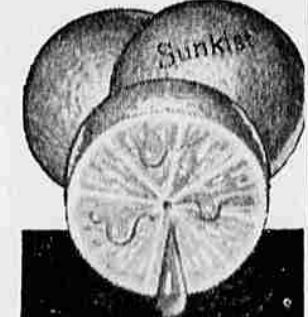


Legislative Group Studies Delinquency

SALEM, July 27 (AP)—The legislative interim committee to study juvenile delinquency met here yesterday to organize and elected State Representative O. H. Bengtson, Medford, as chairman. Representative J. O. Johnson, Washington county, was chosen secretary.

Other committee members are Senators Thomas C. Parkinson, Roseburg, and Dr. Joel C. Booth, Lebanon, and Representative Paul Hendricks, Salem.

DEATH RATE DROPS
 PORTLAND, July 27 (AP)—The State Health bulletin reported today Oregon's maternal death rate at 1.3 per 1,000 live births during the first five months of 1945 fell 41 per cent below last year's figure. Infant deaths are 29.8, a 14 per cent decline, which indicates a 1945 rate lower than last year's 30.1 per 1,000 live infants—lowest in the state's history.

EXPERTS TELL FOOD SAVING METHODS HERE

"Home preservation of food has prevented a food shortage on the home front," Mrs. Vivian Freeman, instructor at canning school, said in a tribute to women for their contribution to the war effort.

This year food preservation is more important than ever, she pointed out, demonstrating several new devices for time and labor saving and sugar "stretching."

Canning school was held in the Pelican theatre four days this week, opening with classes in home freezing methods, and continuing with three days of canning demonstrations. Thomas Onsdorff, associate professor of the foods industry department of Oregon State college, conducted the freezing classes. He explained methods of drying and freezing fruits, meat and vegetables at home.

Freezing units installed in homes after the war, Onsdorff said, will not crowd out commercial freezing plants. On the contrary, it will bring them more business, because of the extra services they offer in slaughtering, smoking, drying, curing and initial freezing which home locker owners are not prepared to handle.

Sugar Stretcher
 Mrs. Freeman demonstrated how the 10-pound canning sugar allotment could be used for 50 quarts of fruit by careful measuring. She canned raspberries before the group Thursday by crushing part of the fruit and heating to bring out the juice which was used to can the remainder without using any water.

Meat canning was of especial interest to those attending. The meat was first cooked, pork chops broiled and beef roast browned in the oven, before it was canned, showing a fine way of preserving surplus cooked foods for later needs.

Pressure Cookers
 A hint Mrs. Freeman gave for use of pressure cookers was that only two inches of water be used regardless of directions which come with the cookers. The limited water gives better results, making it easier to regulate pressure, she pointed out, with less danger of it boiling dry.

Tops of pressure cookers should be removed as soon as pressure goes down, and definitely before the unit cools. Otherwise the cooker may seal itself.

Substitute
 Water bath canners are hard to obtain now but Mrs. Freeman suggested a deep kettle as a good substitute, placing jar screwbands on the bottom to raise the jars up half an inch, and keeping the water one inch over the tops of jars.

Hospital To House Vets Of Three Wars
 PORTLAND, July 27 (AP)—The Portland veterans hospital expansion committee said today 172,484 Oregon servicemen of three wars are potential patients for the 500-bed veterans' hospital here.

Chairman D. B. Chown said his committee needed 1500 more beds for the hospital on Marquam hill because facilities will soon be inadequate.

He said there are already 133,464 Oregon World War I veterans, 35,000 World War II veterans and 4000 Spanish-American veterans.

Portland and Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, and Columbia counties are the home area of 59,318 of these men, Chown said.

SEES HITLER'S HOME

Writing from Salzburg, Austria, Cpl. John A. Wolford sent a picture of Hitler's home, Berchtesgaden, to his fiancée, Evelyn Kohler of 249 Martin. He said in his letter, "Oh, yes, here is a picture of Hitler's home in the Alps. It is a very short distance from Salzburg and I would like a picture of it. He was supposed to have had gasoline poured over his body and buried right in front of this building. The picture was taken before the place was bombed; it doesn't look that way now."

Wolford was employed at Copco before he entered the army. He has been overseas 18 months. His parents, former residents of Klamath Falls, now live in Grants Pass.

ARRIVES AT HOSPITAL
 T/Sgt. John W. Bowen of 2141 S. 8th, Klamath Falls, has arrived in the United States at the Valley Forge General hospital, Phoenixville, Pa., after being released from a German prisoner of war camp.

He was in the infantry and spent 12 1/2 months overseas in England, France, Germany and Belgium. He was wounded twice by shrapnel, once in France and once in Germany.

Decorations worn by Sgt. Bowen are the ETO ribbon, Purple Heart with one Oak Leaf cluster, Silver Star, Good Conduct, and Combat Infantryman badge.

His mother, Mrs. Clara Bowen, lives in Klamath Falls. He graduated from KUHS.

 Sgt. and Mrs. Arnold L. Vogel have spent the past week in Klamath Falls at the homes of Sgt. Vogel's two sisters, Mrs. George Hixon at 5201 Walton drive, and Mrs. Hal Neat of Weyerhaeuser.

Sgt. Vogel has been returned to Mitchell convalescent hospital at Camp Locket, Campo, Calif., from overseas duty.

He entered the service from Klamath Falls in June, 1942, and received his training in Alabama, Tennessee, Arizona and California. He left for overseas duty in July, 1944, and was with the medical battalion of the 81st Wildcat division in Europe. He has been in three major campaigns.

After spending the remainder of his furlough at the home of his wife's parents in Phoenix, Ariz., he will return to Camp Locket.

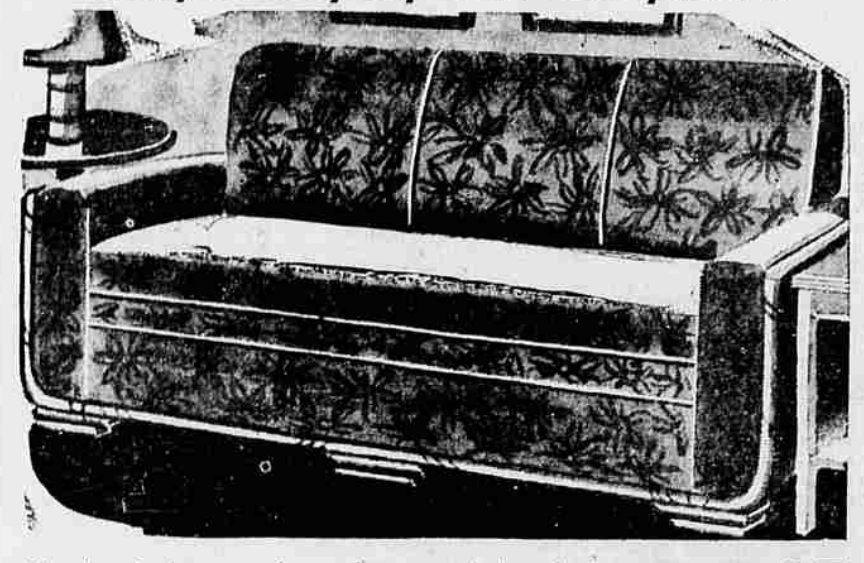
