

Buddy Lewis Paces Nats To Twin Win Over Bosox; Trail Tigers By 1/2 Game

Buddy Lewis today appeared well on his way to completing his 369th major league season.

The former army air force captain, who flew 368 missions over "the hump" in India, was the brightest star in baseball yesterday as the Washington Senators moved to within a half game of first place in the American league by sweeping both ends of a double header from the Boston Red Sox 5-4 and 5-1.

The 29-year-old outfield ace figures mission 369 will hit the mark if he makes a successful comeback and guides the Senators to their first pennant in a dozen years.

Nats Close In

Since rejoining his mates, Lewis has sparked the Nats to 10 triumphs in their last 13 games to gain five full games on the league-leading Detroit Tigers.

Lewis' 14th inning single drove in George Myatt with the winning run in yesterday's opener and his three safeties plus two runs scored were the main factors in copping the duke in the finale. Buddy also contributed brilliant work in the field, his 10 putouts in the twin bill, including a brilliant catch which started a double play, being instrumental in catching wins No. 10 for Pitcher Mickey Haefner and No. 13 for Roger Wolf.

Chicago's White Sox added to Detroit's misery by belting the Bengals twice 12-8 and 3-2, winning the nightcap with a three-run rally in the ninth. The double win made it four in a row for Chicago over the Tigers.

Trailing 6-2, the Chisox knocked Dizzy Trout off the mound with a pair of four-run frames to annex the first. Wally Moses' run-produced single climaxed the last inning rally against Les Mueller in the after-piece, ending the Tiger rookie's string of 24 consecutive scoreless innings.

Cubs Down Reds
Chicago's growling Cubs clawed Cincinnati twice, 12-5 and 2-1, to stretch their first place lead in the National league to six games over the second place St. Louis Cards, Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler says the Cubs make it 17 out of 18 against the Rhinelanders.

Fritz Ostermueller, making his initial start for Pittsburgh since his discharge from the army, was credited with his first victory of the season as the Pirates split with the cards. Red Barrett won his 15th for the Redbirds in the opener, 10-3, with a Buccaneer seven-run upsurge siding Ostermueller in a 12-5 win.

Philadelphia's last place athletics stunned the New York Yankees twice 6-3 and 4-3 to end their 10-game losing streak. Dick Siebert drove in four Mackmen with a double and triple in the opener and started a three-run rally with a single in the nightcap.

For the second time in three days, a Brooklyn pitcher held the Boston Braves hitting for seven innings as Red Herring blanked the Hubmen in the opener 7-0. The Braves, led by Tommy Holmes and Joe Medwick, who made four hits apiece, won the nightcap however, 10-3. Bostonian Charley Workman assumed the league's leadership in homers by clouting his 16th.

New York's Giants dumped the Philadelphia Phillies twice, 14-5 and 4-2 in 13 innings, with Danny Gardella's homer deciding the nightcap. Cleveland and St. Louis' Browns split. Jeff Heath's three-run homer in the ninth won the opener 6-3 for the Indians, with the "Sweetswell" finishing out a 10-9 verdict in the finale.

Givan closed with a 68, four under par. Charles D. Hunter of Tacoma, pressed Givan Saturday and early Sunday but took a 79 in the final round and wound up in a fourth place tie at 225 with Harry Andrews, Tacoma; James Shriver, Spokane, and Wilfred O'Brien, Seattle.

Harry Umbinetti of Seattle, winner of the meet two years ago, was nine strokes behind Givan with 223 for second place. Arnold Levenagor of Tacoma took third with 224.

DETROIT, Aug. 6 (AP)—Baseball's statistics hounds who still can't understand why the Detroit Tigers are leading the American league by plenty with a run production that ranks sixth in the league can take a look at big Al Benton's pitching record as a pointed "F" instance.

Benton, the navy dischargee with a 0.89 earned run average, started 14 times and stayed through 10 complete games while winning 10 and losing two.

In his 111 innings opponents have made 78 hits (19 of them the infield variety) and scored just 44 runs (three of them unearned).

Working the equivalent of 12 full games, Benton has given only nine extra-base hits, losing 1.0 to Washington and 2-1 to Philadelphia.

The hapless Stars dropped three straight to the circuit leaders over the weekend to give the Beavers a 7-1 edge in the series. The movietown club lost 3-6 Saturday and 4-7, 5-14 Sunday for its 13th defeat in the last 14 games with Portland and 24th out of 29 for the season.

Suds Cop Twin Bill
Seattle salvaged a series with the San Francisco Seals by winning both ends of a Sunday twin bill 17-4 and 6-3 after dropping Saturday's encounter 7-8 to make it five out of eight for the week.

Sacramento brought further woe to southern California representatives in the league by overwhelming the Los Angeles Angels with an 8-1 series victory, winning 3-1 Saturday and 5-3, 3-2 Sunday. The Solons are now firmly situated in third place, four tilts ahead of the Seals and Oakland Acons.

The Oaks moved into a tie with San Francisco for fourth by beating the San Diego Padres six out of nine, sweeping the weekend contests 13-5 Saturday and 4-2, 8-3 yesterday.

Busher Looms As Greatest Filly In Racing History

CHICAGO, Aug. 6 (AP)—A sleek little chestnut-colored race horse, daughter of War Admiral and granddaughter of the all-time great Man O' War, is out to become the greatest money-winner of her sex in history, and by the looks of things only an accident can stop her.

She's Busher, from the stable of Louis B. Mayer, Hollywood film executive. Busher proved Saturday that she fears no rival on race track, whether colts or

other fillies, as she romped in four-and-a-half lengths ahead of the field in the \$53,480 Arlington handicap at Washington park.

That victory — her sixth in seven starts this year, and 11th in 14 starts over a two-year span — boosted the pretty three-year-old's winnings by \$32,900 to a total of \$201,920. At the rate she has been going, a few more starts and she'll pass the all-time record of \$275,900 set by Top Flight. Right now she's only \$245 off the mark of \$202,165 set by Twilight Tear, last year's "horse of the year." That figure is next to the best for fillies.

A total of 259,348 fans sent \$11,659,432 through the mutual machines at 11 tracks Saturday, topped by 39,918 and \$3,560,518 at Jamaica, Garden State, with a \$2,083,730 handle, and Ascot, with \$1,358,556 set new track records.
