## DOG POUND MOVING BEGUN WEDNESDAY

Procedure of moving the city dog pound from its present location to property purchased by the city, got underway Wednesday.

The new location of the dog pound is on Kesterson road, and the house included in the purchase has been raised on blocks preparatory to moving it.

An addition, ten feet wide and the full length of the building, will be constructed at the rear. The finished house will have bathroom, bedroom, kitchen, living room and service porch, and be equipped with all modern conveniences.

The new pound will have room to accommodate a much larger number of dogs, Amos Fields, city poundmaster said. Many dogs had to be turned away for summer boarding this year because of lack of space, he said.

## July Postal Receipts Show Marked Increase

Postal receipts for July, 1945, one of the slowest months of the post office year, show increases of \$772.43 over July, 1944. Burt C. Hawkins, Klamath postmaster said.

Figures for the month this year reached \$18,130.10, and for July last year were \$17,357.67.

Postal receipts have been increasing steadily since the war began, Hawkins said, and the approaching last quarter of 1945 is expected to show an all-time high for this post office.

The city engineer and caretaker were also authorized to experiment with various substances to try to settle the dust at the picnic grounds.

## Ireland's Tinker Tribe Elects King On Wet Ballot

GALWAY, Eire, Aug. 9 (AP)—Whether Martin Ward drank Patrick Dodd under the table or knocked him for an Irish loop remained a mystery today to everyone but Ireland's Tinker tribe.

But Ward was nailed as king-elect as 5000 members of the gypsy bands who roam the country in caravans, mending pots and pans and selling horses and goats, collected at Connemara for a coronation ceremony tomorrow night.

In secret preliminary contests of drinking, fighting and boasting—in which anyone who got drunk or fell asleep was eliminated—candidates for the past two weeks have vied for the title of king. With it goes the right to free meals and free drinks anywhere in the "kingdom," a gift of four horses and the best of the gypsy caravans, and the choice of Tinker colts as a bride.

The contest finalists were Ward and Dodd. Somehow Ward managed to prove he ranked highest "for ability to drink like a gentleman, for physical strength, and for the

record in settling quarrels among the tribes." But all tribal ceremonies were strictly for the Tinkers, and even the coronation will be closed to the public.
