Sale of Timber, Klamath Indian Reservation, Kanott Timber Unit No. 4. Sealed bids in duplicate on forms provided therefor, marked outside "Bid Kanott Timber Unit No. 4" and addressed to the Superintendent, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until 2 o'clock P. M., Pacific War Time, August 20, 1945 for the purchase of merchantable timber on a tract within the Klamath Indian Reservation, Oregon, described as the Kanott Timber Unit No. 4. The unit includes about 2000 timbered acres with an estimated cut of ten million 10,000-200 feet B. M. of Ponderosa Pine and Sugar Pine including a possible small amount of Douglas fir, incense cedar and other species in sections 31, 34, T. 34 S. R. 11 E. and 3, 4, 5, 6, T. 35 S. R. 11 E. Each bid must state the price per thousand feet, B. M. Scriber's decimal C. Log Scale that will be paid for timber cut and sealed prior to any recediment of rates as specified in the contract. No bid will be considered for less than \$2.25 per thousand feet B. M. for Ponderosa and Sugar Pine, \$2.50 per thousand feet for Douglas fir and incense cedar, and \$1.50 per thousand feet B. M. for other species. Under regulation of the Office of Price Administration entitled, "Maximum Price Regulation 406—Western Timber," maximum prices have been imposed effective August 31, 1943, which limit additions to the minimum acceptable bid prices. These are on file in the office of the Superintendent, Klamath Agency, Oregon, and are available for all interested in this unit. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of \$5,000 on a solvent bank, payable to the Special Disbursing Agent, Klamath Agency, Oregon. The deposit will be returned to unsuccessful bidders. The deposit of the successful bidder will be applied as part of the purchase price against timber cut on this unit only, or retained as liquidated damages if the bidder shall not execute contract and furnish satisfactory bond for \$10,000 within 60 days from acceptance of this bid. The right to waive technical defects and reject any and all bids is reserved. This sale is made in furtherance of the War Program to assist in maintaining lumber production and if more than one bid is received at, or above the maximum prices prescribed by MPR No. 406, they will be considered as if made at the maximum allowable price and the contract will be awarded in accordance with Departmental memorandum of January 5, 1944. Copies of this memorandum are on file at the office of the Superintendent, Klamath Agency, Oregon, and may be referred to upon request. The contract will specify that all designated timber shall be cut and removed from the unit on or before March 31, 1947. 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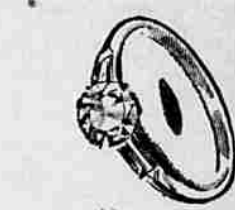

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Coffee on the trail
