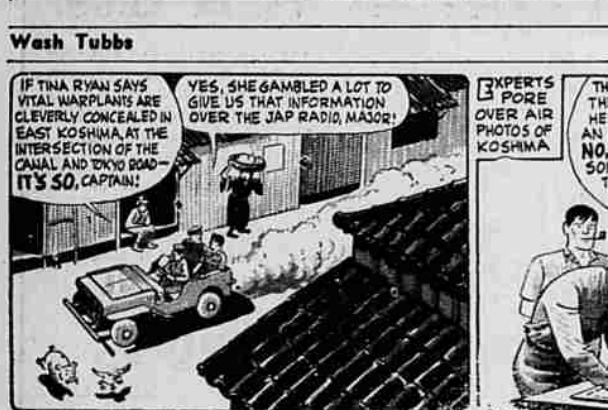
Jack apparently has a little cannibal ancestry in him as he bit chunks out of Dussette all night with what seemed to be an insatiable appetite.

Seals Trip Suds Twice; Bevos Split

San Francisco's Seals draped black crepe on Seattle's Pacific Coast league pennant hopes last night.

The Rainiers, battling to keep pace with the top-spot Portland Beavers, met double defeat in the Bay City stadium. Big Bob Joyce, Lefty O'Doul's ace-in-the-hole, pitched one of his most brilliant games of the season to limit the northwesterners to one hit and win the curtain raiser of a double-header 1-0 for his 24th victory. The Seals came from behind to shade Seattle in the finale 4-3.

Meanwhile, the Beavers were splitting a twin bill with the Hollywood Stars, they dropped the first game 4-2 but came back for a 6-4 triumph in the nightcap to stretch their league lead to seven full games.

Sacs Take Two

Sacramento's Solons took two from the Los Angeles Angels in the third double feature of the evening. Bud Beasley, the circuit's top hurler, won his 10th of the year in the opener 4-2. The skidding Seraphs dropped the afterpiece 9-3.

San Diego evened its series with the Oakland A's at three-all with a 6-4 victory, dropping the Oaks two full games behind the fourth-place Seals.

Joyce's win broke a four-game San Francisco losing streak. Joe Dobbins got the only Seattle safety in the sixth when he smashed out a clean double to center. The Seals pushed over their one run in the fourth when Neil Sheridan beat out an infield single, went to third on Bill Eno's one-bagger and scored on Ray Perry's center field fly. Carl Fischer, who held the O'Doulmen to four hits, was charged with his ninth defeat of the season against 14 wins. Bob Barthelson got credit for the Seals' 4-3 nightcap decision as his mates pounded Glenn Elliott for three tallies in the seventh and Releifer Byron Speece for one in the eighth to overcome a 3-0 deficit.

Roy Helser, 16-game winner for the Beavers, suffered his ninth loss as Hollywood took their first game of the series, 4-2. The Stars scored all their runs in the fourth. The league pacemakers had little trouble copping the afterpiece 6-4 behind the southpaw slants of Syd Cohen, who rang up his 10th win at the expense of right-hander Ronnie Smith. Portland has now won 21 out of 26 games from the cellar-dwellers and holds a 4-1 edge in the series.



Cubs Sweep Double Bill From Reds

Charley Grimm can thank his "Cousins from Cincinnati" for paying the pennant road for his Chicago Cubs by contributing 13 straight games to the league leaders in the season's most consistent performance.

Although the Bruins are far from "in" with a six-game lead, their main worry today is the Cardinals but the thought that this happy season series with the Reds has only seven more games to go.

Their favorite playmates took it on the chin again yesterday, but twice, bowing in both halves of a two-night doubleheader before the superior chucking of a couple of fellows named Hank (Wyse and Borowy).

Although Deacon Bill McKeechic of the Reds thinks the Cubs have trouble ahead in St. Louis, his team hasn't been able to beat the leaders once all year. The record for such matters is 21 out of 22 meetings in a season, held jointly by the 1927 Yankees, 1937 Pirates and 1939 Cubs. Nobody ever has swept a complete set of 22 tilts in modern days.

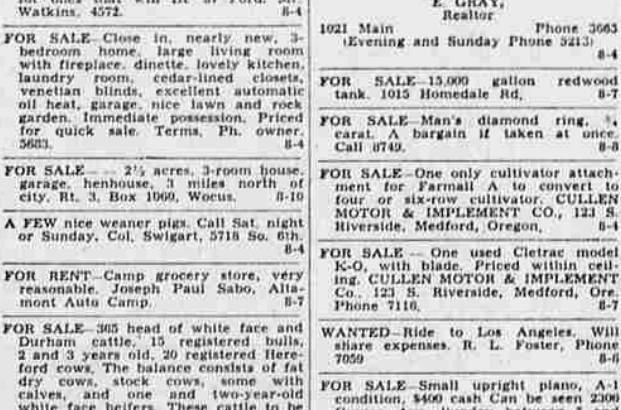
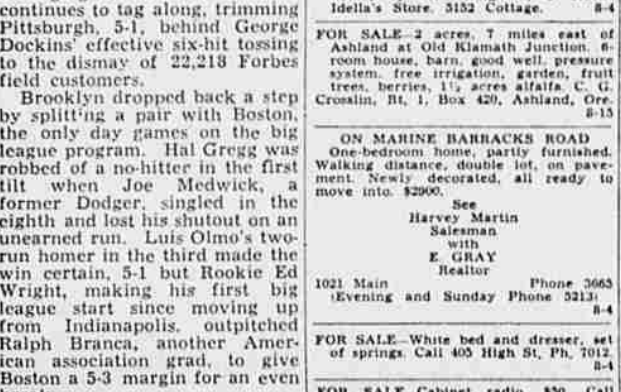
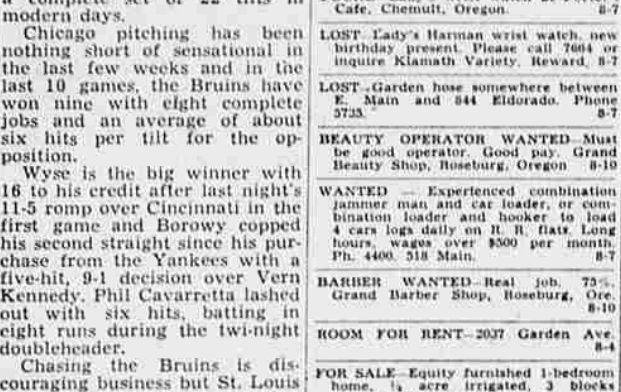
Chicago pitching has been nothing short of sensational in the last few weeks and in the last games, the Bruins have won nine with eight complete jobs and an average of about six hits per tilt for the opposition.

Wyse is the big winner with 16 to his credit after last night's 11-5 romp over Cincinnati in the first game and Borowy copped his second straight since his purchase from the Yankees with a five-hit, 9-1 decision over Vern Kennedy. Phil Cavarretta lashed out with six hits, batting in eight runs during the two-night doubleheader.

Chasing the Bruins is discouraging business but St. Louis continues to tag along, trimming Pittsburgh, 5-1, behind George Dockins' effective six-hit tossing to the dismay of 22,213 Forbes field customers.

Brooklyn dropped back a step by splitting a pair with Boston, the only day games on the big league program. Hal Gregg was robbed of a no-hitter in the first tilt when Joe Medwick, a former Dodger, singled in the eighth and lost his shutout on an unearned run. Luis Olmo's two-run homer in the third made the win certain, 5-1 but Frankie Ed Wright, making his first big league start since moving up from Indianapolis, outpitched Ralph Branca, another American association grad, to give Boston a 5-3 margin for an even break.

St. Louis shaded Cleveland, 6-5, on a four-run rally in the sixth inning including Vern Stephens' 15th homer.



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
