

EARL'S MARKET TO CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARY

TULELAKE—Celebrating the 10th anniversary of Earl's market, patrons and friends are invited to be guests of the management all day Saturday, August 11. The invitation was extended by Earl Ager, pioneer Tulelake merchant, and his employees.

Refreshments will be served free of charge all day. There will be entertainment from 4:30 to 7:30 p. m. and two \$25 war bonds will be given away at 6 p. m.

Ager, a native of Siskiyou county, came to Tulelake in 1929 from Yreka. He built the first business structure, a warehouse, to go up on the Tulelake townsite. This building is now occupied by the Klamath Basin cooperative. He operated a farm implement business and sold the first plow.

Ten years ago he opened Earl's market, a small "hole in the wall" with two employees. Five years later the building on Modoc and Main street, now occupied by his grocery, meat department and cold locker business, one of the most modern in northern California, was put up at a cost of \$56,000. Today, he has 16 employees and on August 11 the store served 1300 customers in the grocery department alone.

The store building has the largest floor space of any grocery between Portland and Oakland, has a mezzanine occupied by the Haas beauty salon and office of G. W. Osborne and sons, potato growers; Tom Thorn, potato buyer, and Charles Luther, grain buyer. The cooler room and quick freeze departments with 612 lockers are supervised by H. S. Haas. Hugh Wilson is in charge of the grocery department; E. T. Wilder, of the meat department; Lee Nichols, produce; Naomia Crowther, fountain, and Mrs. Beulah Clinton, bookkeeper.

Council Awards Contract Here

At a special adjourned meeting Wednesday of the Klamath city council, contract for the sprinkler watering system at the cemetery was awarded Inter-Mountain Plumbing company.

This company's bid was about \$2000 lower than Associate Engineers of California and C. A. Dunn, the two other contractors who submitted bids for the job.

The Inter-Mountain Plumbing company, whose headquarters are in Boise, Ida., has been working at the Marine Barracks and naval air station, maintaining an office in Klamath Falls for the past two years.

Large whirling type sprinklers will be set up in the cemetery grounds about January, 1946, and delivery on the pump is expected in 60 days. Remote control will be installed for the pump later, it was stated.

The council authorized the city attorney to prepare an ordinance and resolution, and authorized the mayor and the judge to sign the contract.

Attlee Hails Red Entry Into War

LONDON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Britain today officially hailed the Russian declaration of war on Japan as a step which will hasten the end of the conflict.

Prime Minister Clement Attlee said the Russian action was "proof of the solidarity that exists between the principal allies" and predicted that it would "shorten the struggle."

Sister Of Jesse James' Killer Dies

EXCELSIOR SPRINGS, Mo., Aug. 9 (AP)—Mrs. Amanda Frances Siegel, 90, sister of the man who killed Jesse James, died yesterday in the 124-year-old log cabin where she began housekeeping in 1877.

It was her older brother, Bob Ford, who shot and killed the notorious Missouri outlaw at James' home in St. Joseph in 1882. Bob, along with his brother, Charles Ford, were sentenced to be hanged for James' death, but were pardoned by Gov. Thomas T. Crittenden.

Nazi Spies Made 'Double Agents'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—The FBI said today that five German spies sent to the United States after 1939 to learn of atomic bomb developments were persuaded to double cross the nazis and work as counter-espionage agents.

"Several" of the spies were intercepted in Europe and South America en route to this country and made "double agents" before they launched any espionage activities for the nazis, an FBI spokesman said. He would not disclose their names.

JAPS INTERNEED
NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (AP)—The Tokyo radio cited a Moscow broadcast today as saying that Japanese ambassador to Moscow, Naotake Sato, the embassy staff and Japanese press correspondents, were interned in the Japanese embassy following the Soviet Union's declaration of war. The broadcast was recorded by the Associated Press.

Marines Fight Shasta Forest Fire

TOKYO TELLS OF SLASHES IN 'SECOND FRONT'

Tokyo broadcasts that Russian troops had gone into action and that fierce fighting was taking place along the Manchurian border.

Moscow Broadcast

But a Moscow broadcast to red army soldiers declared "Our troops already are marching against the enemy."

A broadcast Domei dispatch said Russian forces had battered across the eastern frontier of Manchuria at "several points" along a 300-mile line extending southward from Hutou to Hun-chun. Hutou, just across the soviet-Manchuria border, is 350 miles east of Harbin, and Hun-chun is about 240 miles south-east of that key industrial and communications center, regarded as a prime Russian objective.

The attack from the west, Tokyo said, was launched in the vicinity of Lupin (Manchouli), in the northwestern elbow of the winding Manchurian border, about 500 air miles northwest of Harbin.

Russian Strike

A Japanese imperial headquarters communique said the Russians struck across both the eastern and western frontiers, beginning shortly after midnight. This suggested a vast pincer movement against the crack Kwangtung army, pride of Emperor Hirohito's forces, believed massed in Manchuria.

At the same time, the enemy communique said, soviet planes raided targets in northern Korea and northern Manchuria in separate actions.

The broadcasts were recorded by the Associated Press.

The enemy bulletin declared puppet Manchurian troops had joined the Japanese in counter-attacks.

"Unlawful"

Tokyo said the Manchurian puppet government this morning proclaimed a defense decree for the entire nation "against the soviet army's unlawful invasion."

"At the same time," the dispatch said, "the government called an extraordinary meeting of the state council and took steps for giving immediate full play to the nation's power, thereby putting in order the government and people's front for repulsing the red army."

Senior members of "Dai Nippon Seijaki," most influential political party in Japan, held an emergency meeting at the diet building in Tokyo to discuss counter measures capable of meeting the sudden development in the war situation following the soviet union's declaration of war against Japan, another Tokyo broadcast said.

"It is understood the meeting will be held again tomorrow to decide the party's policy to be presented to the government as well as the high command," the broadcast added.

Boy Killed While Playing Soldier

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—Seven-year-old Robert G. Turner was killed instantly today when shot in the heart by one of two friends with whom he was playing "commando," police said.

Mrs. Rosemond Robbins, mother of the children, Elray, 9, and Jackie, 7, was not at home when the act occurred, but said the elder girl held the rifle that killed the boy.

She said the children, who also were playing with two knives, believed the gun was not loaded.

AIR ACTION

CALCUTTA, Aug. 9 (AP)—Widespread allied air action against targets in Sumatra, in lower Burma and along the Bangkok-Singapore railway was announced today by Southeast Asia command headquarters.

CIO STOPPAGE SPREADING IN INDUSTRY HERE

gathered along the road outside the gate.

Fire protection crew men, company officials and office employees went through the picket line without hindrance. The spirit at the gate was jovial, and some of the idle employees struck up a crap game on the pavement at the side of the road.

Manager Ralph Macartney and Assistant Manager Hugh Campbell drove by in their cars without stopping. Charles Mack, Weyerhaeuser public relations officer, took pictures and joked with the pickets and other employees. A bus carrying girl office workers went through at fast speed, and pickets requested Mack to warn the bus driver that such speed might be dangerous.

Expect Spread

Picket linesmen talked soberly about the strike. They said they expected the stoppage to spread to CIO operations at Bend and McCloud, and added that "it might go to the Columbia river." They indicated the situation had been expected to develop about August 18, but that an incident at Weyerhaeuser camp 4, where a nightwatchman refused to join the union, touched it off two weeks early.

Vernon Chase, CIO official, stated that in addition to the immediate causes and purposes of the strike, there had been long-standing difficulties and that CIO unionists had evidently decided to have a showdown.

Manager Macartney said that it was his understanding that the

strike is aimed at the west coast lumber commission of the WLB, inasmuch as the matters involved were in the hands of that commission rather than the company.

The present base wage rate here is 87 1/2 cents an hour, and it is understood the union wants this boosted to \$1.15. It was reported that last spring such a request was made, and was referred to the federal conciliation commission. Local lumber operators were advised that George Brewer, commissioner of the conciliation service, has notified employers of a meeting to be held at the Willard hotel here August 13 and 14 to consider the proposed increase. Lumbermen pointed out that government regulations require approval of wage increases.

Chet Irving, manager of the Pine Industrial Relations committee, employer's labor relations group, said it appears that the strike here is illegal under the war labor disputes act, which sets out procedure for strikes. He added that the AFL is now engaged in carrying out the legal procedure for a strike vote.

Federal conciliation representatives were here today, but would make no comment to the press.

zone. His authority will embrace Nuernberg, where such defendants as Hermann Goering and Joachim von Ribbentrop will be arraigned in the first case before a four-power military tribunal from which there will be no appeal.

A pact to establish a tribunal for speedy trials, intended to demonstrate that aggression leads "to the prisoner's dock rather than to honors," was signed by representatives of the United States, Britain, Russia and France in London yesterday.

Justice Robert H. Jackson, chief U. S. prosecutor for war

crime cases, signed for the United States. A spokesman for Jackson announced last week that the first trial would open in Nuernberg, former nazi shrine city, September 1.

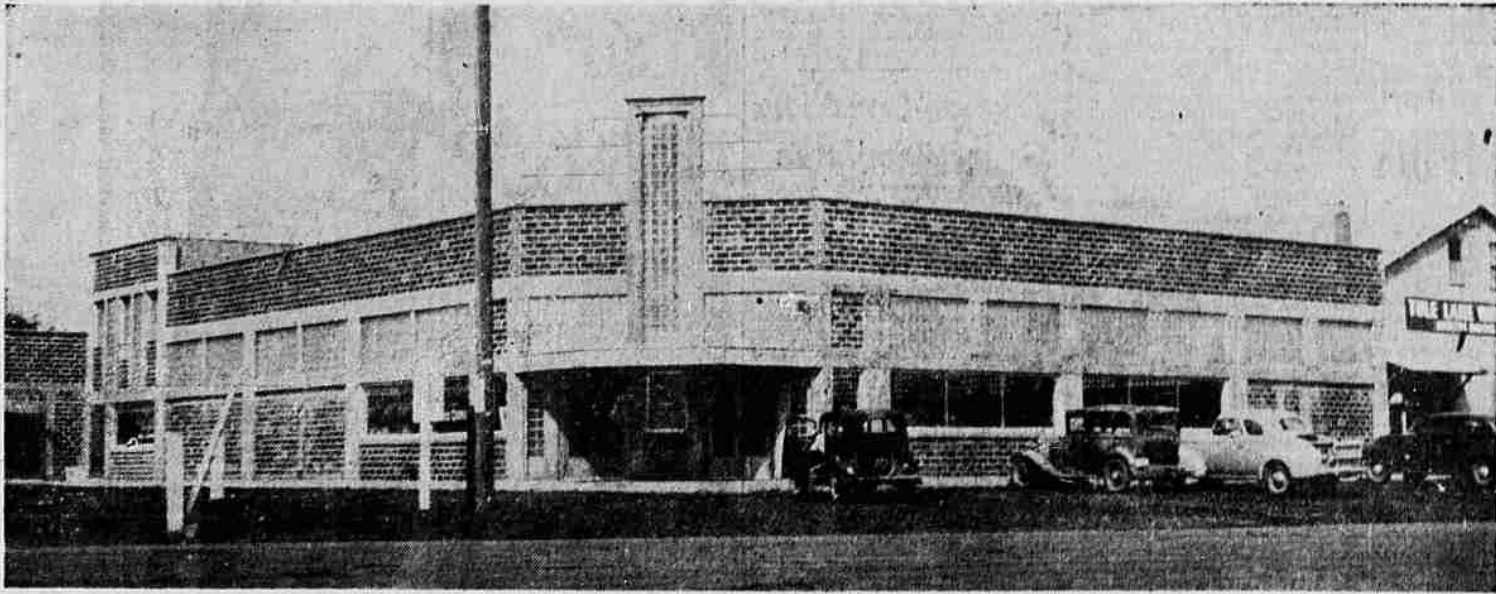
