

Golf's Money Brigade Seeks Forty Spots In Golfdom's Richest Open

CHICAGO, July 25 (AP)—Golf's money brigade, heading down the sport's most lucrative trail in history, steps up to the tee today to qualify for 40 spots in golfdom's richest open—the \$60,000 all-American open at the Tam o'Shanter Country club.

The parade of the nation's greatest fairway aces will be headed by Byron (The Lord) Nelson, Sammy Snead, Sammy Byrd, Harold (Jug) McSpaden and the rest of the country's best shotmakers.

40 Spots Open
In all, 88 professionals will play 18 holes of medal play today for the 40 spots open in the tournament in an effort to get a crack at Lord Nelson and the title he won a year ago. While the pros' section of the meet carries most interest, it still is but one part of the three-ring circus George S. May is putting on at Tam o'Shanter.

In addition to the professional division, there will be the all-American amateur for men and the all-American women's tournament. All three events get underway simultaneously Thursday.

Hogan Fires 65
Nelson, Snead, Byrd and McSpaden, who have been heading golfdom's play-for-pay shooters for a past year or so, may find plenty of trouble when they bump into Lt. Ben Hogan after today's qualifying rounds. The little general of the fairways with the lieutenant's bars fired a seven-under-par 65 in a practice round Monday. That was the best score of the year over the rugged Tam o'Shanter course.

Freese Leads Women
Yesterday's qualifications in the women's section of the three-way tournament uncovered a new star. Be-spectacled, slender, 19-year-old Carol (Babe) Freese of Portland, Ore., fired a three-under-par 73 to pace the field of qualifiers. She was out in 37 and back in 36 as she finished her qualifying round a stroke ahead of Peggy Kirk, Findlay, O., and three strokes ahead of Dot Kiely of Los Angeles.

Plea For World Series Encourages Sports Fans

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—A senatorial plea against "premature" government action banning traditional fall sports events encouraged both baseball and football fans today.

The plea came from Chairman Mead (D-N.Y.) of the senate war investigating committee who added that the transportation pinch might be eased by fall.

But whether it is or not, Mead told a reporter yesterday, the world series should be played "even if they have to go back to the horse and buggy days."

The senator, whose committee just had completed a two-day inquiry into transportation problems, said he expected more gasoline to be available in the next few months and that it might be possible for owners of private cars to transport the series teams.

Mead said he wanted the series played because it "means so much to the boys in service."

The office of defense transportation has not yet said whether it will permit the diamond classic to be played. Nor has the agency commented on reports that non-championship

Two Sailors Will Fight At Portland

Dr. Byron Friedman of Klamath Falls, who has taken over the managerial reins of three fighters at the Klamath naval air station, has two of his boys booked for bouts in Portland Friday night.

Al Burghardt, who fights under the moniker of "Kid Silk" will meet Bob Bright in a six-round preliminary fight. The clever negro boxer is now battling in the light-heavyweight class, weighing in at 166 pounds.

Another sailor, Harold Winkler, will mix it up with Dick Wagner in the welterweight division in another six-canto prelim.

These two fights support a card in the Portland auditorium that features Roy Miller vs. Ray Acosta in the 10-round main event.

Friedman is also handling Frank Romano, 161 pounds, who is stationed at the air base here.

Busher Made 7-5 Favorite To Cop Race

CHICAGO, July 25 (AP)—Two daughters of War Admiral—and they're granddaughters of the great Man o' War—are expected to battle it out down the stretch today in the \$25,000 added Cleopatra Handicap at Washington park.

They are Busher, three-year-old filly which has won \$86,895 for a fight with Jack Kiser, and the Maine Chance Farms' War Date.

The two will have plenty of competition in the 11-filly field nominated for the event, however.

Busher, queen of last year's two-year-old fillies was held at 7-5 odds today, and probably will be backed down to a less-than-even figure before the race. War Date was quoted at 8-5, while the rest of the field ranged from 8-1 to 25-1, with few takers willing to give the nine other entrants a chance against War Admiral's daughters.

Twosy, Flyweight, Wallflower, Come and Go, Corina Lark, Donna Brand, Recce, Stonnette and Devastating make up the rest of the field.

In the opening bout on Promoter Mack Lillard's crunch card Friday night, Jack Kiser will tangle with clever Tex Hager. This tussle rounds out a card that features Antone Leone against Jack Lipscomb in the main event.

Leone has been required to post \$100 forfeit money for his appearance here after he took a Brody last Friday from his scheduled battle with Lipscomb.

Lipscomb has been spoiling for a fight with the Bronx mauler ever since Leone beat him on a fluke here two weeks ago. Leone feels that his courage has been questioned and will go all out to prove that he is the man he says he is.

In the semi-windup, Paavo Katonen, the durable Finn, will take on powerful Georges Dusette, French-Canadian strongman.

Mailho Holds Batting Lead By Slim Margin
LOS ANGELES, July 25 (AP)—Slipping eight points to .355, Emil Mailho, San Francisco outfielder, narrowly maintained his Pacific Coast league batting leadership in games through last Sunday. Oakland's Frankie Hawkins threatened with .352.

Third was Jo-Jo White, Sacramento gardener, at .342. White led the league in hits, with 149. Other departmental leaders included Lou Vezelich, San Diego, 79 runs batted in; Jesse Landrum, Sacramento, 30 doubles and nine triples; Ted Norbert, Seattle, 14 homers; and Gene Handley, Sacramento, 28 stolen bases.

Sacramento retained its team batting lead with .283.

Chicago Holds 4 1/2 Game Lead in National Circuit; Cards Nudge Dodgers, 7-6

Washington and Brooklyn remain the two major surprises of the 1945 baseball season today as the big leaguers take a day off for travel after completing their fourth interseasonal series.

Although both the Senators and Dodgers, the springtime cellar selections, were beaten in last night's tests, they managed to stick within striking distance of the lead after facing their toughest rivals.

Ossie Bleuge's Senators came home from the west two weeks ago bubbling over with pennant enthusiasm, pulled to within 23 games of the top, did a back flip while blowing two straight doubleheaders and then came back to end the home stand in second place, only three lengths behind Detroit.

Tribe Scalps Nats
Alie Reynolds cooled off Washington, 4-0, scattering seven hits for his 10th decision as Dutch Leonard went down for his fourth loss, snapping a five-game win string. Cleveland slugged the knuckleball expert for 11 blows in eight frames.

In the only other scheduled American league contest, Boston blanked St. Louis, 6-0, on a four-hitter by Emmett O'Neill. Luke Sewell's hurlers had a nightmarish day, walking 12 batters. Starter Sig Jakucki passed five before he retired with two out in the first. The Red Sox took over fourth place and the Browns fell to sixth although they copped seven of 12 in the east.

Leo Durocher got only three complete games in 14 starts from his pitching staff but strong hitting by Goody Rosen, Dixie Walker and Luis Olmo and adroit use of relief hurlers, kept the "Bums" within 5 1/2 lengths of the fast-stepping Chicago Cubs.

Cards Edge Bums
The world champion St. Louis Cards got an even break in their four-game test with the Dodgers, regaining possession of second position on a 7-6 edge. After the Brooks slugged Charley Bar-

rett for a 6-1 lead in the first three frames, George Dockins came in to stop them dead while the Redbirds rallied with one in the fourth, and four in the fifth to tie. Augie Bergamo's third straight strike in the ninth broke it up, handing reliever Cy Buker his first setback.

Chicago pulverized the Phillies, behind Bob Clippman for the Cubs' 13th victory in 16 meetings with the cellar club. Chicago's league lead now measures 4 1/2 games.

Pittsburgh is putting on another drive. The Pirates ran their winning streak to five, all over Boston, by taking an 11-inning thriller, 8-5. Kenny Gables, chunky rookie righthander, earned his sixth successive decision on relief at the expense of freshman Don Hendrickson.

Both are former New York Yankee farm system hurlers and a former Yank, Jack Saltzgaver socked a decisive triple in the second extra inning.

The New York Giants wound up a dreary western tour by knocking off Cincinnati, 6-4, racking up 11 hits off four Red tossers. Harry Feldman needed help from Ace Adams in earning his eighth victory.

American Hero Reported Dead
LOS ANGELES, July 25 (AP)—Capt. John Covert Ellis, 32, former University of Nebraska football player who was credited with swimming from Batavia to Corridor towing a canoe-load of injured men, went to his death when a Japanese transport carrying 1600 American prisoners was torpedoed off Luzon last December 13.

The war department notified Ellis' mother of his death.

Fischer Handcuffs Portland To Cut Margin To 6 Games; Three Teams Fight For 3rd

Seattle and Portland squared away today for the second round of their Pacific Coast league slugfest after the runner-up Rainiers had drawn first blood 6-1 last night, slaying the Beavers' loop lead to six games.

Portland's 11-game winning streak was snapped by the veteran portlander, Carl Fischer, who rang up his 14th victory of the season and fourth in a row. His victim was Roy Helser, second most effective Beaver twirler, who suffered his eighth defeat against 15 wins.

Close Race for Third
In the battle for third place, Tuesday results left three California teams separated by a single tilt. Sacramento's league leading pitcher, Bud Beasley, was beaten 7-5 by the San Diego Padres, while the Oakland Acons were trouncing the San Francisco Seals 6-3. The Solons still retain third, half a game ahead of the Seals, who, in turn, are that distance in front of the Acons.

Hollywood's talented Stars broke an eight-game losing string in beating Los Angeles,

7-4, dropping the Angels late seventh.

Fischer did not let a man get as far as third base until the ninth inning when Portland scored its only run on singles by Johnny O'Neil, Hank Souza and Larry Barton. The Rainiers got a tally in each of the first two frames, and then drove Helser from the mound in the fifth with a four-run attack. The Beaver tosser, who had won his last four starts, was sent to the showers after consecutive singles by Bill Kats, Jack Whipple and Bob Gorhould, followed by George McDonald's double. Reliever Jake Nooty took over and allowed the fourth center of the inning on Ted Norbert's single, scoring McDonald.

Oakland scored all its runs off righthander Bob Barthelson in the first seven innings to beat the Seals, 6-3. Hitting star of the games was Bones Sanders, pinch-hitting ace who played first base for San Francisco in place of Gus Suhr. Sanders accounted for two of the Seal runs with a third-inning triple, longest blow of the night. Floyd (The Rock) Stromme, went the route for the Oaks and got credit for the win.
