### Bidding Open On Fremont School

Bids for Fremont school construction were opened at 7:30 p. m., Wednesday at Klamath high school, with three contractors bidding.

Basic bids submitted were at \$36,740 by Toold Building company; \$46,150 by Penninger and Watkins; \$35,116 by Angelo Doverl.

The contract has not been let yet, but the bids are being taken under advisement. Another meeting will be held by the school board within the next few days.

Only one bid was received when bids were opened July 24, in Seattle by FPFA, for reconstruction of 48 family dwelling units in Klamath Falls. The bid was considered too high, and it is being re-advertised, to call for bids on August 3, on the project. Bidding will be opened at 4 p. m., in the FPFA office in Seattle.

### Army Discharges 231 Oregon Men

SALEM, July 26 (AP)—There were 231 Oregon men discharged from the army last week under the point system, Col. Elmer V. Wooton, state selective service director, said today.

Fifty-four of those men were Oregon national guardsmen who had served since the guard was inducted into federal service in September, 1940.
