FALL TO SEE PLANS FOR JAIL COMPLETE

Working drawings by Sheldon Brumbaugh for the proposed Klamath county-city jail will be finished some time this fall, officials have announced.

Architect Brumbaugh has been commissioned by county and city officials to draw plans for construction of the jail which will be erected next spring on a site close to the present county jail.

Bids are expected to be called the early part of 1946, for the building to be erected at an estimated cost of \$180,000. Funds for the project were approved at the special election held June 22.

According to preliminary sketches, overall dimensions are 80 by 200 feet, to rise three stories. Offices will occupy the main floor space, and the two upper stories will be devoted to jail cells. The building will be constructed of reinforced concrete throughout with a brick-faced exterior lower floor. The two jail floors will be 38 by 80 feet dimensions.
