New Sugar Stamp To Replace No. 37

Housewives who are getting panicky because they do not have either sugar stamp 37 or spare stamp 37 need not worry, although they may be wondering what will happen when sugar stamp 36 expires August 31.

Willard Case, district food rationing officer, explained that because a lot of people by mistake sent in sugar stamp 37 instead of spare stamp 37 last summer as identification to get canning sugar, the office of price administration cancelled both 37's months ago.

"This was done to avoid confusion and will not result in a loss of sugar. A new sugar stamp, probably No. 38, will become valid September 1," Case assured.
