COUNTY BOOKMOBILE THRILLS MEXICANS

Mexican nationals greeted the bookmobile of the county library with a great deal of enthusiasm and interest, according to Mary McComb, librarian, when it traveled to Crescent Lake last week. The bookmobile, which circulates books throughout the county, was besieged by Mexican nationals wanting picture books, map books, or ABC books which would enable them to learn how to read English.

Traveling three routes in the county, the bookmobile has circulated approximately 25,000 books since June 1, 1945. This covers the Altamont and Shasta districts, the Fort Klamath route and the Keno route. Besides this, there are trips to the northern part of the county every two months.

Other work of the county library includes the mailing of books to 4-H and Girl Scout summer camps, to boys working for the Klamath Forest Protective association, and to families at Gerber dam and Crater Lake. The county library also maintains circulation libraries in every town in the county except Merrill. The libraries are housed in stores, post offices, irrigation district offices, grange halls, private homes or any other available building.
