

INDIANS PRAISED AS GOOD SOLDIERS

SEATTLE, July 10 (AP)—United States Indian Commissioner William Brophy, enthusiastic over the war record of American Indians, said yesterday their newly-acquired training and skills must be put to use afterwards.

"These boys have lived all over the world," he told an interviewer. "Whether they will be content at home is a question."

Members of the same tribe have been used in walkie-talkie communications because no one else understands their language, an Indian was in the famous Iwo Jima flag raising picture and an Indian was the first American to reach Berlin, he said.

"I guess it's their placidity that makes them such good soldiers—no nerves," he added.

He is on his way to Alaska to see "how we operate from the resources, health, education and management" standpoints, he said.

Threats To Jap-American Soldier Jails Calif. Woman

SACRAMENTO, July 19 (AP)—A tirade against a Japanese-American soldier and his family has landed Mrs. Wilma Insigne, 34, of Walnut Grove, Calif., in the Sacramento county jail because, in the words of Justice Milo Dye, "doing you a favor is doing you an injustice."

Dye, Walnut Grove justice of the peace, sentenced Mrs. Insigne to 90 days in jail on charges of disturbing the peace and using vulgar, profane and indecent language. He suspended 60 days of her term on condition she leave the county after serving 30 days.

Secretary of the Interior Ickes yesterday cited her conviction as the first jail sentence imposed for threatening returned Japanese-Americans.

After hearing the case, Dye told Mrs. Insigne, "You tried to incite certain people to an act of violence and had you gained enough followers, you might have started a riot resulting in bloodshed or death."

She was arrested on the complaint of Army Pvt. Yoshio Matsuoka, who has just returned to the United States after 10 months in a German prison camp. Matsuoka charged that the woman threatened to have his father's home burned down if the family remained in Walnut Grove.

From her cell Mrs. Insigne screamed last night, "It's a lie, a dirty Jap-loving lie! I positively did not threaten any Japs. I just gave them a darn good cussing out."

The FBI said last night it had solved the mystery. "Walker's" true name, agents said, was Karl Horst Max Wacker, 20, a trained nazi espionage agent, and his "amnesia" was a fraud.

E. E. Conroy, New York FBI chief, said Wacker admitted he was recruited into the German espionage service in 1944 after he and his parents were sent back to Germany from the United States aboard the exchange ship Gripsholm.

In newspaper interviews in New York and Paris, the youth was quoted as saying he had been liberated by the Russians and aided in the capture of Berlin—"I shot three krauts in a cemetery."

Here's the Quick, Easy Way to Make Marvelous **BERRY JAM**

1 1/2 Cups Ground Berries (Any Variety)
1 1/2 Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, stem, grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely a layer of a lime so each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly 1 1/2 level cups crushed berries (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary). Into large kettle, add M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add sugar bringing to full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 minutes. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir, and skim by turns 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2 in. space for sealing with fresh paraffin. (NOTE: For Strawberry Jam, add 1/4 cup lemon juice to each 5 cups crushed berries.)
