Dutch Wait
The Dutch government is waiting to determine what popular reaction to the proposals may be. The claim is based on the fact that while they were occupying Holland the Germans destroyed hundreds of thousands of acres of rich agricultural lands by flooding.

The Big Three decision to put Poland's western boundaries on the Oder and Neisse rivers together with the division of East Prussia between Poland and Russia already has sliced off 40,000 square miles of land which was German in 1937 when Hitler began adding stolen lands. At that time Germany embraced 181,000 square miles.

The bombers, of course, were old stuff. There were methods of defense against them. The buzz-bombs, in time, became old huff, and methods of defense against them were developed—not effective in every case, naturally, but CUTTING DOWN the menace, causing you to feel that measure of fierce pride, if not actual security, that comes with hitting back effectively at your enemy.

There was NO DEFENSE against the rocket bombs. When they were launched, they soared miles up into the sky in a vast arc and they came more or less straight down. And they traveled faster than sound, so that there was no warning of their approach.

The nazis were beginning to get the buzz-bombs tamed. An air officer told this writer the other day that they were targeted on Buckingham palace—not just on southern England, not even on the city of London as a whole. At a SPECIFIC target. The amount of damage within a few blocks of Buckingham palace makes one think there may have been something to the story.
When the end came, the rocket bombs were still going wild, still incapable of aim at anything more definite than a COUNTRY. But the buzz-bombs were improved rapidly after they were started, giving reason to believe that the rocket bombs might be similarly improved as to aim.
You can understand why people here are so glad the nazis were licked IN TIME.

Traffic Bulletin Lists Oregon Toll

SALEM, Aug. 4 (AP)—Traffic accidents in Oregon last year claimed a total of 245 lives, brought injury to 5845 other persons and caused an economic loss of \$11,025,000, the new 1945 edition of Oregon traffic accident facts reveals.

The bulletin on traffic accidents is issued each year by the safety division of the secretary of state's office.
"The fact that traffic deaths in Oregon last year were about five per cent higher than the toll of 1943 indicates a need for exercise of greater care on the part of the driving public, Robert S. Farrell Jr., secretary of state, said in announcing the distribution of the new booklet.

Hunter's Hopes For 90-Day Waterfowl Season Dashed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—Secretary of Interior Ickes today announced the 1945 waterfowl hunting regulations and dashed some hunters' hopes for a 90-day season.

Besides continuing the season at last year's 90-day limit, despite many requests for an extension, Ickes returned the daily bag limit on most ducks to ten. Last year hunters were allowed an extra five.

The regulations established the opening season for waterfowl as September 20 in the northern zone, October 13 in the intermediate zone and November 2 in the southern zone.

Except for the change in the daily bag limit, there were few significant changes. No open season was provided for ducks and swans; woodcock in Massachusetts and North Dakota; snow geese in Beaverhead, Gallatin and Madison counties

LAVAL SAYS NAZIS ORDERED HIS PROTEST

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expressed hope for German victory. He said he had given his reason for making this talk when Admiral William D. Leahy demanded an explanation, but did not detail the conversation with Leahy, then U. S. ambassador to Vichy.

Testifying in the trial of Marshal Petain, Laval said: "A few days after that broadcast Admiral Leahy and Mr. S. Pinkney Tuck (counselor to the U. S. embassy at Vichy) came to see me. I explained the reason for the statement, what I meant by it, and the practical effects of it."

Laval did not relate the reaction of Leahy, now chief of staff to President Truman. In a letter read earlier at the Petain trial, Leahy expressed belief that the 89-year-old marshal always had acted in the best interests of France.

Leahy Mentioned
Laval's mention of Leahy came after a defense attorney asked if the United States had made any moves to break diplomatic relations with Vichy after the broadcast by Laval speaking a Hitler victory.

A juror remarked that Laval should know "that after his departure yesterday Marshal Petain said that he insisted on the removal of that phrase from the radio speech." Petain told the court he was amazed when he heard the speech delivered with the disputed passage.

Laval testified yesterday he broadcast the statement "I desire a Germany victory" only after Petain made him change the wording from "I believe in a Germany victory."

"Today, in response to the juror, Laval said: "I stand on what I said. The marshal deleted the word 'believed' and left the word 'desire.' And he was not indignant at all."

Irish Wake Holds Up Fight Between Wandering Tinkers

GALWAY, Eire, Aug. 4 (AP)—The Irish Tinkers had a wake, not a coronation, last night when 18-year-old Martin Collins, a member of one of the itinerant tribes, drowned while bathing in the sea.

His death caused the postponement of the scheduled finish fight between Martin Ward, who claims direct descent from Bard

Macanbhard, and Patrick Dodd of Tuam for the title of "King of the Irish Tinkers" and the right to choose any of the tribes' loveliest colts for a bride.

The wandering members of pots and pans who had gathered for the great drinking bout, the fight and the ensuing coronation, scattered today as Collins' king made arrangements for his funeral.

It was understood the Tinkers would gather again at Ballinasloe, in Galway county, the first week in October for the showdown between Ward and Dodd.

Thirteen more enemy vessels were knocked out by air forces operating in southern waters under MacArthur.

Japanese suicide planes sank one U. S. ship and damaged another in one of their now rare counterattacks at the growing Okinawa base 350 miles south of Japan. The attack Sunday was announced today by Admiral Nimitz, co-commander with MacArthur of the on-to-Tokyo forces.

The mikado today posthumously decorated his ranking army and naval commanders on Okinawa who committed suicide in the face of defeat.

Chinese Troops Launch New Drive

CHUNGKING, Aug. 4 (AP)—Chinese troops have launched a drive apparently aimed at cutting the Hunan-Kwangsi railroad in Hunan province and blocking the main avenue of the Japanese withdrawal from Kwangsi province, the high command indicated today.

The Chinese, after recapturing the important Japanese stronghold of Sining, a Hunan province stronghold safeguarding the enemy's western flank, smashed ahead in the direction of the important rail town of Tungan in Hunan, is roughly midway between Kweilin and the Japanese bastion of Hengyang, where the Hunan-Kwangsi railroad meets the Canton-Hankow line.

The blazes, which were put out before they did much damage, were at Chiloquie and west of Sprague River. Elsewhere the fire situation was being kept carefully under control, according to available reports.
