

ALTURAS' NEW MILL TO OPEN ON WEDNESDAY

ALTURAS, Aug. 7.—The Pickering lumber mill built here in 1929 at a cost of several million dollars and which has laid dormant since its completion, owing to the demise of the elder Pickering, will start operations Wednesday, under the ownership of the Goose Lake Logging company.

The property was purchased by Sam Jacksick, well known lumberman of Reno, Nev., early this year. Since acquiring the property, Jacksick has had a large gang of men remodeling the mill and installing machinery.

Timber for the mill has been purchased from the government and is being cut under the supervision of the local forest service office. The method used in the cutting assures a 50-year supply of logs. Logs are being hauled from the woods to the mill by truck.

Jacksick states the mill will cut 8000 feet of lumber per hour and two shifts will be employed depending on the labor situation. All the waste material will be utilized in the manufacture of pre-sto-logs, plastics and other by-products.

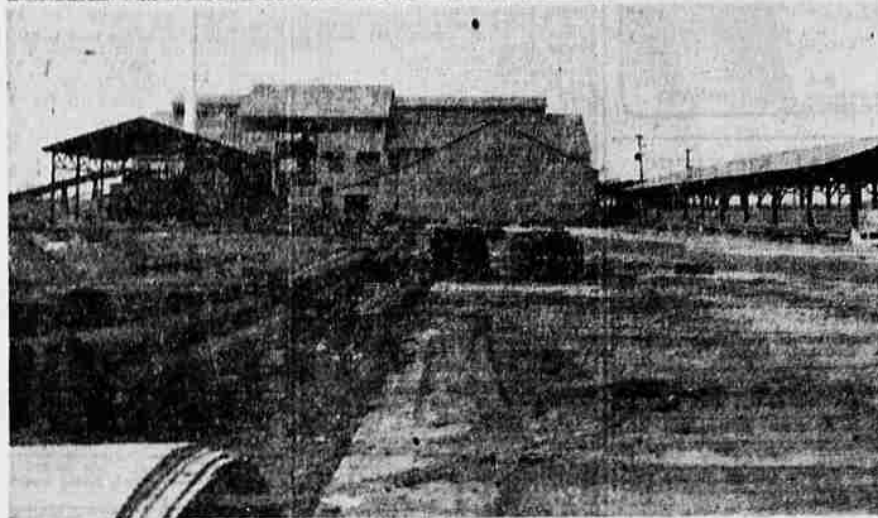
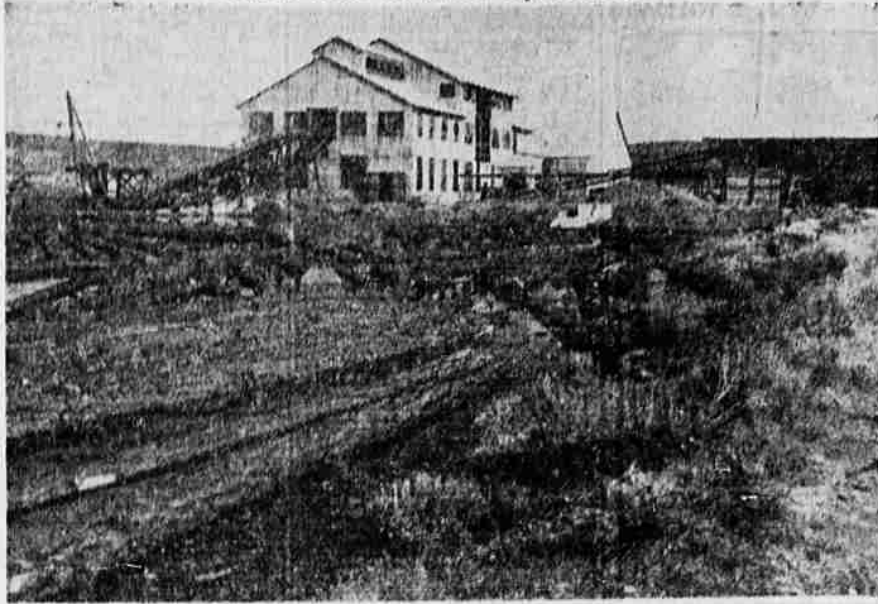
Guild Holds Birthday Picnic

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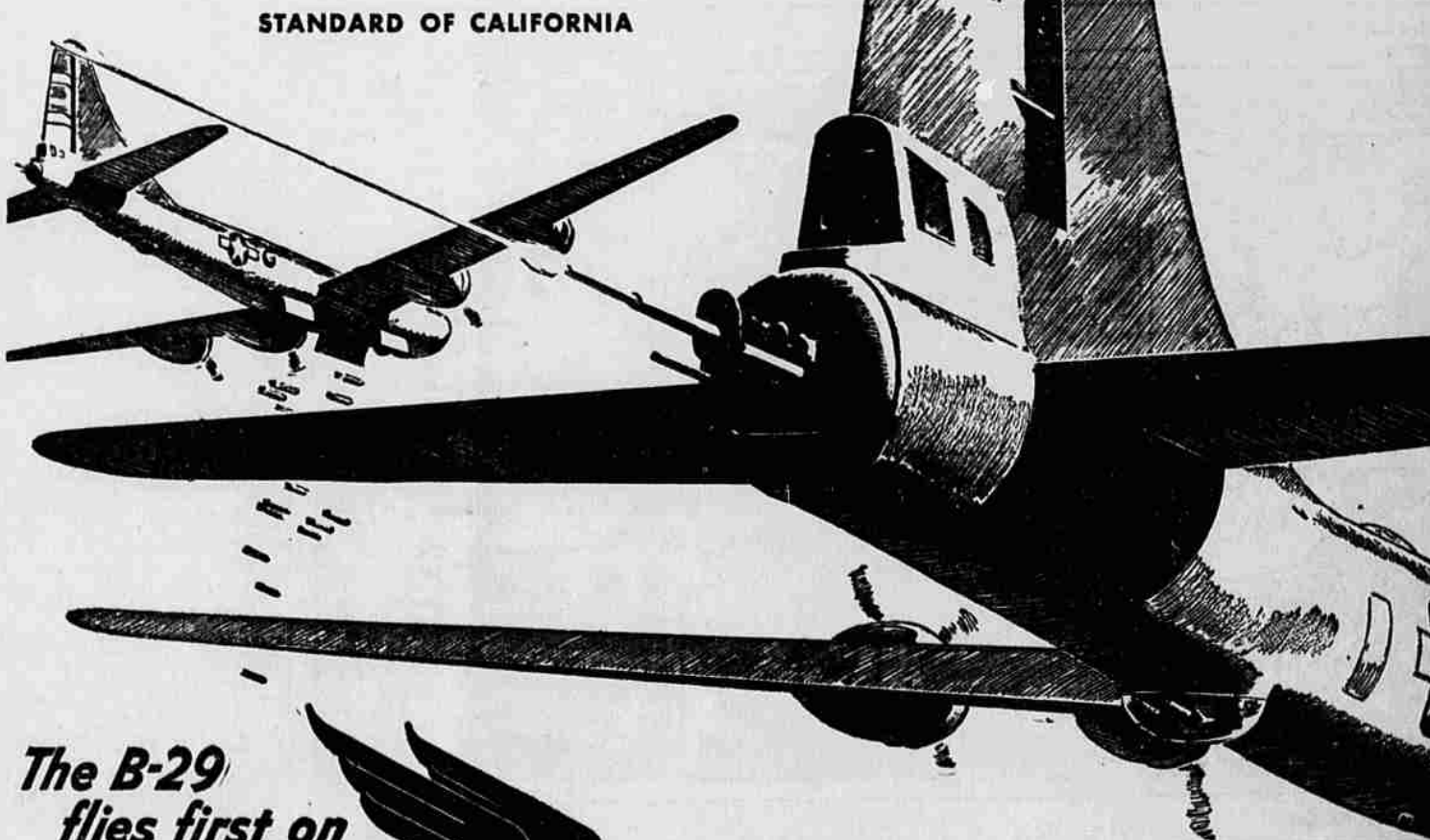
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
