STATE EXPERTS BRING CANNING TIPS TO SCHOOL

Canning school, sponsored by Klamath's Nutrition council, will be held at the Pelican theatre from 9:30 to 11:30 each morning, July 24 to 27.

Demonstrations for home freezing of food will be given by Thomas Ostendorf, assistant professor of the foods industry department of Oregon State college on July 24, opening day. Three days of canning classes by Mrs. Vivian Freeman will follow.

Ostendorf, who has done research with home freezing is co-author of the OSC bulletin, "Food Preservation." He will discuss preparing fruits, vegetables and meats for cold locker storage, and answer questions regarding drying and freezing food at home.

Ostendorf will also cover economic phases of installing freezing lockers in the home in post-war planning, and advantages of larger freezing units in electric ice boxes supplemented by lockers in commercial freezing plants.

Freeman will answer questions on problems of home canning and will consider suggestions on what food to can during classes. Anyone wishing to see a particular type of food canned during the session should send a postcard to the home demonstration office, Federal building, Klamath Falls. Mrs. Freeman will gladly demonstrate canning any food available in the markets.

Classes are open to all interested homemakers at no admission charge. Bulletins on subjects discussed will be distributed to those attending.

Klamath PW Knew Hungry Days In Austrian Camp

S/Sgt. Haaby Bechen, Klamath man who spent four months in a German prison camp, is spending a few days furlough here and "enjoying every minute of it—especially the food."

Sgt. Bechen spent two "hungry months" at the Mark-Pongau prison camp in Austria at the end of the European war. The German situation was breaking up, and even the prison guards weren't too well fed.

Finally, the Germans abandoned the camp. The prisoners started foraging and discovered extensive food supplies in warehouses. They were feasting on this when American troops came in to free the camp, where there are about 13,000 Americans, Russians and British.

Sgt. Bechen said he and others were moved to nearby Gerdan barracks and began to eat under jurisdiction of the U. S. army.

ROGERS SENTENCED ON LARCENY CHARGE

Clarence W. Rogers, 18, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of grand larceny in circuit court Monday afternoon and was sentenced to a term not to exceed two years in the Oregon state penitentiary by Judge David R. Vandenberg. Rogers was represented by A. C. Yaden.

Rogers admitted stealing an outdoor motor valued at \$400 belonging to Ed Isensee at Lake of the Woods on July 8. He waived preliminary hearing, grand jury indictment and statutory time.

He also admitted that he was involved in numerous acts of stripping cars in Klamath Falls. Articles taken included spotlights, tires, tire chains, flashlights, rear-view mirrors, and tools.

Three juvenile boys are held in the county jail in connection with the car-stripping incidents and two juvenile girls are in the custody of juvenile officers.

Four character witnesses testified for Rogers and State Policeman William Colbert gave police testimony.

COUNCIL ACTS ON SEWAGE LINE LEAK

SP R. R. Renews 85 Mex Contracts

EUGENE, July 17 (AP)—Contracts employing 85 Mexicans here for the Southern Pacific railroad have been renewed for at least three months, Roadmaster William F. Van Nuys said.

Only 10-15 per cent of the 1300 Mexicans working in the Portland division, which includes Eugene, are returning home, officials reported.

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
