## DISCHARGED VETS TO GET EXTRA GAS

Starting Friday, August 3, discharged veterans will be allowed an extra allotment of gasoline up to 30 gallons, E. W. Ferguson, district mileage rationing representative for the office of price administration, announced.

The purpose of the allotment is to aid discharged members of the armed forces to attend to personal affairs as well as making adjustment to civilian life, including travel to find employment under circumstances not otherwise provided for in the present regulations.

Since this change will apply to all servicemen separated from the armed services, the present provision for allowing a full-gallon ration for terminal leave is no longer necessary.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30 (AP) — A machine federal agents said today was a "cure all" device believed to have netted its promoters an estimated \$800,000 has been seized here on a U. S. food and drug bureau complaint.

### MOBILE X-RAY UNIT TO ARRIVE AUGUST 2

The schedule for the remainder of the time spent in Klamath county by the mobile chest x-ray unit has been announced by the Klamath county public health department, sponsors of the unit in this county.

On July 31, the unit will stop at Main in the afternoon and Merrill in the evening, and on August 1, the time will be divided between the Big Lakes Lumber company and the Ewauna Box company.

The big truck rolls into Klamath Falls on August 2 and will be in town until the morning of August 8. From here it will go to Chiloquin. On August 9, the unit will be parked at Klamath Agency and Fort Klamath; August 10, Gilchrist; August 13, Shevlin.

Appointments are being made now at the office in the courthouse. The unit is financed by the Oregon Tuberculosis association and is paid for from money from Christmas seal sales.

### Housing Unit Bids Re-Opened

Bids will be re-opened on the reconstruction of 48 civilian housing units for Klamath Falls, Howard Perrin, architect, announced today. The date has been set for August 3, at 4 p. m. in Seattle.

Six two-story buildings will be moved here from Vancouver, Wash., on this project. The houses will be moved and set up for living purposes 100 days after the contractor, to whom the bid is let, receives notice to proceed.

A lone bid from Halvorson Construction company, Salem, was received when bids for contracts were opened last week. Bidding will be re-opened in the hope of getting more bidders.

### RFC To Sell Planes On Installment Plan

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30 (AP) — Larger airplanes, including the 10 five-passenger, twin-engine Cessnas now at the Portland-Trousdale airport, now may be purchased on the installment plan, the reconstruction finance corporation said today.

William Kennedy, Portland agency manager, said the \$8500 planes could be bought for 15 per cent down, 7 1/2 per cent of the unpaid balance for insurance, and the rest in 36 monthly payments.

Kennedy also announced today a nationwide sale of government-owned paints, varnishes and lacquers, with many available at the Portland warehouse. Offers will not be considered until August 10, he said.

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According to literature connected with the machine, called a "spectro-chrome" was not for sale, but came free with a \$90 course claiming to restore "normalization of imbalance."

Agents said the device, which looks like a penny arcade picture box with a light bulb and eight colored plate glass slides, was charged with being misbranded. An attached plate said it was "for measurement and restoration of human radio-active and radio emanative equilibrium by attuned color waves."

Its inventor was listed as Col. Dinsin P. Franz Gadioli who signed himself "servant of suffering humanity" and who explains "my field—the cosmos. My faith—truth in the absolute. My aim—a spectro-chrome in every home."

Food and drug bureau officials here said his aim reached about 9000 homes from coast to coast, about 50 in Oregon where six of the machines have been located.

Leaflets of instructions said subscribers to the course could meet with others once a month at "planet" meeting places. Portland was one of eight cities listed, with the "planet" meeting in a mid-town lodge temple, Caulfield reported.

The U. S. marshal said the inventor's name is as fictitious as the list of credentials which included "M.S.C., M.D., M.E.D.C., LL.D., N.D., D. OPT., D.F.S., D.H.T., and etc."

### Waves Observe Third Birthday

Waves at the Klamath naval air station observed their third anniversary when they attended services at the Methodist church and Sacred Heart church Sunday morning.

The women were brought to town in a group and then divided into two sections to attend the services of their choice. A special birthday dinner will be served at the USO tonight, Monday, to about 50 Waves from the air station and they will later be special guests at the regular Monday night dance at the USO.

### Civilians Get Less Asparagus, Spinach

The housewife can expect less asparagus and spinach on the market as new supplies will be only about half the amount that was available for civilians from the last pack. Smaller amounts of canned apples and applesauce has also been allocated for civilian use from the 1945-46 pack, according to the OPA information division.

Good news for the housewife is the point reduction on canned grapefruit juice, blended orange and grapefruit juice, tomato catsup, and chili sauce. Under the point reduction for grapefruit, two 7 ounce cans will be available for one 10 point blue stamp. A single No. 2 can will have a point value of 10 points; the 46 ounce can is being reduced from 20 to 10 points.

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## SAFETY INSPECTOR TOURS WEST COAST

The U. S. bureau of reclamation, conducting a systematic safety checkup, has sent M. E. Flynn, safety inspector, on a tour of west coast reclamation projects, in that capacity.

Flynn arrived from Denver, Colo., Saturday, and will finish his inspection in the Klamath basin area today, touring the Tulelake district with Hugh Tolley of the bureau's Klamath office.

Safety features of structures and operating equipment are being checked, as well as safety of construction involved in contractor's work.

When the checkup here is completed, Flynn will go to the regional office at Sacramento and to Shasta, Calif.

### Prime Minister Tells Aussie Cut

CANBERRA, July 30 (AP) — Australia plans to reduce her army 50 per cent and her air force nearly as much, but considers it vital that her forces take part in the main offensive against Japan, Prime Minister J. B. Chifley told the house of representatives.

He said the army would be cut from six divisions to three and the air force from 53 squadrons to 36, but that the navy would be maintained at its present strength.

Chifley added that the government advisory war council proposed Australia's main contribution to the offensive be a royal Australian navy squadron, under its own commander, and an expeditionary unit of land and air forces operating under Australian commanders in a manner similar to the Australian imperial forces (AIF) when in the Middle East.

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## Draft To Go On After V-J Day

INDIANAPOLIS, July 30 (AP) — Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey said here Saturday that selective service will continue to draft men after V-J day.

Gen. Hershey said the necessity for maintaining strong occupation forces on two continents after V-J day would mean the continuation of drafting in order to replace men who are eligible for discharge under the point system.

"We plan to continue drafting 100,000 men a month until July, 1946," the draft director asserted. "Of course we could cut that if the war should end before then." He added that he believed the high draft rate would be continued through the next year "regardless of encouraging events."

### Man Arrested On Assault Charge

Ed Herron, employe of the Tru-Mix Concrete company, was involved in an altercation with Ed Butler, another employe, Saturday morning in which Herron reportedly slugged Butler over the head with a four-foot piece of iron pipe. The alleged assault occurred on a job near Worden, according to state police.
