## Marines Supply Downtown Clubs For 1100 Personnel

For several months now, without publicity or fanfare, the marines have been operating two downtown clubs for enlisted men which have greatly increased the recreational and liberty opportunities in Klamath Falls barracks personnel. One, the Enlisted Men's club on Ninth street, was opened almost a year ago by the Crater Lake detachment, Marine Corps league, to provide the marines with their own personal downtown spot and to take the strain off already overtaxed civilian facilities.

A good part of the original equipment of this club was donated by the league or by civilian well-wishers, while other fixtures have been purchased with club funds. For decorations Sen. Marshall Cornett donated several mounted animal heads and mounted Oregon wildfowl. Several months later, after all doubt had been removed as to whether the place would be successful financially and otherwise, the marines, through a board of directors, assumed responsibility for the actual operation of the resort.

As the personnel of the barracks and the membership of the club grew, it was decided to open a second spot, this for staff NCOs only and to reserve the old club for men of the last four pay grades—sergeants, corporals, PFCs and privates.

The new installation, opened last April 1, is located in the Willard hotel and is run along the same lines as the Ninth-street establishment. Membership is open only to marines and naval personnel of the barracks. Some 950 have joined the enlisted men's club since its inception last August and around 150 hold cards to the staff club.

There is only one major difference in the rules governing the two places. Women guests are allowed to come to the staff resort each night and may come to the enlisted men's club only three nights a week. Both organizations are operated by an 11-man board of directors headed by Sgt. Maj. John Sallman, chairman. M. Sgt. William Phipps is the active manager of the two clubs.
