

SURVEY SHOWS WESTERN STATE CROPS FERTILE

CHICAGO, Aug. 2 (AP)—Crops in the broad belt of America lying between the Appalachians and the Rockies presented a warmly fertile picture today—the result of farmers' work and good growing weather during July—but in the east the prospects were overcast by clouds and humidity.

The far west also shared in the midwestern agricultural optimism, an Associated Press survey showed. California still expected to ship one-tenth of the nation's food supply, the rail situation permitting, while Oregon reported crops in good shape, although spring wheat was hurt some by drought. The eastern Washington-northern Idaho triangle likewise reported some drought damage.

However, farm machinery

whirled and rumbled across the great plains, the rich Mississippi valley and on east and in the south. Only east of the Appalachians chain were farmers faced with lower yields from some of their crops.

Preliminary reports from growers at Spokane, Wash., indicate considerable cut in spring wheat yields in eastern Washington-northern Idaho grain as a result of extended hot weather early in July.

The weather bureau in Chicago said that in general two broad air movements had occurred during July. One, a polar mass from Canada, and the second a tropical mass from the south. The polar mass produced the cool first half of the month while the tropical mass dominated during the second half.

Over the Atlantic states a stationary high pressure area checked the normal flow of air, producing adverse conditions, while on the other side of the continent air movements were normal.

VALLEY HAS HOTTEST JULY SINCE 1941

The hottest July in Klamath Valley since 1941 has just past, according to weather records from the U. S. bureau of reclamation, Klamath office.

The mean temperature for July 1945 was 71.2 degrees which was higher than normal for the month and the highest for July in five years. Maximum temperature during the month was 95 and minimum was 45 degrees.

July, 1945, was a dry month with the exception of .03 inches of precipitation recorded on July 11. This was the least precipitation for the month since 1942 when the record was only .02. Normal for July is .29 inches.

There were 26 clear days in July this year, three partly cloudy, and two cloudy days during the month.

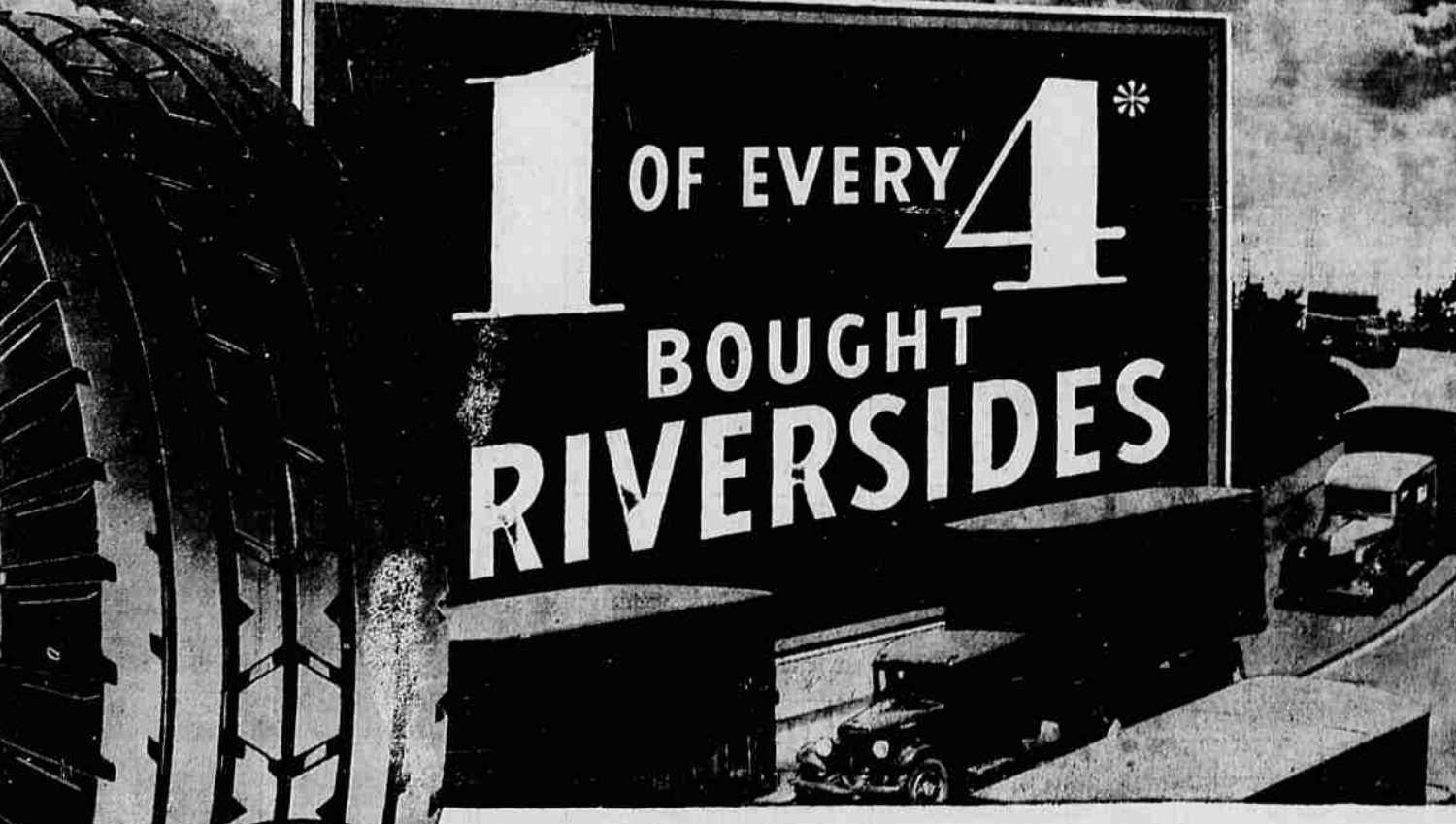
Both men are employed by Pelican Bay and were hunting deer on the Klamath Indian reservation, according to state police.
