO CLOSE 8 JAP CENTERS

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP)—The war relocation authority today announced closing dates for the eight Japanese and Japanese-American relocation centers.

The centers and the dates by which they will be closed are: Granada at Amache, Colo., October 15; Central Utah at Topaz, Utah, and Mindokko at Hunt, Idaho, November 1; Hart Mountain, Wyo., and Gila River at Rivers, Ariz., November 15; Colorado River at Poston, Ariz., and Manzanar, Calif., December 1 and Rohwer, Ark., December 15.

Plans for disposition of the Tule Lake segregation center will be announced later.
