

WEYGAND SAYS PETAIN MOVED TO AID ALLIES

pletely favorable" to the Germans when Africa was invaded in the fall of 1942.

It was not clear from the general's testimony whether Darlan ever received the telegram, but it was the first time anyone had stated that Petain had any part in halting French resistance to the allies.

Weygand limped into court, bowed low to Petain, and described himself as "a prisoner of val de grace."

"Coordinated resistance no longer was possible," the multi-clad general said when he decided "to ask the government to demand an armistice."

"I considered it my duty as commander in chief to ask for an armistice. I took the decision myself and on purely military grounds. There was no question of collusion with Marshal Petain."

First Hint
He said, however, that the first suggestion for an armistice came from President Albert Lebrun, one of the first witnesses against the old soldier. This was made at a war committee meeting on May 25, 1940, when Weygand said Lebrun asked if it would not be better to obtain conditions of peace before the armies were destroyed.

"I was not thinking of an armistice at that time," he said. "I was still fighting the battle of the north and I had plans prepared for the battle of the Somme-Aisne to follow it."

He denied a statement previously attributed to Petain in which Weygand reportedly was instructed to "fight until your armies no longer are in liaison and then I, Petain, will impose an armistice."

Weygand was preceded by Marcel Paul, a court witness and member of the consultative assembly, who charged the Vichy police with tortures and cruelty and blamed Petain for their actions. He said the French feared the Vichy police "ten times more than the German gendarmes."

Another member of the assembly, Paul Arrighi, testified briefly that the "ordinary Frenchman" was stupefied when the French army stopped fighting. He declared he was even more shocked when Petain met Hitler at Montoire.

The old marshal, who looked tired and pale when this eighth day of the trial began, became so enthused by Weygand's testimony that he rose during the cross examination and spoke for three minutes without halt, again breaking his vow of silence.

"I want to thank Gen. Weygand publicly and inform the court that he has my complete approval and that I consider that he, as commander in chief, carried out his duties completely," Petain said.

Weygand testified in cross examination that he and the former United States representative in North Africa, Robert Murphy, had signed an agreement which the general called the "Murphy-Weygand agreement, promising deliveries of American supplies to North Africa on condition that German occupation of the region was not permitted.

Nurses Aide Course To Begin August 1
As nurses aides are still needed in hospital work, a volunteer nurses aide training course will be given at the local Red Cross headquarters three days a week from 1 to 5 p. m. The aides will assist and be under the direct supervision of registered nurses.

Those letters and dashes and exclamation points are intended to denote a long and quivering sigh of relief. The messenger is there, and reports that everything is lovely, with the room all nailed down and the nails clinched.

We hail a cabman (one doesn't "flag a taxi" here) and go swirling around corners and along twisting streets (on the WRONG side of the road, of course) and eventually draw up at the curb, to be greeted by a doorman who makes all American doormen look like counterfeit pennies. This writer hauls out a handful of odd-looking change, and the messenger helpfully selects a coin and hands it to the cabbie who raises no hue and cry—which is reassuring, indicating that you can buy things with this stuff. We go in and register.

Up to this point, all has been strange and some of it seemingly cockeyed. The receptionist (you don't call him a room clerk here) brings the situation back to familiar ground with a bump. He says: "I'm sorry, sir, but no rooms have yet been vacated today. I'm afraid you'll have to wait awhile."

He adds a cryptic remark: "Meanwhile make yourself at home, sir. The bar is just across the lobby."

BERLIN, July 31 (AP)—Wac Sgt. Kamella Koulouvaris went to suburban Zehlendorf's city hall today to look into prospects for an annulment of her marriage to Capt. Carl G. Schultz, who has been named by a Chicago woman as her husband and the father of her two children.

Sgt. Koulouvaris found that under German law, a marriage may be annulled provided, perjury was committed by either of the principals in getting a license. Service personnel must also have a military certificate that they are eligible to wed.

thinks congress should set up the office and define its powers.

"A law of this kind not only is necessary to satisfactorily qualify the delegate, but I also think it was promised to satisfy the senate," Vandenberg told a reporter.

Taft's View
Senator Taft of Ohio, chairman of the republican steering committee said he thought "the whole senate will insist on its being done" that way.

"It was clearly understood in the debate on the charter that congress would create the office of the delegate, that his appointment would be confirmed by the senate and that his duties and authority would be carefully defined," Taft asserted.

Promises Fight
Taft said he had no objection to President Truman's appointment of Stettinius, former secretary of state, as a temporary delegate to the international organization's preparatory meetings. But he added he would fight in the senate to force consideration of enabling legislation he said Connally and others had promised.

Connally's stand won quick support, however, from Senator Lucas (D-Ill.).

"I don't believe the senate can now lay down any specific rules and regulations to guide the power of the member of the security council," Lucas asserted.

Stalin Returns To Big Three Confab

POTSDAM, July 31 (AP)—Premier Marshal Stalin attended a three and a half hour Big Three conference today after a two-day absence caused by a slight head cold, it was announced tonight.

Stalin's slight illness had prevented his conversations since Sunday with President Truman and Prime Minister Attlee.

It appeared, however, that further interruptions were unlikely.

Meetings of the American, British and Russian foreign secretaries have been continuing as usual since the last meeting between the three top conferees Saturday night, it was understood. This led to belief the conference might have progressed to the final decision stage.

Western Defense Has Say On Japs

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31 (AP)—The army reiterated today that its western defense command has the sole responsibility of determining which persons of Japanese ancestry may or may not be permitted to return to Pacific coast states.

All were excluded from the west, for security reasons, at the start of the war. Major Gen. H. C. Pratt, head of the western defense command, issued a statement to clarify this jurisdiction because, he said, of an apparent "erroneous impression" some of the public has received. He emphasized that the WRA has no authority in the matter.

Fossil Bed Found Near Rogue River

EUGENE, July 31 (AP)—A marine fossil newly discovered near the mouth of the Rogue river attracted University of Oregon scientists yesterday.

Remains of an animal distantly related to the chambered nautilus and of prehistoric oysters particularly attracted Dr. Warren D. Smith, geology professor.

aged and at least 60 airfields bombed-pocked.

Simultaneous strikes by fighters and bombers from Okinawa and Iwo Jima added 40 more ocean going surface craft to the day's toll.

Received Figures
Revised figures on last Saturday's allied carrier sweep over the inland sea and the huge Kure naval base listed 147 vessels and 292 aircraft wrecked, including two aircraft carriers damaged and a cruiser sunk which had not been previously listed.

Twenty more ships and surface craft, destroyed or damaged during the same period over a wide area were reported by General MacArthur. These included an aircraft carrier hit at Kure Sunday.

Extensive damage to factories, including a power works, and other ground installations was reported. Additionally all types of air sweeps over Japan, China and Indo-China knocked out 72 enemy locomotives at least temporarily.

Suicide Tactics
All Japanese over 14 in occupied China were reported undergoing hurried but realistic military training "in which fire belches forth and blood is drawn" in preparation for "the enemy's coastal landing plan."

The Japanese expect this blow to fall north of Shanghai.

The civilian volunteer corps in the homeland was told by Home Minister Genki Abe to use suicide tactics to meet invading forces.

One task of the corps is to increase Nippon's food supply. Washington authorities said Japan is very short of food but is not facing starvation.

Field dispatches told of well-fed Japanese troops bitterly resisting allied mop up forces in the Solomons and Philippines.

The Nipponese garrison on Bougainville island in the Solomons was reported reinforced by garrisons from the Shortland Islands.

City Firemen Burn Weeds

City firemen have started burning off vacant lots and weed patches this week, starting in the Shippington area Monday and burning near Riverside school Tuesday morning.

County fire equipment was called out on another small grass fire in the Lindley Heights area Monday afternoon which did no property damage. Tuesday morning they were called to the Edgar Turner place on Walton Drive to put out a fire in a haystack. Damage was not great.
