

# Seattle Again Wallops Beavers, 9-6; Rainiers Within 5 Games Of Top

Seattle's Rainiers, spurred by the prediction they would drop seven straight this week to the first place Portland Beavers, were within five games of the top in the Pacific Coast league today after their third victory in four starts against the loop leaders.

The Rainiers' 9-6 triumph last night was further embarrasing to "Lefty" O'Doul, San Francisco skipper, who boldly forecast earlier in the week that the Beavers would breeze through their series at Seattle without a loss.

In the battle for third place, O'Doul's Seals fought to capitalize on a chance to overtake the Sacramento Solons. Both teams went down to defeat, the Solons losing 4-1 to the San Diego Padres and the Seals 5-4 to the Oakland Acons. The only extra-

## Borowy Deal Boosts Cubs' Flag Hopes

# Lord Byron Holds Four-Stroke Lead Over Field In TAM Open

CHICAGO, July 28 (AP)—Byron Nelson, officially plus with his irons, appeared headed today for his fourth all-American open golf championship and a new tournament record.

Swinging into the third round of the 72-hole test at Tam o' Shanter, golf's biggest money winner had a four-stroke lead over stocky Gene Sarazen with a record 134, 10 under par, for the halfway mark.

Nelson, who has won three of the four Tam tournaments, needed only to shoot 72-71, one stroke under par, for the final 36 holes to crack the 278 mark he established in winning the first all-American meet in 1941.

Since the smooth-stroking Texan apparently is allergic to par and shuns it completely there seemed small doubt that he would fall to continue his pacesetting today and tomorrow.

Nelson swept through the second round yesterday with a four under par 68 to add to his opening 66 and protest his lead from the veteran Sarazen whose second round 68 featured an ace on the 215-yard 16th hole.

Ralph Guldahl, another veteran campaigner, also shot into a challenging position with a course record tying 65. Opening with a 29, best first nine performance ever made in professional competition, the stoop-shouldered Chicagoan missed an 18-foot putt on the home hole trying for a 54. Guldahl's 65 gave him 139 for the first 36 holes and a tie with Lt. Ben Hogan, Sam Snead and Sgt. E. J. (Dutch) Harrison. Hogan, a stroke behind Nelson with a first round 67, dropped back to a par 72 yesterday.

Six players, including Flight Officer Frank Stranahan of Toledo, O., shared the seventh position at 140. Stranahan's total was good for a first place tie with Art Doering of Denver in the all-American amateur affair. Doering, who did not enter the open competition, fired a second round 67 while Stranahan had a 71.

Dorothy Germain of Philadelphia maintained her lead in the all-American women's open with a 153, adding a 77 to her first round 76. Lt. Patty Berg of Minneapolis and Dorothy Kieley of Los Angeles held the second spot with 158's.

# Cubs Nudge Reds, 2-1; Tigers Win

Chicago Buys Hank Borowy For Yanks For \$100,000; Newhouser Raps Yankees

Pitching is dominating the pennant races in both major leagues today with a banner crop of 14 candidates aiming for the 20-win mark.

With the Chicago Cubs spending an estimated \$100,000 for Hank Borowy in a deal with the New York Yankees and Hal Newhouser spearheading the Detroit Tigers' drive with 16 triumphs, it is evident that both Managers Charley Grimm and Steve O'Neill subscribe to the theory that pitching is 75 per cent of any ball club.

The Cubs had both Hank Wyse (14-6) and Claude Passeau (11-3) taking dead aim on the cramped circle before Borowy was added to the flock. Charley (Red) Jarrett (12-7) and Ken Burkhardt (11-5) of the St. Louis Cardinals both had a good chance to make the grade as did Hal Gregg of Brooklyn (12-6), Bill Voiselle of New York (11-4) and Rip Sewell of Pittsburgh (11-7) were more than half way home.

American league leader Dave Ferriss in Boston (17-3) followed closely in total victories by Detroit's Hal Newhouser (16-6), both a cinch to hit 20, likely to make it 25 and with an outside chance at the 30 circle. Other members hoping to graduate into the big dough to graduate were Steve Gromek of Cleveland (12-5), Dutch Leonard (11-4) and Roger Wolf (11-6) of Washington, Thornton Lee of Chicago (11-7) and Russ Christopher of Philadelphia (11-7).

Oscar Judd of the Phillies and Voiselle hooked up in a scoreless duel for 10 innings, broken in the 11th by Vince DiMaggio's two-run homer, No. 15, giving Judd a 2-0 shutout on three batters.

Chicago continued to haunt Cincinnati, making it ten in a row over the groggy Reds, 2-1, in a 10-inning duel between Passeau and Bucky Walters. Harry Lowrey's single scoring Phil Cavaretta enabled the Bruins to hold their 43-game lead on the Cards.

# Fishing Conditions Spotty Reports Game Commission

PORTLAND, July 28 (AP)—Fishing conditions in Oregon this week are spotty, the state game commission said Friday, with a few good catches in Coos and Lincoln counties.

Angling conditions were reported poor in most of Umatilla and Josephine counties and only fair in Lake county. In Tillamook county, a small number of chinook salmon are being caught in tidewater on the big Nestucca, with fair catches from the north and south forks of the Nehalem river and the Willson river.

Sportsmen find the best luck with trout early in the morning while weather is cool. Good catches of catfish were reported in the Coquille river, where bait fishermen also took some large striped bass, and at lakeside in Ten-Mile lake. Bass fishing was poor, however, in the Coos county area.

By County:—No trout being caught but a few salmon taken from Rogue river. Lincoln—Blueback trout catches in Alsea, Yaquina and Siletz rivers; a few Chinooks in Siletz and Alsea bays. Umatilla—Generally unfavorable except in south fork of Walla Walla river and north fork of John Day.

Josephine—A few small steelhead in Rogue river below Grants Pass; some trout in Tanners and Bolan lakes. Smaller streams too low and warm for good fishing. Lake—Catching in Dog lake fair; angling for bass and perch in Drews reservoir and Dog lake poor.
