## SUMMER PLAY PROGRAM TO CLOSE SUNDAY

The city summer recreation program, under direction of E. E. Hambrick, closes Sunday, August 12. For the past week the adults natatorium has been open for swimming classes with attendance of about 120 persons in the afternoon and 50 in the evening.

Plans for the winter recreation program are being outlined now, Hambrick stated.

Summer swim instruction classes were well attended with 984 children enrolled. Total attendance for the swim program reached 6881. 340 boys and girls between the ages of 7 and 16 entered as non-swimmers and learned to swim during the program. 110 additional children were awarded certificates as beginners and ten as intermediate swimmers.

Handicraft classes drew attendance of about 220 per day, with all the children finishing one or more articles. A display of some of the finished work was exhibited recently in a Main street window.

A supervised playground program at Mills school grounds was also sponsored by the city recreation department. A total attendance here of 2317 was reported.

The recreation program was limited to eight weeks this summer due to a reduced budget, Hambrick said. He said that reports of good results of the program from supervisors of the various classes show that a longer program would be twice as desirable, and a municipal swimming pool a "must" for Klamath Falls.
